Still no Area A committee chair

Steering Committee is still in need of a chairman — and it's not clear when they will get one.

Although the Moore County Planning Board had recommended one of their own -Seven Lakes Civic Group President Dave Kinney - for the job, the commissioners named Watts Auman to the post during their August 7 meeting. But Auman declined the offer.

So the appointment wound up back on the Commissioner's agenda for August 21. But, when the item came up, Chairman David Cummings exercised his right to pull it off the agenda. Asked why, by Commis-

The Area A Small Area Plan sioner Tim Lea, Cummings said there had been "an oversight made in the Planning Department getting information to this board before the last meeting."

Cummings told The Times after the meeting that Planning Department staff, in forwarding the Planning Board's recommendation to the commissioners, had neglected to mention that both Kinney and their recommended Area A Vice Chairman, Paul Hodges, would serve as non-voting members of the Steering Committee. Hodges was appointed Vice Chairman during the August 7 commissioners meeting.

Water problem was false alarm

The e. coli contamination that two weeks ago had Seven Lakes and Pinehurst residents stocking up on bottled water likely never entered the water supply, Moore County Engineer Marcus Jones told The Times in an interview on Tuesday.

"We're fairly certain that it was a contamination of the test site," Jones said. The test site in question was an outside faucet at a residence in Pinehurst.

Every month the county draws water from fifteen different test sites sprinkled throughout the Seven Lakes/Pinehurst water system. Jones explained that there are a total of 45 or 50 test sites that are sampled in a three month rotation.

All the test sites are residences or businesses that draw their water from the county. "We try to create a sample that is representative of the system as a whole," Jones said.

Concerns about bacterial contamination first surfaced in the samples take on August 14 and 15. One of the fifteen, drawn from a Pinehurst location, showed elevated levels in the "total coliform" test. This is not the same as "e. coli" or "fecal coliform," but can serve as a warning of elevated fecal coliform levels.

Once they found elevated total coliform levels, the county was required to perform additional tests.

Jones told The Times that they were required to retest the site where elevated total coliform levels were found as well as a site five taps upstream

Mike Finney joins board

Judicial panel issues fine to boat owner

Roughly two dozen landowners turned out for the third meeting of the Judicial Committee of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association, called to consider charges that the noise from Pinnacles resident Andrew Aylett's boat constituted a nuisance and that Aylett had indecently exposed himself in front of a number of lakefront residents while urinating from the back of his boat on the evening of Sunday July 9.

Aylett appeared at the hearing to answer the charges, the first time a defendant has appeared at a SLWLA Judicial Committee meeting. Also on hand were attorneys representing the association and Aylett.

After hearing evidence and argument from both sides, the committee found that Aylett had already agreed to muffle his boat and to apologize to the families near whose lakefront homes the incident of exposure had occurred. The committee fined Aylett \$100 for noise violations and in addition ruled that his privilege to use his boat on

the lake would be revoked through May 31, 2007. "During that time the boat cannot be on or in Lake Auman," Merical said.

Aylett has the right to appeal the Judicial Committee's decision to the full SLWLA Board of Directors. After the hearing was adjourned, Aylett's attorney, Michael Newman of Van Camp, Meacham, and Newman, told *The Times* that he did not know whether his client would appeal the decision.

Though Community Advocate Bud Sales had assembled a half-dozen witnesses to testify against Aylett, only Peyton Gentry of Lawrence Overlook was actually called to testify. Gentry recounted how members of his extended family, gathered for Sunday dinner, had witnessed Aylett drop his swim trunks and urinate from the back of his boat, which was resting 150-200 feet from shore off Lawrence Overlook.

Aylett's attorney, Newman, stipulated that the testimony of additional witnesses would be largely identical to that of Gentry.

Newman said repeatedly that his client did not deny and in fact regretted the incident and wished to apologize to the Gentrys and other homeowners in the area, and Aylett confirmed his desire to apologize.

Newman said that Aylett had had his prostate removed, making bladder control more difficult. He noted that Aylett's boat at the time lacked a ladder, making it impossible for him to jump into the lake to relieve himself, since he would not have been able to climb back into the boat.

In both his opening and closing statements, Newman asked repeatedly, "Why are we here?" He said his client had admitted his mistake and wanted to apologize — and that he and SLWLA Attorney Stephen Later had

reached an agreement on mufflers to be installed on Aylett's boat.

Newman said the association and its attorney had consistently asked for greater and greater concessions from Aylett, including that he accept the loss of lake privileges for a year and agree to a year-long probationary period during which any further rules infraction could result in a lifetime loss of lake privileges. Newman repeated referred to the loss of lake privileges for a year as "the death penalty."

"There's no one here who would consent to that," he told the committee.

In addition, Newman said, the association had demanded that Aylett make a public apology to the community as a whole, apparently through publication in

either the SLWLA newsletter or *The Seven Lakes Times*. Noting that this demand exceeded the sanctions available to the Judcial Committee, Newman asked where such a demand had come from. He said it "seemed to be the result of a bad cocktail party." Earlier in the meeting he referred to the landowners who attended the hearing as "the peanut gallery."

Newman was frequently interrupted by SLWLA attorney Stephen Later, who disputed details of his statements about the various letters, emails, and draft agreements that had passed between the parties.

Judicial Committee Chairman Charlie Merical seemed determined to cut through the clutter of claim and counterclaim to







Twins are modern day Florence Nightingales

Most of us know someone who harbors an enviable Godgiven trait that centers around insight into the feelings of others, responding deeply though quietly to their times of travail.

Knowing how others feel, and why, is an asset and, indeed a requirement, for the nurses serving at FirstHealth of the Carolinas, as well as for volunteers who assist.

One glance at the Nightingale Pledge, adapted from the Hippocratic Oath taken by physicians and named after the British pioneering nurse Florence Nightingale in the 1800s, tells all about the dedication of these medical workers around the world:

"I solemnly pledge myself before God to pass my life in purity and to practice my profession faithfully. I will abstain from whatever is deleterious or mischievous, and will not take or knowingly administer any harmful drug. I will do all in my power to maintain and elevate the standard of my profession, and will hold in confidence all personal matters committed to my keeping and all family affairs coming to my knowledge in the practice of my calling. With loyalty I will endeavor to aid the physician, in his work, and devote myself to the welfare of those committed to my care."

Not each and every nurse is gifted with identical amounts of such traits as a super-patient nature, sympathy with problems of others, 100 percent self control, totally balanced judgment, and instant ability to think and act quickly in times of crisis. But they all are blessed with very considerable amounts of each, and mindset that is highly commend-

Over the years, a considerable number of Seven Lakers have contributed both time and assistance to the work of nurses at FirstHealth of the Carolina facilities. Several nurses at FirstHealth Moore Regional Hospital are Seven Laker residents, including Sandy Jones, Sue Gross, Sue Gibbons, Willa Hughey, and Brenda Caddell.

And then there are the twin sisters Denise and Patrice Gowan. Each was strongly influenced by their mother to becomes a nurse.

Denise is a graduate of Valdosta State University in Georgia. She holds a BS degree in Nursing. She served as a nurse at Emory University in Atlanta for 17 years, followed by 11 years thus far at FirstHealth. Her special interests in nursing have

been in neurology and neurosurgery cases as well as responsibilities in Intensive Care units, with involvement with concerned families, plus involvement with patients with pulmonary fibrosis (lung) problems.

adherence to proven practices, providing assurances to the patients and their families of your dedication, in your own way, and maintaining flexibility to adapt to changing conditions, are all important challenges to be met," says Denise.

Patrice Gowan also holds a BS degree in Nursing from Valdosta State University. She served as a staff nurse at South Georgia Regional Medical Center for a year, and then for 19 years at Emory University Hospital, including four years as a head nurse.

She believes in being a patient's advocate. "Patients do

have a natural fear about the circumstances they face," she says, "so education about their situations can keep them from wondering. Moore Regional Hospital encourages this policy." Her areas of greatest interest include intensive care for heart patients, dealing with death and dying, and showing families the extent of care that was administered. "It's important for families to know that," says Pat.

"In dealing with death and dying, it's important to allow such patients to die with dignity and comfort."

Vacation fire safety

Calvin Loy, Chief Seven Lakes Volunteer Fire Department

"The hotel's on fire!" The husband heard his wife's cry before he was completely awake. Grabbing his overcoat, he threw it around his wife's shoulders and said, "Come on, let's get out of here!"

The night before, they had explored the fire exit locations and now headed for the nearest one. Smoke and searing heat were here ahead of them so they raced back to their room only to come up short at the door.

"Did you bring your key? Don't you have yours?" A frantic search of his overcoat pockets revealed the key at last. The smoke thickened. The couple hurried back into their room only to find smoke pursuing them through the cracks around the door and through the keyhole.

He remembered packing a roll of masking tape in his suitcase for removing lint. Quickly, they taped the keyhole and cracks around the door and waited for firefighters to arrive. Safely outside, all they could say was, "but for a key and cheap roll of masking tape!"

Could this happen to you? If you're like most folks, you don't think about it and you don't plan on it happening to you.

However, statistics show that on average, in a lifetime, each of us can expect to be involved in one or two serious fires enough that the fire department needs to respond. Whether your fire occurs at home, in a movie theater, or a hotel the same principles apply.

Plan Ahead! Remember, fire can happen to you.

Remember, each time you return to your room, put your room key in the same place so that you can find it in the dark. In case of fire, before trying to leave your room, be sure to feel the door. If the door feels warm, do not try to open it.

Stay in your room and seal your door and any other openings with wet towels, sheets, or tape. Turn off your air conditioner to keep smoke from entering your room. Fill your bathtub with water so you can wet down the door if it gets hot.

Call the fire department and give them your location. Do this even if you see firefighter on the street below.

Remember, if you are ever in a fire, stay calm, don't panic

and with advance planning, you will survive!

The Pension Protection Act of 2006

As if pension, IRA, Roth and other retirement plan regulations weren't confusing enough, here comes a brand new 900 page 'act of Congress,' recently signed by President Bush called the Pension Protection Act of 2006.

The intent and much of the detail of this mammoth piece of legislation is designed to prop up our ailing private pension system and it's only safety net known as the Pension Benefit Guarantee Corporation (PBGC). However, included in the legislation are several new individual items that are designed to assist all Americans in planning for their financial security during retirement. I'm going to touch briefly on a few of them here.

EGTRRA is the acronym for the last major tax act which, among other good things, provided for higher individual contribution limits to qualified retirement plans like 401ks and IRAs and Roth IRAs. As an example, personal IRA contribution limits were raised to \$4,000. annually for 2006 and 2007 and to \$5,000 beginning in 2008.

The only problem with EGTR-RA was that the changes it provided were scheduled to 'sunset,' that is revert back to the old levels in 2010. Well, now the enactment of the Pension Protection Act of 2006 has made the EGTRAA retirement changes permanent.

Speaking of sunset provisions, one of the new rules allows for tax free distributions from IRAs for charitable purposes, up to a maximum annual cap of \$100,000. Although there is no income tax deduction for such a direct IRA distribution to a qualified charity, any otherwise required minimum distribution would be considered included in the distribution, thereby avoiding income tax on the annual required minimum.

This could result in potential additional tax savings, i.e., lower taxable income and lower percentage of social security ben-

efits subject to tax. This might be something to look at right away, particularly for those that are already planning to make charitable donations either this year or next, because by the end of

new legislation applies to amounts payable from company retirement plans to named non-spouse beneficiaries due to the death of a plan participant. This provision takes effect on January 1, 2007.

Under current law,

spouses who are named beneficiaries of plan participants may roll the plan balance of a deceased spouse to


their own IRA. Non-spouse beneficiaries (child, grandchild, parent, significant other) have not had that option and have been

forced to pay tax on the entire amount generally within 5 years of the death of the spouse. The new law allows non-spouse beneficiaries to set up an inherited IRA account which if set up properly will give the beneficiary the ability to defer the taxation until their Required Minimum Distributions must be made. This tax deferral feature, often referred to as a stretch, can make a huge difference in the size of the account over time.

As with all tax matters, retirement plan rules are complicated and mistakes can be costly. Consultation with qualified tax professionals is always the best course.



Why would a person leave hiking all day through some of the their nice, comfortable Seven Lakes home and travel out to Utah to live in the dirt for a week? Why would they happily expose themselves to heat, cold, thunderstorms, hail, flash floods, biting insects, coyotes, mountain lions and bears?

Why would they voluntarily subject themselves to seven days of little food, nasty water, sleeping on the cold, hard ground with no tent or sleeping bag and

most rugged terrain found in the United States?

Because it's fun!

North Side resident Colleen MacKinnon recently completed an intense seven-day field course at the world famous Boulder Outdoor Survival School (BOSS) in Boulder, Utah. MacKinnon, a registered nurse, is also an experienced backpacker. She decided to attend this school after hearing about it from her

Kick-Fit instructor, Tim Smith.

"Tim knew that I liked backpacking and stuff like that. So after he signed up for the class at BOSS, he sort of teased me and said 'Ha, ha, look what I get to go do!' and showed me the BOSS website. From the moment I read about it on the web site I knew it was something I always wanted to do, so I signed up

Even though MacKinnon was an experienced backpacker, this

was not going to be a regular backpacking hike through the woods. MacKinnon and the other people in her six-person group would each carry little more than a knife, compass, water bottle, blanket and poncho. There were no matches, flashlights, toilet paper, sleeping bags, cook stoves, tents, cell

"necessities." "We had no food for the first three days. After that we were issued rations that consisted of

things like lentils, flour, raw oats

phones or any other modern

and a type of grain called quinoa and some spices such as salt and pepper. In order to cook the food, we had to construct a bow drill set and use it to start a fire. We used an old tin can as a cook pot."

"One of my goals for this trip was to master fire and when I was successful it was a very satisfying moment for me being able to start a fire with nothing more than a couple of sticks and a piece of string! How many people are able to do







With all the recent publicity regarding the mishandling of VA records, I think it is timely to hear some "good news" about this remarkable agency.

I've been an outpatient client at the hospital in Fayetteville for more than 10 years, using them as my primary care facility and as my source of pharmaceutical drugs.

Even though I was not a career-militarist, I have received a large spectrum of medical benefits. These include annual physicals, routine semi-annual check-ups, lab work, x-rays, EKGs, and a host of in-depth heart tests including nuclearmedicine evaluations. I have found their quality of care to be excellent and on a par with the private clinics here in the Moore county area.

All of their medical services have been provided at no out-ofpocket cost to me. Any prescriptions, whatever their retail cost, are billed at \$7.00 per 30 day supply, and are conveniently delivered through the mail. A statin drug I require would cost \$128 per month locally, for example, but is only \$7.00 through my VA benefits.

still heavy lifting to be done as is proven by the laundry list of capital expenditures that have properly been published. I know we are going to need dues increases, assessments or both to fund our capital needs. It is my view that we need additional revenue today because we have not had competent management in the past. I know, as does everyone that has been paying attention, of hundreds of thousands of dollars that should not have been spent in the manner that it was. Rather than blame volunteer boards for these mistakes, I choose to point to the one person that has been paid to manage our community. He has been here almost 20 years and we have faced and still face issues that must be attributed to his poor leadership. We can save over \$80,000 annually by removing Mr. Fulcher and give the remaining employees the opportunity to step up and do the job better. They can do this without additional staffing. Should our remaining employees not be up to the task (I think they are), there are available professional management groups that can be hired that will actually cost us less and push the annual savings to over \$100,000.

Mr. Nuti, I stand by my statement: "Before we consider starting down a slippery slope of assessments and dues increases to fund the repairs to Echo dam" and other capital expenditures, "we should examine all areas of our operation to make sure the funds required are not already available to us with current revenues." I attempted to privately encourage the board to face what I see as a serious problem. You publicly ridiculed my opinions without exposing my identity. Let me stand and say publicly — these are my views. I welcome public scrutiny of them, as should you.

operation to make sure the funds required are not already available to us with current revenues.

It is my firm belief that we are spending at least \$100,000 too much on administration in our current budget. Three major areas of management responsibility have been eliminated during the last year. Company Police, West Side Security, and staffing and supervising our own North and South Gates either no longer require time or in the case of North and South Gates require very little time from our management staff. We have not seen any decrease in our administration budget to coincide with the elimination of these areas of responsibility.

It is my view that we had too much administration expense before the cuts in Company Police and the other areas. Now, there is absolutely no question we are wasting money in administration expense.

Has anyone done a management review? Mr. Herman, I sent to you my thoughts on an organizational chart with job descriptions at the end of last year. Have you presented my ideas to the board for their review? Has anyone checked with other gated communities to see how much their administration cost is to their total revenue? Does anyone actually know how Mr. Fulcher spends his work week?

Clearly our Community Manager has had a difficult couple of years. He supervised the dumping of our debris in an unlicensed dump and paid \$80,000 over two years for the removal of that debris without satisfactory accounting controls in place.

He defended Company Police expense by saying that we had to have Company Police to be licensed to provide the Security Contract for the West Side and we find out that we were not licensed and that in fact it was against the law for company police to be licensed as a private security company. Also, we find that we had been spending our money on company police for 12 years after we were notified by the NC Attorney Generals office of jurisdiction problems with our company police going on private property.

Are we ever going to examine management cost and performance and demand that we get value or are we going to continue to just look for ways to get more money from our property owners when a problem surfaces? Assessment is a slippery slope and a one-time revenue generation. Saving administration expense will generate money each and every vear forward. This board is to be commended for the areas that it has found to save money without sacrificing the quality of our community. You must take the last step, which is the most unpleasant, and look hard at the effectiveness and cost of our administration while asking the question why were the waste you found not found by our manager.

Lessons from the Master fisherman

Have you ever been fishing all day without a single catch? "Skunked" as they say? Well, that's not either unique nor unheard of. Most likely you were fishing at the wrong location, or perhaps at the incorrect depth.

We've talked before about the thermocline; that water strata that varies in depth with water and air temperature changes. This is where fish feel most comfortable. They will leave this area to forage bait at more shallow depths. Those big fish will hang out in the thermocline though when not on a feeding binge.

You may think my aforesaid can be attributed to information from experience or from reading fishing magazines. Not at all! This information was documented in today's best selling book written many years ago. You may have heard it before or even read it in an official copy.

The book in reference is long



sometimes hard to understand. It has been rewritten many times, which has caused much debate. It's theme and leading characters have remained essentially unchanged however.

Actually the tome is a collection of books with many chapters in each. There are several references to fishing in the volume, but the closest reference to the thermocline is depicted in the book called Luke at Chapter

memories I should submit an abbreviated version of the story. It seems Our Lord came upon his friends who

had been net fishing all day without a single catch. He asked them to take him out with them to deeper water and lower their nets there. Lo, they netted more fish on that first retrieve than they could handle without outside assistance.

In another version of the story it seems that Our Lord counseled them to cast their lines to the other side of the boat. The satisfying result was iden-

It appears that similarities exist between today's fishing methods and the lesson taught so many centuries ago.

Surely, there have been days when we have experienced poor days of fishing. Well, we have been in the wrong place, the wrong time, or perhaps, fishing at the wrong depth. Let's do some things differently.

Try fishing along a shoreline. Cast towards the shoreline near weed cover, stumps or rock formations. You might wish to troll a lure from the deep water side of your boat. This may entice one of those big fish which is on a feeding foray in the shallows.

No luck? Well, then, move your boat farther away from the beach to deeper water and cast with diving plugs and troll sinking lures. Remember to cast and troll from opposite sides of the boat.

This may prevent the proverbial "bird's nest" of your lines should that big fish take one lure and tie a "granny knot" in the other line.

Okay, we've tried all of the above and have not caught a fish all day. What's wrong? Well, some days are like that. Let's not talk about it.

Tomorrow is another day, and maybe our next trip will produce a catch that we can brag about to any who will listen. Until that day I'll wait to hear all about it.







out how important it is to check
the website," Meikle noted.

Later in the meeting, in response to a resident's question, Meikle said that it had not occurred to him to enlist the aid of the Area Representatives to get the word out.

"We will be reviewing the situation with an eye to finding additional methods of communicating with the community in future situations like this," Meikle said.

Forum. The Seven Lakes Forum will end its summer hiatus with a presentation by Colonel Steve Tableman on the "Progress in Afghanistan." The session is scheduled for Thursday, September 21 at 9:00 am in the Great Room of the West Side Park Community Center and is open to all Seven Lakers.

Pool hours. Community Manager Tony Robertson announced that hours at the pool have been cut back, since many lifeguards have returned to school. The pool will close for the season at the end of the day on Labor Day, September 4. Details on hours of operation are posted on the Association website.

Septic plan. Robertson said that currently, about 75 percent of Westsiders, have signed onto the septic management program developed about a year-and-a-half ago. He encouraged the remaining 25 percent to sign up, both to protect the lake and as "cheap insurance" against the failure of their septic system.

Boat stickers. Robertson said that harmful rumors about the theft of boat stickers have been circulating in the community since minutes from a board work session mentioned that some stickers were unaccounted for. He forcefully defended SLWLA staff members, saying that no stickers had been lost or stolen.

Robertson said that, when stickers were being issued earlier this year, in a few cases the name of the homeowner receiving the sticker was not recorded. Of 769 stickers issued, only six are unaccounted for, Robertson said. "That's an error of less than one percent," he added.

Finance. Treasurer Virgil Reid provided printed reports detailing the association's financial resources and performance to

budget. He noted that he had recently moved about \$400,000 from money market funds to short-term CDs in order to obtain a better interest rate. Currently, the association is earning an average of 4.1% on its investments.

Reid said the association plans to list the names of landowners who are delinquent in their dues payments in the SLWLA newsletter that will be published at the end of September. Because *The Times* typically reprints content from the newsletter, those names will appear in *The Times* as well.

Reid said the SLWLA is currently owed \$51,000 in back dues. Of that, \$16,000 is owed on a "handful" of lots whose owners have not paid dues in several years. Another \$12,000 is owed by a single contractor. Nine homeowners owe a total of \$7,000, and the bulk of the rest is owed by non-resident lot owners.

Recreation. Betty Milligan reported that an ice cream social held at the pool on Saturday, August 19 was the best-attended event yet at the pool.

Shag lessons will be starting on September 11; the Halloween party is scheduled for October 28. She encouraged residents to consult the SLWLA website for details on recreation events.

Lake Auman. Mary Anne Fewkes reminded landowners that the speed limit over the Lake Auman dam was set at 25 miles per hour on the advice of engineers in order to protect the dam. "We don't want to have to put speed bumps on the dam," Fewkes said.

Bud Sales, Paul Kirst, Bob Fewkes, and Don Snell have completed a Lake Auman Master Plan that runs to 65 pages. Calling it "a wonderful document," Mary Anne Fewkes said a copy will be made available in the SLWLA office.

Sharing some information from that report, Fewkes said Lake Auman is 800 acres in surface area and 620 of those acres are within the 150-foot no wake zone where boats are to travel at no more than five miles per hour. The boat population on the lake is divided equally into one-third pontoons, one-third other power boats, and one-

third non-powered boats.

Flood plain. During the public comment segment of the meeting, former SLWLA Treasurer Lois Rocco asked for clarification on how new flood plain maps developed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency [FEMA] may affect Lake Auman homeowners.

"This is a good example of why this community owes a great debt to Gerhard Hergenhahn," SLWLA Legal Director Hugh Beckwith responded. "He has bird-dogged this issue from the beginning and been relentless on this."

The original map proposed by FEMA showed a flood plain around Lake Auman that would have covered portions of all lakefront lots. "Tony [Robertson] and Gerhard did a great job moving the flood plain delineation back to the high water mark of the lake," Beckwith said. "[Now,] no landowner owns property in the [redefined] flood plain. [Therefore], no landowner will be required to buy flood insurance."

But uncertainty is caused by the maps which "were drawn

before the lake was full." The metes and bounds of most Lake Auman lots show those lots extending into areas that are now covered with water.

"So you will have situations where a bank or surveyor, relying on those metes and bounds, mistakenly believes a lot is in the flood plain," Beckwith said.

But the covenants associated with the deeds to Lake Auman lots state that the developer — and, by extension, the landowners association owns all property under the lake to the high water mark. "It's a settled legal question," Beckwith said, "despite the metes and bounds which

might confuse a bank or a sur!veyor."

"Gerhard has anticipated that folks may run into this problem," Beckwith said. "So he had language inserted into the [county's new flood plain] ordinance that says the flood plain administrator can determine the boundaries of the flood plain" when there is a conflict between maps and title.

"The idea is that it might be done proactively" by a single interpretation letter for all 500 lakefront lots. "Gerhard has made it possible for the flood plain adminstrator to be proactive."

Following up on Beckwith's explanation, Hergenhahn told landowners at the meeting that "for the moment, no one has to act on it."

The new maps go into effect

on October 17, he said. Hopefully, the association will be able to work with the county to get the letter explaining the Lake Auman flood plain situation into the hands of banks, insurance companies, surveyors, and lakefront owners before then, he explained.

If that happens, no lakefront lot owner should be required to purchase flood insurance, and those who choose to do so will obtain the preferred rate for lots outside flood plains.

"Wait for October 17," Hergenhahn advised the crowd. "And hope that we get the letter by then. Then you should evaluate for yourself whether you voluntarily want to add flood protection for your perceived worst case to your insurance policy."

Smoking at playground. Rocco said that, on a recent visit to the West Side Park playground with her grandson, she had observed a woman smoking in the area and discarding her cigarette butts in the mulch. She asked the board to consideer putting up no smoking signs in the area.

Vandalism. Charlie Flinchum reported that he had discovered some vandalism at the Johnson Point boat slips on Monay night, August 21. He asked boat owners to check their boats for damage.

John Hoffman asked whether the Johnson Point Gates were now being locked at night. "We're still working on that," SLWLA President Meikle replied.

Fireworks. Echoing complaints heard at the July General Meeting, Dale Erickson said that during the weekend of August 12 fireworks were set

off in his neighborhood. He found the next morning large rockets on his roof and in his pinestraw. He asked that the board put out a position paper stressing the ban on private fireworks in the community — and the danger created by fireworks.

NCWRC. Erickson asked for an update on the Association's negotiations with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission regarding the Commis-(See "SLWLA," p. 36)

arrive at discrete questions that the committee could in fact resolve. After the committee had delib-

erated in private on that question, Merical announced the \$100 fine and suspension of lake privileges through May 31, 2007.

Community Advocate Sales had brought two charges against Aylett: the first for an excessively noisy boat and the second for public urination and indecent exposure. The committee imposed the \$100 fine for the first charge; the suspension of lake privileges, for the second charge.

and another five taps downstream in the system. Those tests were conducted on August 17. It takes 24 hours to process a test for fecal coliform.

When the new test results came back, one of the upstream sites, an outdoor water tap on a Pinehurst residence, showed an elevated level of fecal coliform, or e. coli.

That finding, which came back late on August 18, left Moore County Public Utilities officials with no choice but to issue the warning to residents that water should be boiled before drinking. That notice was issued on the evening of August 18.

The County Health Department, at the same time, was required by state law to close all restaurants served by the Seven Lakes/Pinehurst water system.

County personnel went door to door Friday night in the area immediately surrounding the site where fecal coliform was found. Media were notified, as were the landowners associations in Seven Lakes.

The county flushed the water system in the vicinity of the positive test site by opening fire hydrants. After the flushing, another three site resampling was conducted, again taking samples from the positive test site and five taps upstream and downstream in the system. This time, the test from the positive test site was taken from an indoor tap, Jones told *The Times*.

As a precaution, additional sites in the system were tested at the same time.

After the 24 hour wait, the county got the news that none of the sites had tested positive

(Continued from page 35) sion's claim of jurisdication on Lake Auman. President Meikle said the conversation continues but that there is nothing to report at present.

Erickson reiterated his concern that any claim of jurisdiction be opposed in the strongest possible manner. "If we get the government on our lake, they will get a strong foothold in here, and it's going to be a disaster," Erickson said. for fecal coliform. County officials lifted the water quality advisory at midnight on August 19.

Two weeks later, after additional testing throughout the system, Jones said he is almost certain the positive fecal coliform reading resulted from contamination at the test site.

"We decontaminate the area and clean the tap with Clorox" before we take the sample," Jones told *The Times*, noting that a number of theories have been floated as to what caused the contamination — none of which can be confirmed at this point or is likely to ever be confirmed.

Jones said the connection between the home where the contamination was found and the county water system includes a double check valve to prevent any backflow from the residence into the county system. Consequently, Jones said, it is unlikely that the bacteria ever entered the county water supply.

This was the first time that the county water system has experienced this sort of emergency, Jones said, so county staffers are dissecting their response to determine how they can respond even more effectively in the future.

One option that might have prevented what appears to have been a false alarm is the use of dedicated water testing sites installed in county water mains, rather than relying on taps in customer homes and businesses. But dedicated test taps are expensive, Jones told *The Times* — so expensive that even much larger systems forego that luxury.

Jones said the Cary system — which serves roughly ten times as many customers as the Moore County system — does not have dedicated test taps. The Cary system had an e. coli emergency at the same time as the Moore County emergency. The two systems are not connected and there is no reason to believe the incidents are related, Jones said.

Jones is exploring options for getting the word out to residents more quickly when an emergency occurs in the water system. The county Emergency Operations Center was activated during the water emergency in order to handle calls from concerned citizens. However, there was no effort to call all the customers served by the system, because the county currently lacks the technology to do so effectively, Jones told *The Times*.

But the county's Emergency Services department is in the process of purchasing a new 9-1-1 communications system that should make it possible for Public Utilities to telephone each of its customers in case of emergency.

"We should be able to load our customer database into their system," Jones said.

ed that they had completed Phase 1 of their project — the revision of the SLLA by-laws and would be presenting the results of that effort at the Board's September work session. The committee will then move to Phase 2, a revision of the Rules and Regulations.

Security. Director Michael Florence said he has been receiving complaints about residents allowing people to fish - unsupervised by the landowner — in community lakes. He remind-

ed landowners that the rules and regulations require that they be present with their guests when guests are using SLLA amenities.

"Please remind your guests, your friends, and yourself that we do have a 25 MPH speed limit in Seven Lakes," Florence said, noting that speeding has become a problem in certain areas of the community.

He said the Association would soon be using a device that will allow them to track travel speeds over a given stretch of roadway, in order to identify areas for Sheriff's Department speed traps or the installation of speed humps.

Finance. Treasurer Steve Hudson reported that, as of the end of July, \$1,017,000 in Landowners dues had been collected. Year-to-date revenues for that period total \$1,091,000 and expenses were \$304,000.

"We're looking real good for the coming year," Hudson said.

Architectural Review. Ron Richmond reported that no new homes had been approved in the past month.

During the first five months of the year, he noted, 13 new homes had been approved, including eight on the South Side and five on the North Side. All eight South Side homes were spec houses, with an average square footage of 1,890. Three of the North Side homes were spec homes, with an average squarefootage of 1,704.

Long-range planning. Truesney, held their first meeting three weeks ago. Nuti and Truesdell are developing a maintenance


