300-home development planned near Seven Lakes

A 131-acre, 316-unit, mixed residential development that will lie on either side of Holly Grove School Road and abut Seven Lakes North was on the Moore County Planning Board's Thursday, March 6 agenda as *The Times* went to press early Thursday morning.

The proposed Planned Unit Development [PUD], located approximately 2.1 miles east of Rt. 211, adjoins the perimeter boundary of Seven Lakes North near Timber Drive, Cedar Lane, and Seminole Court.

Beardslee Engineering, a New Jersey-based firm owned by Bill

Beardslee, a resident of Seven Lakes North, is seeking a zoning change from RA and RA-USB to PUD Rural and PUD Hamlet for the two subdivisions, to be called Southwick and Northington, which make up the project.

Water is a key concern and Beardslee said he believes "it is appropriate and reasonable" that preliminary approval for the subdivision plan will hinge on the ability of the county to provide water to the development. Planning and infrastructure concept documents submitted by Beardslee Engineering noted that potable water should be sufficient but a new water tank would be appropriate to provide fire protection and stabilize pressure.

Old affidavit may undermine lawsuit

The suit over Seven Lakes Country Club's old driving range comes down to a simple question: Was the five acres on which the range sits reserved in perpetuity as open space, in the intent of the original developers, through the maps, plats, and covenants they filed, and by the promises they made, verbally and in sales materials, to those who purchased lots in Seven Lakes?

It now appears that the lead plaintiff in the suit, D. Alan Shaw of Seven Lakes South, has, under oath, come down on both sides of that question.

The complaint filed by Shaw and co-plaintiffs Steve and Mary Hudson, Tom and Roberta Robinson, and Chuck and Jane Leach, says the old driving range property "was never intended for residential use or development and has at all times since the recordation of the subdivision plats been shown as part of the open areas protected by the restrictive covenants of the subdivision as undeveloped, green area for the protection and enjoyment of the residential lot owners."

In a deposition taken last month, Shaw reiterated that claim, testifying that the original developer had never considered using the old driving range property for anything other than green space and had never planned to use the property for residential development.

Gardeners hear from Weymouth ranger

In February members of the Seven Lakes Garden Club were treated to a very informative and picturesque presentation about Weymouth Woods Nature Center, by Ranger Billy Hartness of the Division of Parks & Recreation. Hartness described how Weymouth Woods was established to preserve and protect a small segment of the special adapted plant and animal communities of the Sandhills region.

The Sandhills are flat-topped sandy ridges separated by broad level valleys that make this one million acres area unique. Most

of the extensive longleaf pines that once covered the Sandhills were removed by lumbering, naval stores operations, and fires. Today, second growth longleaf pine and turkey oak stands cover the slopes of the ridges and drop away to hardwoods that fill the bottomland.

Hartness' management practices are dedicated to preserving primitive ferns, lichen and mosses, brilliantly hued wildflowers, shrubs and trees. British Indian pipe, trailing arbutus, wild orchids, dwarf iris, fall gentian, blueberry, and wild azalea are just a few of the colorful species to are located in the moist areas. Among these are several species of pitcher plants and the diminu-

tive sundew. In some areas formerly occupied by the pines are red and white oaks, American holly, dogwood, hickory sweetgum, sourwood, yellow poplar, persimmon and red maples.

Weymouth Woods is home for many animals, while others pass through at various times of the year. Chattering gray squirrels and their larger cousins, the fox squirrels, can be seen scampering across the hiking and bridle trails that wind through

the preserve. Other common mammals include deer, red and gray foxes, raccoons, opossums, and rabbits. Less common species are mink and otter.

Birdlife is also abundant at Weymouth Woods. Large numbers of migrating songbirds pass through and often spend the winter in the preserve. Quail, mourning doves, hawks, and owls can be seen throughout the year.





Board revamps nominations, legal access

The Seven Lakes Landowners Association Board of Directors adopted several new policies — and rejected others — during its Wednesday, February 27 business meeting.

Nominations Committee

The Board approved a revision to Bylaw 6.3, which deals with the Nominations Committee, making several changes to the existing process:

• First, the Nominating Committee Chairman will be named in September, in order to give the panel more time to work.

• The Members of the committee will have to be approved by the Board of Directors.

Legal Expenses

After some debate, the Board approved a policy document that requires Directors to obtain Board approval before contacting an attor-

ney on the Association's behalf. Secretary Michael Florence proposed the new policy in the wake of Treasurer Hudson's criticism of mounting legal expenses.

Though the President, Vice President and Community Manager are designated as the Board's primary legal contacts, once the expense trigger is reached, attorney contact may be made only after the Board has approved the framing of the question on which an opinion is sought, and the attorney's answer must be presented to the Board. Failure to follow the prescribed process could result in the Director who makes the legal contact being held responsible for the expenses incurred.

The new policy makes an exception for the Community Manager, who may incur up to

\$500 in legal fees for "normal community business."

President Truesdell opposed the new policy, arguing that recording the legal question and the attorney's answer in the Board's minutes would make it discoverable and thus destroy attorney-client privilege. Secretary Florence argued that the question and response could be handled in closed session and the minutes of that session could be sealed.

He also asked where in the "Green Book" of Association legal documents the new policy should appear, since it appeared

Speeding still a problem in Seven Lakes West

Speeding on community streets continues to be a problem reported President Jim Haggard at the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association Open Meeting held on Tuesday, February 26. Of high concern was a recent incident at the mail house when a pedestrian was struck by a vehicle.

"They [the pedestrian] were not hit hard...but we need to give some latitude between a car and a person. People exiting from the community seem to think it's appropriate to get out of here really fast," said Haggard. "When people get hit it is time to pay attention to the issue!"

Haggard said he looks to the new board to address the problem of speeding over the coming year.

Traffic Count

In a related discussion, Security Director Blaine Rowland presented the results of a recent traffic count study conducted at the front entrance of Seven Lakes West. The study was undertaken to provide information to the county and state as part of the community request for a railroad crossing upgrade.

Rowland said traffic entering and exiting the community at

peak travel hours was counted, as well as all traffic traveling through the Rt. 211 intersection for a frame of reference.

"The numbers surprised us," said Rowland. He reported over 15,000 vehicles traveled through the main intersection with approximately 3,800 vehicles entering or exiting Seven Lakes West, entrance to be one of those that might get terminated."

County Board creates financial advisory panel

The Moore County Board of Commissioners has appointed two new committees aimed at ensuring county money is welltended and wisely spent.

A new Major Capital Projects Task Force and a County Government Efficiency Advisory Board [CGEAB] were approved during the Commissioners Meeting on Monday, March 3.

The CGEAB has the broader mission of the two panels, charged with examining "specific projects and initiatives within county government for efficiency, options, and recommendations to make the best use of taxpayer money."

"The big thing to me on this was to make sure that we make every effort before we raise taxes," Commissioner Larry Caddell said of the new committee. "We put the Land Transfer Tax and now the Sales Tax on the ballot to give the people of Moore County every option before raising property taxes."

Members appointed by the Commissioners include Dick Westcott of Southern Pines, Jim Westbrook of Southern Pines, Bob Tweed of Southern Pines, Nick Picerno of McLendon Hills, and Densel Williams of Pinehurst. Picerno is a candidate in upcoming elections to replace Chairman Colin McKenzie on the Board of Commissioners.

A resolution describing the panel's duties, offered by Commissioner Cindy Morgan says they will:

- Accept projects recommended by the commissioners, county staff, and public, funneled through the County Manager,
- Request information, review data, and communicate as needed with staff through coordination with the County Manager,
- Work with the County Manager and staff on reporting their findings to the Commissioners.

Chairman McKenzie expressed some concern that those provisions hemmed in the new panel a bit too tightly, making a motion amending Morgan's resolution "to allow these people to come up with their own agenda if they see fit."

Morgan said she had researched the success of similar groups convened in other counties and found they tended to be more successful if given some guidance in terms of projects they should pursue.

After discussion, McKenzie withdrew his amendment, but said, "I want them to know that, if they want to ask the County Manager for something, he better have a damn good reason for not giving it to them if it's legal."

The Board ultimately approved Morgan's resolution establishing the panel unanimously.

Capital Projects Task Force

Explaining the new Major Capital Projects Task Force, McKenzie said; "Their mission is to go out and look at recently completed jails and look for the best points from each one and make sure that we get the most bang for our buck."

The county anticipates constructing not only a new jail, but also new a new public safety building and county administration building on a recently acquired parcel in Carthage.

Members of the Capital Projects Task Force appointed on Monday include Sheriff Lane Carter, Chief Deputy Neil Godfrey, Captain Eddie Johnson, Commissioner Tim Lea, Commissioner Larry Caddell, Coun-

ty Manager Cary McSwain, Public Works Director Dennis Brobst, Public Safety Director Carlton Cole, Fire Marshal Carlton Cole, retired architect Howard Warren, and a soon to be hired county building project manager.

CVB Presentation

Family is grateful for community support

Perhaps you've seen flyers posted around the community asking for support and prayers for a widowed young mother recently diagnosed with breast and bone cancer. You may have even wondered if this was could be another email-driven hoax. Unfortunately the call for help is all too real.

Heidi Patterson Chase, daughter of longtime Seven

Lakes North residents Jerri and Pat Patterson "is a wonderful young woman who has always loved children," said her mother as she described the West End area after-school program, Kidz Zone, which Chase operated for several years.

Despite tragically losing her husband, Anthony "Tony" Chase, a sixteen-year veteran of the U.S. Army Special Forces, to an automobile accident three weeks after their wedding, Chase was determined to have her own family. She fostered and later adopted two sisters — both girls now attend West End Elementary School.

Diagnosed on January 6, her mother's birthday, Chase is under hospice care at her parent's home.

"Everybody has just been so wonderful," said Jerri. "Our neigh-

bors are helping so much and people from our church are organizing covered dishes and someone to watch the children for periods of time on weekends - That's the biggest thing: we just don't have enough time to get everything done."

Pat agreed, "We're so appreciative of the help but we're very private people. All of these different clubs and people have been so kind."

rie Mitchell, George and Corrine Walls, Anne and

Harry Meeth, John Blake, and Steve and Lorraine Mallard for creating flyers and organizing benefit motorcycle rides in Heidi's name. They also expressed appreciation for the staff at West End Elementary and the girls' teachers, including David Landolt who with his wife and pastor has visited the hospital three times.

"It's been amazing to see the community come together like this," said Jerri.

> The Patterson's have lived in Seven Lakes North since November 1982. Pat is retired and Jerri works as a Nurse Practitioner for a Pinehurst-based pain management group. She expressed gratitude to Dr. Frances Corrigan. "He has not taken one dime out of my pay or docked me for sick leave for either my mother or Heidi's illnesses."

> Jerri's mother, Lillian Pierce, a longtime resident of Foxfire, recently died of ovarian cancer. Patterson's sister is undergoing treatment for breast cancer.

> "The doctors think we may carry the [cancer] gene," said Jerri. Her other daughter, Colleen Weldy of San Diego, will undergo gene testing but Patterson said she will not. "I'm sixty-three. I'll be vigilant on my mammograms but the test is \$3,000 to \$6,000 and many insurance

companies will not cover it."

Chase does have health insurance but Patterson said the co-pays and experimental procedures not covered have been overwhelming.

She continued, "What's most important for us right now are the little things. This has made me appreciate how helpful a covered dish, a card, or just a prayer can be. I know I've learned to be more giving and how little gestures can help."

Anne and Harry Meeth of Sacred Heart Catholic Church are coordinating covered dishes for the family and contacting people within the church to help with the girls. They can be reached at 235-0988.

animal to the Small Animal Emergency Clinic in Aberdeen, where it was treated for very deep abrasions. The vets found that the puppy had a collar around its neck that was far too small and had to be cut away.

A representative of Animal Advocates of Moore County [AAMC] was contacted and came to the clinic to provide assistance. Saturday night, the organization sent out an "Email Blast" seeking any information that might help identify the perpe-

Women get the lowdown on heart health

A team from FirstHealth presented an informational program about heart disease and women during the Women of Seven Lakes monthly meeting on Thursday, February 7.

Special guest, Mrs. Nancy Frock, spoke first by sharing her personal story about having a heart attack. She is a heart attack survivor and a graduate of the FirstHealth Cardiac Rehab program. About having a heart attack, Frock said:

- 1. Age does not matter.
- 2. It not only happens to men.
- 3. Listen to your body.

Jean Barrett-Taylor and Betsy Young, of First Health Cardiac Rehabilitation, provided an overview of who is affected by heart disease and described the Cardiac Rehab purposes. The program assists heart patients to develop a healthy lifestyle, incorporate exercise and healthy eating, and to create a sense of camaraderie with other heart patients recovering from a heart attack or other heart ailment.

According to Barrett-Taylor and Young, risk factors for heart disease include family history, age, sex, smoking, hypertension, cholesterol, and diabetes. If a person has one risk factor, it doubles their risk of heart disease, if an individual has two factors, the risk is tripled, and those with three factors are ten times more likely to have a heart attack.

Exercise can help all risk factors. The team suggests some form of exercise three days a week for thirty minutes sessions. Barrett-Taylor and Young suggest walking is just as effective as running.

David Christaldi, Chief Perfusionist with the Open Heart Surgery team at Moore Regional also presented information at the meeting.

Christaldi runs the heart-lung

machine during open heart surgeries and discussed his role at FirstHealth and why women need to be more aware and knowledgeable regarding heart disease.

Many members shared questions that were discussed, and the heart health team also distributed several pamphlets.

Candidates night draws large crowd

Calling it, "One of the most crucial Candidate's Night in my memory of seventeen years," Dave Kinney, President of the Seven Lakes Civic Group, welcomed a crowd of approximately 160 interested voters and eight of the ten candidates running for seats on the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Board of Directors to the evening forum, held on Monday, February 25. The event was sponsored by the Civic Group and moderated by Times Editor Greg Hankins

Candidates Mike Roscoe and Jeff Hermann were unable to attend the event.

Background

Prior to tackling several tough questions on concerns currently facing the community, each candidate was provided a brief introductory period to introduce themselves, providing some background on their experience and what expertise they would bring to the board.

Manila "Bud" Shaver, a fulltime resident of the Northside since 1990, said he retired to Seven Lakes from 3M Corpochemical engineer, and also from an active and reserve US Army career, retiring as the commanding general over 18,000 soldiers. He is a past president of the Retired Military Officers Association and Sandhills Coalition for Human Care, founded the Empty Stocking Fund, and was instrumental in two class action lawsuits fighting for retired federal government employee benefits. Asked why he was running, Shaver responded "I've lived here for eighteen years and never witnessed a board with so many conflicts and agen-

ration where he worked as a das, to the detriment of the community. We've had a twenty percent [home] sales decrease in Seven Lakes over the past year." Shaver continued, "Much needs to be done to our infrastructure. I offer maturity, civility, and personal discipline - and hope to be able to say I brought peace and tranquility back."

> Incumbent Director Ed Nuti said he was born and raised in Brooklyn, NY. He has a Masters degree from the University of Hartford and completed doctoral studies in Human Resources Management. Nuti said he has the ability to work in a team and would "hate to leave on such a sour note, we can work better!"



a Masters degree in Health Education and retired after thirtynine years working in a hospital lab. A latecomer to race, Kindsvatter said she decided to run as a petition candidate after Director Laura Douglass announced her intention to resign. "I think that Laura, Randy, and Donna have been beacons of light in a sea of conflict." She continued, "We need people of respect and

goodwill; I felt we needed more choices." Kindsvatter said she has served on the Seven Lakes Country Club membership, tennis, and standards committees. Currently she serves on the SLLA Architectural Review Board and is in charge of the Seven Lakes library. She also sings in two church choirs, and performs in plays and shows for the Country Club. Kindsvatter said that after a disastrous snowfall a few

years ago, she worked with JoAn Moses to create the Neighbor Helping Neighbor program. Overseeing a 200 member volunteer group, they wrote a disaster planning guide and collected information about assets and special needs "so the community could help each other." Kindsvatter identified character as the most important qualification to be on the board. "I am honest and energetic, and not sponsored

by any group or persons. "

A Northside resident for twenty-one years, incumbent Director Steve Hudson has served for two years as the board Treasurer. "As you know I am controversial. I do feel I can make a difference and represent all landowners in open and above the table manner." Hudson said during his tenure, a system has been created to allow landowners to pay their annual dues in full or they can now opt for monthly, quarterly, or semi-annual payment plans. "I voted against tractor trailers and voted against the sell-out of four board members with the Country Club agreement." He continued, "No board may vote away restrictive covenants. It may not have been politically correct to join Shaw, but I felt I was morally obligated because the email vote was unlawful. For better or worse, I'm still here; and if I'm reelected, I will work for fiscal accountability." Hudson concluded, "Poor management is the root of our problems."

but do very little accounting as a Starting Ranger for Pinehurst Resort." Galford majored in accounting and completed a ROTC commitment in Panama. He has five grandchildren and said his adult son owns a lot in Seven Lakes and intends to move to the area in the next four years.

Galford said he has been an active member of the community, serving as secretary, treasurer, and president of the Country Club — recently retiring from that position to ensure he has the time to focus on SLLA Board activities. "I am looking to create pride in our community," said Galford. "Property values will continue to increase because of our stables, golf, lakes, and community pride." Galford said he offers professional accounting experience, honesty, and a willingness to discuss concerns."

Originally from Atlanta, incumbent director Michael Florence moved to Seven Lakes North six years ago but said he had visited the community to see family for a full decade previous. Florence is employed in Aberdeen as a sales manager, and was elected to the board in 2006, where he has overseen security and personnel. Florence said "Over the last two years, I have come to understand the role of a volunteer board. I plan to retire here, and am energetic and passionate about Seven Lakes."

Ron Erskine moved to Seven Lakes in 1995, his home sits on Lake Sequoia. Born in Montreal, Canada to American parents, Erskine has a Bachelor of commerce degree and retired from Kimberly-Clarke. He has three sons and said he is very proud to have sent two sons to college on tennis scholarships. Erskine said he is a candidate because of "neglect and indifference. We neglect our dams and roads, and have indifference for reserves." He continued, "Our maintenance area has been a disaster, there is indifference to management and maintenance costs." Erskine said, "We must do better. I hope to direct the board to all the above. I have an ability to listen and respond, as I've learned the customer is not always right but is very seldom wrong." Erskine said dams have a fifty-year life and are now thirty-five years old. "Dams require constant tender loving care."

Northsider **Gary Caulk** retired in 2005 after a 28 year career with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission as a Wildlife Enforcement Officer. A native of Richmond County, he and his family moved to Seven Lakes in 1987.

Caulk received his law enforcement training through the Institutes of Government at UNC-Chapel Hill and is himself a certified firearms instructor.

Priorities

The candidates were given in advance of the meeting a two-part question asking what they believe are the two or three highest priority things needed to serve the community and what would they propose doing about

"Our first priority is paying attention to our infrastructure," said **Ron Erskine**, "our dams and roads. Building reserves for those assets, we need to be proactive rather than reactive."

He identified the need for a long range planning committee as the second highest priority. "We need not just five, but fifteen and twenty years out." Erskine said the plan should not be written by one person but by a committee independent of the board. He suggests forming an oversight committee that could be looked to for guidance when the board is fractured over votes. Erskine said the committee could sound out landowners on an issue, "a committee of non-partisan citizens with no axe to grind that the board could turn to for advice and consult with."

Ed Nuti described Seven Lakes as a "work in progress." He said the community has the "potential to become more dynamic as it is changing towards more pre-retirees."

Nuti suggested a comprehensive survey of the residents to determine what they are looking for in Seven Lakes. This survey, said Nuti, could be used as a potential long term planning guide for the board.

Nuti also said there is a need to a document on appropriate comportment of board members. "We are all volunteers, elected to serve all of you not just a few." He continued, "Compromise is essential, which is why I am sponsoring a Code of Conduct."

Nuti said in the future there will be an issue of succession when a new community manager is hired. "I'd like to put some human resources provisions in to assist with this transition. Dalton has been our one common denominator and we will be challenged to find someone to bring the breadth of experience that he has brought."

Gary Caulk said the most critical issue for Seven Lakes is for members to vote for "people that care." He continued, "We want our sales to go back up and not to be laughed at in the newspaper." Caulk said another priority is security issues. "Fifty percent of cars using the inside lane have stickers and not barcodes. All those that pay dues should have barcodes."

He also addressed the expense of the community security cameras contract. "Our cameras are not working and we're spending \$10,000 a year! Kids are tearing up the pool and fence. We need to fix what we

have."

Caulk said a new development going in behind Seven Lakes would affect the community with more people and more traffic. "We need to fix what's wrong today before tomorrow when properties all around us are going to be developed."

Establishing member long range planning committee, not composed of Board members, to look out five, ten, and fifteen years, should be our highest priority said **Michael Florence**. "We may need to fund this group so they have the resources they need — and I'd like to model the committee on [Dave] Kinney's Area A group."

Florence also said a comprehensive review of Seven Lakes employees, specifically administration and maintenance, was a priority. "We do not have a great system to assign tasks, track work, or followup on how or why it [a project] was done."

Florence said his third priority was water issues in the greater Seven Lakes and West End areas. "We're still looking at a one million gallon maximum. Last summer we were at 850,000. With growth we'll be almost

maxed out." He suggested that the SLLA board would need to work cooperatively with McLendon Hills, Seven Lakes West, and West End to address the county with water concerns and the impact of continued growth.

Bud Shaver said his primary concern would be to manage association affairs in a fiscally responsible manner while continuing to make an attractive community. "There are many needs that should be addressed in the next sixty months."

Shaver suggested the new board engage in an all-day closed meeting to identify primary needs over the next five years. "These should be prioritized with costs, and then create a living document prepared for landowners."

He continued, "If you don't vote you have no right to complain. The future [of Seven Lakes] will be greatly determined by this election."

"We should have solid five and ten-year plans with dam, roads, and personnel," said **Steve Hudson** in identifying his first priority. "We have a strong Lakes and Dam Committee, we should have the same for roads." Hudson noted that the Bylaws call for a standing committee for personnel — but no such committee has been formed.

Hudson cited the Employee Bonus program as a problem, "As it is now, the manager decides and the board passes it with little or no discussion about specifics. What the manager gets for employees he gets for himself"

Hudson said the new board should "look into finding someone else to manage this community."

He agreed that the present board is called "dysfunctional" but asked the audience to consider the reason and to not allow it to happen again. "We need a cohesive board and not one that will elect the present president to any office. We do not need a demagogue."

Denny Galford also identified the current board dysfunction as a top priority. "The board pendulum needs to stop in middle. Our board members must rely on staff and management — these are fulltime paid positions that assure continuity. If they cannot provide for us then there

is a personnel matter to discuss." Galford said that the association and the Country Club have common goals, including striving to protect property values. "There were 7,000 visitors last year coming here to play golf. The more visitors, the more property sales."

Galford said he perceived that closed sessions had given way to open meetings of conflict. He said the community could not be run with partial information. "We need operational procedures for issues to be discussed in closed meetings that are open to the press. These issues can then be further discussed and voted on in open meetings. "Our community is thirty years old and needs a facelift to compete with newer communities. Our long term priorities need to be set."

Sally Kindsvatter said that, in any other year's election, she would have identified roads, dams, safety, and a long range funded plan for roads and dams as her top priority, "but things will not change unless we change the complexion of the board. The most important priority is to elect the next president."

Kindsvatter said she hoped the new board would take time to discuss which member was best suited for the position and "not just rush to vote for their favorite." She also suggested the board needed a Parliamentarian. "We don't need to reinvent the wheel. We need to adhere to Robert's Rules."

Kindsvatter also suggested the new board "think out of box instead of relying on paid consultants – use resources in our own community." She said the board should look to Dave Kinney to explain concerns for Area A, to Dennis Roberts to explain water issues, and to work with the local business guild "to see if we can save money on paving roads." Kindsvatter identified the Country Club as Seven Lakes biggest asset. "Regardless of differences, we must work together." She also said a job description was needed for the community manager, "To be accountable you have to have measurable goals and objectives. The board should be in a more oversight capacity." Kindsvatter also took a moment to thank members who signed her petition and for the support of her husband.

Audience questions

Audience members were offered the opportunity to submit questions. During a brief intermission, Moderator Hankins and the Seven Lakes Civic Group board condensed the submissions into four salient questions. Candidates had one minute to answer each.

Question: "Do you feel the lawsuit filed by Shaw was an appropriate way to address concerns about the proposed driving range?"

Gary Caulk responded, "I think it is quite inappropriate for me to comment. The suit is in the courts and my opinion doesn't matter." He continued, "The law will prevail, and we'll be done with it. Caulk said in his professional experience he spent much time around the judicial system. "We [Moore County] have good judges and a good court system."

"I thought from the very beginning that it should have been put forth in a court of law to make a decision," said **Sally Kindsvatter**. "I suggested several times that it should be submitted to arbitration. The covenants are difficult to understand and the lawyers don't agree. The lawsuit was probably necessary."

Bud Shaver responded, "This is nothing more than a business lawsuit!"

Ron Erskine said, "Shaw was a founder [of Seven Lakes]. He wrote the convenants and I agree with it. The driving range was meant to be a green area." Erskine said when he first saw Seven Lakes, the green area at the gates encouraged him to "stop, shop, and stay awhile."

"It is not appropriate," said **Denny Galford**. "Both sides sat down with representation. The agreement reached is good for the community as a whole." Gal-

ford also alluded to "many untold stories and facts that will come out during the lawsuit. Listen to the lawsuit and you'll be surprised."

Michael Florence said that after the vote the community did speak up vocally in opposition. "The motion could have been rescinded and wasn't. The lawsuit was the only way left. I agree with it and the courts will decide."

Current Director **Steve Hudson**, who is was a named plaintiff in the lawsuit responded, "Yes, it was the only appropriate thing left to do."

He continued, "The vote was done behind closed doors and left us no choice." Hudson said the lawsuit was not about money, "It is strictly about the restrictive covenants and whether they

Ed Nuti said a lawsuit is never a agreeable option. "It can only be divisive, but the issue has yet to be resolved." Nuti identified the central issue as whether the old driving range land could be subdivided. "Whether it can be is for the courts to decide."

Question: "Seven Lakes is in Stage 3 Water Restrictions. The aquifer is considerable lower than normal and those restrictions may continue. Given the water shortage, do you feel Seven Lakes should continue to permit building while in Stage 3 restrictions?

Ed Nuti said, "Building should be done intelligently and selectively. We need to use common sense until such time as Stage 3 is over."

"Building has slowed right now," said **Sally Kindsvatter**. "It's difficult to not allow building when there are no restrictions in other parts of county." Kindsvatter identified the proposed Seven Lakes East development as having more effect on Seven Lakes water supply than construction within the community.

Ron Erskine said it was a difficult issue and that he considered himself ambivalent at this time.

Steve Hudson responded in a similar fashion. "That is a difficult question. We have builders with a livelihood depending on construction and there is not restricted building anywhere else."

Denny Galford said, "Stage 3 conservation rules and regulations are set. We should follow them as all other communities."

"Moratorium is a dirty word," said **Michael Florence**. He said that during the recent Civic Group Annual Meeting, Director of Public Works Dennis Brobst shared the viewpoint that "as long as they build we'll [Moore County] supply then with water." Florence said Seven Lakes needs water lines connecting it to Robbins and Montgomery County, projects expected to cost several million dollars.

Gary Caulk said "We need to continue to build – construction takes six to eight months." He also looked to the proposed future water connections within

the county.

Bud Shaver said the building question is up to the County Commissioners. "We don't have water here but this issue is getting into property rights."

Question: "While under Stage 3 Water Restrictions, should lakefront landowners be able to irrigate their yards from the lakes?"

Gary Caulk said that lake irrigation was a perk of building on the lake. "If I lived on a lake I'd use it unless the level got very low."

"Our lakes are fed by streams," said **Bud Shaver**. "If you live on a lake you should be able to use the water but the association should have control of when the water is cut off."

Michael Florence said lakefront owners pay more for their homes, and irrigation may be one of the reasons they selected their home. As a lakefront homeowner, Florence said he voluntarily cut back last Summer. "If you have irrigation on the lake, you should be able to use it."

Ed Nuti said "We need to become more accepting of our neighbors." He continued, "If I put in a lawn then of course I want to see it grow but, on other hand, to be good neighbor I need to be considerate of everyone. We're all in this together."

"If you own property on the water, then I feel you have right," said **Steve Hudson**. He said there was a perception last Summer, as lake levels fell, that irrigation was causing the problem. A study showed that evaporation caused the majority of water loss, with irrigation a minor threat. "Lakefront homes should be able to irrigate but use discretion and consider that all [Seven Lakers] use the lakes."

Denny Galford clarified that while Northside lakes are owned by the association, lakes on the Southside of the community are owned by the Country Club. "There is an agreement in place if Northside lakes have difficulty and Southside has an abundance, then the club will pump water over." Galford said the question of restricting irrigation would probably best be handled with a little bit of negotiation with landowners. "Most would reach agreement with you."

Sally Kindsvatter said she had no problem with lakefront irrigation, "As long as the lake is at an appropriate level."

Ron Erskine said the study conducted last Summer suggested that irrigating from a lake causes a five percent loss, significantly less than loss to evaporation. "If fifty percent [lake-front homeowners] irrigated conservatively, after dark, there would be very little problem and loss of water." Erskine also said that Southside lakes have too much phosphorous and using it

would be bad for Northside lakes.

Question: "There are a number of developments planned for this area. What's your position on allowing new developments access to Seven Lakes ameni-

Sally Kindsvatter referred to a past decision when the board refused to allow McLendon Hills residents to use amenities for a fee. "The board turned them down flat, so it's sort of moot point." She continued, "I don't have enough information but I don't think it would fly."

Bud Shaver said the greater concern for Seven Lakes should be not access [to the amenities] but developing "a marketing program to attract people to live here rather than there."

Ron Erskine said during the Summer, "Lake Sequoia is dangerous as it is with the amount of use, I shudder to think if another community had access to our lakes for swimming and boating."

"What price do you put on roads, lakes, tennis – at some point we'd have to double," said **Ed Nuti**. He continued, "It's difficult to know. I am worried about roads and costs of repaving them."

Denny Galford said "I don't have enough facts. I wouldn't want to say a blunt no or definite yes." He continued, "We can't stop growth. Maybe we could negotiate, but I don't have enough information right now to say."

Gary Caulk responded, "I'm against anyone using our amenities. If you want to use Seven Lakes amenities, buy a house in Seven Lakes!"

Michael Florence said that there have been a lot of developments proposed that have stalled because the national economy. "If we were approached, we should have a community vote," said Florence. "We'd have to have a large [initial] sum based on the total number of houses. They'd have to pay

full membership dues and if they built their own amenities, we'd have an agreement for shared use of their amenities."

Steve Hudson said, "I agree with Gary — if you want to use our amenities buy in Seven Lakes. If you [development] want amenities, build your own."

Question: The appearance of the community is a concern. What are your top three priorities for improving it?"

Ron Erskine suggested that the Community Standards Committee should not be chaired by the board. "Let them have input and the board can sit in on the meetings," said Erskine. "There's an awful lot that can be done. Perhaps the younger set and renters are not paying as much attention. We need to get trailers out of our driveways."

"There's a lot to fix up," said **Gary Caulk**. "The guard gates and huts need to be refurbished. The office was remodeled in the late 80s." He continued, "I want the guardhouses to look nice. We've been slack in past few years and community buildings need a fresh coat of paint."

Steve Hudson said a priority is to remove boat trailers and utility trailers parked in driveways and next to houses.

Sally Kindsvatter said appearance is the job of the Community Standards Committee. "I've been on this committee myself and I know it's difficult to get compliance." She also responded that the question made her look to the old driving range, "What a gorgeous piece of land this could be if made a park. It may be years before the lawsuit is settled. We could look to have volunteers fix it up and make it pretty now."

Denny Galford said the community needs a ten-year plan

to balance work on the roads and dams. "The first impression to Seven Lakes is Dogwood, Galford said, "and both it and Hastings need some work."

"With the lakes, the board should review committee suggestions and make a decision." He said community standards should be enforced.

Michael Florence suggested that a coating that will be used to resurface the pool deck is an attractive update. "If the cost is not too bad, I'd do the mailrooms and guardhouses too." Florence said a major concern for his family was the con-

dition of the community's picnic shelters. "There are multicolored graffiti-covered tables and loose asbestos roofing."

Florence commended the Community Standards committee for doing a good job this year with community standards.

Bud Shaver said the ARB board is doing a good job [for community appearance] and should "keep working it." Shaver said he is adamantly opposed to Erskine's suggestion of committees with responsibility but no authority, and board member's with authority but no committee responsibilities.

Ed Nuti cited the roads as an priority appearance issue. "The shoulders need attention. The North Clubhouse needs a paint job – the facility could be rejuvenated."

If you live in Seven Lakes, it's vitally important that you vote on or before Annual Meeting Day, March 16.

This is the final issue of The Seven Lakes Times before the Annual Meetings, when both Landowners Associations will choose new members for their Boards of Directors.

We have printed interviews with the candidates on both sides of NC Highway 211 and covered both Candidates' Nights — including a report on the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Candidates' Night you will find on page 16. And we have carried dozens of letters recommending one candidate or another.

Now it's your turn.

Your vote — whatever side of town you live on — is particularly important this year. SLLA Candidate Bud Shaver has said this may be the most important election in the history of Seven Lakes North and South.

He may be right, though there have been some critical elections in the past — including one in the late 1980s when a slate of petition candidates wrested control of the SLLA from the sitting Board.

This year's SLLA Board of Directors has found itself wracked by internal disagreements, partisan struggles, and personal attacks. The community is clearly fed up with Board politics. The resignation of Director Laura Douglass means the election will very likely fill four seats on the Board — a majority of its members.

That means your vote, if you're an SLLA member, could profoundly shape the future of your community.

Things are more peaceful on the other side of NC Highway 211, but the election is no less important. The Seven Lakes West Landowners Association faces the task of repairing the Lake Auman Dam — and figuring out how to replenish the Association's reserve funds once the work is done.

There are other important decisions on the horizon for Westsiders — what to do about mail deliverv: the future of the mailhouse and front gate area; how to plan and pay for road repaving; how to address security issues — it's a long and important list.

So, if you were thinking of sitting out this election, you may live to regret that decision and you'll surely have no right to complain if the decisions made in the next couple of years don't go your way.

Bill Buckley's legacy: Talking shouting heads

William F. Buckley died last week. The paeans to his memory that filled the airwaves and newspapers credited him with being the intellectual father of modern American Conservatism.

Buckley was conservative when conservative wasn't cool, and the power of his intellect and sharpness of his wit — not to mention the conservative journal he founded, *The National Review*, helped carve out a space in the collective consciousness in which the nascent American Conservative Movement could flourish.

Because of Buckley, the commentators told us, we ultimately elected Ronald Reagan president and sent Newt Gingrich and his conservative revolutionaries to seize control of Congress — and the world has never been the same

I'm more interested in something else Buckley gave us.

If you paid attention to all those tributes, you might have caught an audio or video clip of a shouting

debates that aired during the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

Vidal called Buckley "a Crypto-Nazi," prompting Buckley to make a derogatory reference to

Vidal's sexual orientation and

threaten to "sock" him in the face.

Both men were shouting; Buckley appeared to have lost his temper.

The feud carried on in the pages of magazines and ultimately wound up in a pair of libel suits. Both were dismissed, but Vidal wound up paying Buckley's legal expenses.

It was not the intellectual high point of that series of debates. But it was great TV — a fact not lost on television producers.

The panel political show had already been invented — Buckley was already hosting a show called Firing Line, but that was PBS, and Buckley was well-mannered.

The nasty exchange with Vidal was something else — like WWF Raw, but without the burly men in spandex and with a veneer of intellectual respectability.

And now, 40 years later, we have access to 24-hour-a-day shouting matches between supposedly well-informed, and definitely quick-witted, pundits. Bill O'Reilly, Ann Coulter, Hannity and Colmes — if you have cable or satellite TV, you probably know the list better than I do.

Whatever the value of Bill Buckley's contributions to the revival of American Conservatism, one has to question whether this endless parade of shouting matches has done much to improve the quality of public debate in the country.

Good television, as Buckley and Vidal proved, requires more shouting than listening, more conflict than compromise, more stubbornness than openness.

Unfortunately, good government requires just the opposite: more listening, more compromise, and more openness.

Buckley's intentional contribution to American politics was undeniably important and useful. His unintentional contribution to the evolution of televised political debate was, unfortunately, more of a mixed blessing.



to be neither a an amendment to the Bylaws nor a new Rule or Regulation. Moving approval of the policy, Director Nuti called it "a guidance instrument for this Board," and suggested that a new section of the Green Book might be needed to hold Board Policies.

Truesdell said, if the new policy were approved, he would like to "run it by" the Board's attorneys Hunter Stovall and Henry Jones. Treasurer Hudson argued that the opinion of one attorney should be sufficient. In the end, the policy was approved and Truesdell was authorized to obtain an opinion from Stovall on it.

Expense reimbursements

Florence also proposed a new policy for Director and staff expense reimbursements — again in the wake of Treasurer Hudson's criticisms of reimbursements — including some for meals — sought by Truesdell and Community Manager Dalton Fulcher

Noting that there has been "no pattern of abuse," Nuti said the proposed policy "may be overkill."

Florence said members of a volunteer board should expect to dig into their own pockets for some incidentals. "I never thought a meal expense would come up," he said.

Truesdell said he had spent over \$700 on paper, ink cartridges, binders, and office supplies since joining the Board. "I think we should scrutinize directors' expenses," Truesdell said. "If we see an abuse, we should reprimand, and it should be repaid."

Hudson then said he wanted to offer an amendment to the proposed policy: that "no expenses be paid whatsoever. I don't want my dues paying for any meals. If you don't have the money to pay for it, get off the Board. There's no excuse for it, period. We should do away with the whole thing."

Other directors expressed general support for the policy, though Director Douglass said the language could be "tightened up."

Nuti suggested any decision on the policy be deferred to the incoming Board. Then Bud Saver, a candidate in upcoming Board elections, suggested that Community Manager Fulcher be charged with purchasing office supplies for use by Directors.

Director Stephan a made a motion to adopt Shaver's suggestion as policy and that motion was approved unanimously.

Rules of conduct

Director Nuti attempted to gain approval for a draft set of rules of conduct for Board members that he has been circulating for over the past several weeks.

"We owe this communty a lot of explanation for our conduct over the past several months," Nuti said. "As we meet for the last time, maybe we can agree on something going forward. This is a good faith effort we are making for the community."

But he found little support among his fellow directors. Among the rules Nuti proposed was one that would require a Director who sues the Association to resign. Given that Hudson remains a named Plaintiff in a suit against the SLLA, Truesdell argued, consideration of the proposed rules should be tabled until that suit is resolved.

After further discussion, Director Stephan moved to table the proposal until after the election. That motion was approved with only Nuti opposed.

Drainage policy

On a motion by Director Stephan, the Board voted to abandon a drainage policy adopted in 1990 that assigned to the the Association responsibility for dealing with stormwater runoff diverted from roads and other common areas onto private property.

The policy was adopted when repaving and the installation of berms and curbs along SLLA roadways in the late 1980s altered the flow of stormwater. The policy came to the Board's attention after objections were raised to an Association-funded drainage project on a privately-owned lot on Devonshire Avenue.

Stephan argued that "North Carolina is a caveat emptor state," and that the price paid for lots generally reflected any existing drainage problems.

Dam Engineer

Board members dissuaded President Truesdell from filing a complaint against SLLA dam engineer John Eddy with the state Board of Engineering Examiners.

Truesdell said that Eddy had sent a letter informing the association that he would be unable to provide engineering services for the maintenance and remediation he recommended in a comprehensive report prepared on the Association's dams.

"Eddy has breached his ethical obligation to us," Truesdell said, noting that the Association will have to find a new dam engineer and pay the cost of bringing him up to speed on the state of the community's dams. Truesdell said Eddy, who was paid \$15,000 for his analysis of the dams, should reimburse the Association for the cost of bringing on a new consulting engineer.

"I would never recommend that we hire a solo practitioner again," he added, alluding to the fact that Eddy is an independent professional rather than a member of a large engineering firm.

When he polled Board members for their reaction to his desire to file a coplaint against Eddy, Truesdell met with some resistance.

"We need to look at the actual agreement," Treasurer Hudson said. "From what I can hear so far, he's delivered what he was obligated to do."

Director Stephan said she would need more time to study the matter.

"My first concern would be that I don't know how large the pool of dam engineers is," Director Douglass said. "I don't want to burn bridges with one and then get a reputation that won't let us find a replacement." She added that she would prefer to hear the recommendation of the Lakes and Dams Committee before moving ahead with any complaint.

Lakes and Dams Committee Chairman Ron Erskine acknowledged that Eddy "has had trouble meeting our dates, but the dates given him were arbitrary....We would be making a terrible mistake to go after him...

.Let's cool off a little bit, slow down a little bit."

Other business:

In other business:

- Heard from Community Manager Fulcher that a question had arisen about exactly what the definition of an "owneroccupant" is in the SLLA Bylaws. Only "owner-occupants" are allowed to vote for members of the Board of Directors. This restriction becomes a matter of interpretation where part-time residents are concerned. Fulcher said the incoming Board needs to better define "owner-occupant," so that the office staff is not called on to make judgement calls on the issue at election time.



Board members discussed concerns raised by the proposed development, including demands on the county water system, increased traffic, pressure on the schools, and the possibility of odor from an on-site wastewater treatment plant proposed for the development.

Boundary was created to identify areas where Urban Services [sewer and water] could be provided over the next ten to fifteen years and would promote growth within those boundaries and away from prime agricultural lands and open areas. Southwick is proposed as an age-restricted retirement subdivision.

Northington, the portion of the tract north of Holly Grove School Road currently zoned Rural Agricultural [RA], is proposed as an unrestricted development and would include an on-site tertiary sewage treatment plant. Both subdivision developments include single family homes and multi-unit townhouses; neither will be gated communities.

The project was originally proposed prior to last year's de facto subdivision moratorium in Small Area Planning Area A, before the county adopted new zoning and subdivision ordinances. Beardslee explained, "I had the pleasure of working with the planning staff to develop the new code. These two projects are exactly what they are looking for -- they exceed the criteria set and accomplish their goals."

Acknowledging that buffering and transition from Seven Lakes North would be a critical planning concern, Beardslee's plan positions the closest multi-family unit two hundred feet from the Seven Lakes North boundary. The pro-

posed density is 2.5 units per acre -- slightly higher than Seven Lakes' density of two units per acre. Slightly over fifty percent of the project's acreage — 66.5 acres — will remain in open space.

The project is surrounded by fifty foot and seventy-five foot edge buffers with 16.7 acres defined as Primary Open Space, 44.6 acres as Secondary Open Space, and 4.4 acres as Tertiary Open Space.

Beardslee believes Southwick and Northington will address a lack of entry level housing for first time homebuyers and smaller, affordable housing for senior citizens in the immediate Seven Lakes area. "From a marketing standpoint, we tried to develop diversification within the marketing for any given target group," said Beardslee.

During its Thursday, March 6 meeting, the Planning Board will consider Beardslee's request to have the property rezoned to PUD. The Planning Board is charged with making a recommendation to the Board of Commissioners, who have final authority to approve or disapprove the request.

Thursday's meeting is open to the public and will be held on the second floor of the Historic Courthouse in Carthage, beginning at 6:00 pm. The public will have an opportunity during the meeting to provide input on Beardslee's rezoning request.

Letter from SLLA/SLCC Attorney to Williams

[The following letter, dated February 29, is a communication from M. Robin Davis of Cranfill Sumner & Hartzog - an attornev representing the Seven Lakes Landowners Association and the Seven Lakes Country Club in the driving range lawsuit to Clawson Williams, Esq. the Attonery representing Alan Shaw and his co-plaintiffs in the case. The letter and supporting material was provided to The Times by SLLA President Don Truesdell, who asked that we publish the full text of the letter.]

Dear Clawson:

We write regarding some serious concerns we have regarding your continuation of the pending lawsuit given what appear to be direct contradictions between the legal position and testimony which has been given in the current case and the position taken and prior sworn testimony of both your client, David Alan Shaw, and you in a prior

Specifically, the Plaintiffs in this case seek to prevent the sale and development of the property known as the "old driving range property" based on the premise that the old driving range property "was never intended for residential use or development and has at all times since the recordation of the subdivision plats been shown as part of the open areas protected by the Restrictive Covenants of the subdivision as undeveloped, green area for the protection and enjoyment of the residential lot owners." [Complaint ¶ 13]

In his deposition taken in the present case, the lead Plaintiff Mr. Shaw testified that this assertion is based on three factual prem-



As you must surely be aware, on April 9, 1987, during the bankruptcy proceedings of the developer of Seven Lakes South, the Honorable Rufus Reynolds presided over a hearing concerning the sale of property labeled on the recorded plats as "Property of Peter V. Tufts & Assoc." to the Seven Lakes Country Club . During the course of this hearing, the Affidavit of David Alan Shaw was received into evidence. In addition, the court heard testimony from you as the former attorney to Fred Lawrence, one of the original developers of Seven Lakes South.

The Affidavit of Mr. Shaw and the other testimony at this hearing (including your testimony) contradict the testimony given and positions taken in this case and confirm that the allegations contained in the current Complaint are not well grounded in fact or existing law.

Mr. Shaw made the following statements in his 1987 affidavit regarding property labelled "Property of Peter V. Tufts & Assoc." on the original plats:

- "The area east of the clubhouse building and north of the platted lots ... was never intended for use as part of the golf course except to the extent specified herein regarding the driving range."
- "The 11.07 acres described above was undeveloped land set aside for future development, and except to the extent that it was once considered to be used as a driving range, it was anticipated that it would primarily be used for residential purposes. At the time that the land was being considered for use as a driving range, it was anticipated that what is now the existing driving range would no longer be used as a driving range but would become available for future development for residential purposes."

Further, you testified at the April 9, 1987 hearing that the 11.07 acres, plus the clubhouse, is shown on the recorded plat as "Property of Peter V. Tufts & Associates." You also testified as Mr. Lawrence's former attorney concerning the developer's

authority to determine the use of this property in response to a series of questions by the court. This particular exchange was as follows:

The Court: Mr. Fred Lawrence was supposedly the owner, manager, [he] did like he darned well pleased, is that right? He could divide up whatever he wanted?

Clawson Williams: "That's a pretty good statement of it, Your Honor.

The Court: "He divided it any way he wanted to?"

Clawson Williams: "Well, Longleaf, which was under his direction when he was president - and he was president until the last year or two that Longleaf was in business. And during that period of time Mr. Alan Shaw was the president. But Longleaf was the developer, and Fred was the head knocker of Longleaf, yes, sir.

The Court: Okay.

Clawson Williams: --- this property belonged to the Peter V. Tufts Partnership of which Longleaf was a part."

Even if you were not aware previously, you now have actual notice of the existence of sworn testimony by Alan Shaw and others which directly contradicts the factual assertions on which the current case is premised.

As you are aware, Rule 11 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure provides that sanctions may be awarded where a pleading, including a Complaint, motion or other paper is signed without a factual or legal basis or for an improper purpose. If a pleading, motion, or other paper is signed in violation of Rule 11, the court shall impose upon the person who signed it an appropriate sanction, which may include an order to pay to the other party or parties the amount of the reasonable expenses incurred because of the filing of the pleading motion or other paper, including a reasonable attorney's fee.

On a motion for Rule 11 sanctions, the court will analyze the factual sufficiency of the Complaint to determine 1) whether the plaintiffs undertook a reasonable inquiry into the facts and 2) whether the plaintiffs, after reviewing the results of the inquiry, reasonably believed that their position was well grounded in fact. Static Control Components, Inc. v. Vogler, 152 N.C. App. 599, 568 S.E.2d 305 (2002). In this case, the Complaint was verified by all of the plaintiffs, including Mr.

Shaw, and was signed by you as counsel for the Plaintiffs. Under the circumstances presented, we do not believe that the plaintiffs can argue in good faith that the facts alleged in the Complaint are factually sufficient or that a reasonable inquiry was made into the facts as required by Rule 11.

Please be advised that Seven Lakes Country Club and Seven Lakes Landowner's Association

will have no alternative to bring this matter to the attention of the Court unless this case is dismissed with prejudice and the Notice of Lis Pendens is removed from all property owned by the Seven Lakes Country Club so that the members of the club can use this property as they see fit. But, twenty-one years ago, in a sworn affadavit, Shaw stated: "...it was anticipated that what is now the existing driving range would no longer be used as a driving range but would become available for future development for residential purposes."

In a February 29 letter to the Plaintiffs' attorney Clawson Williams, Robin Davis, one of the attorneys representing the Club and the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA], calls attention to the apparent contradiction and says it confirms that "the allegations contained in the current Complaint are not well grounded in fact or existing law."

Even if Shaw has forgotten his 20-year-old testimony, Davis suggests, her letter puts him on notice of the contradiction. If the Plaintiffs do not move to have the case dismissed "with prejudice" (meaning it cannot be refiled), Davis says, the Defendants will bring the matter to the attention of the court and ask that it impose sanctions on the Plaintiffs — in other words, require that the plaintiffs pay all or part of the Defendants' legal expenses.

"Under the circumstances presented," Davis writes, "we do not believe that the plaintiffs can argue in good faith that the facts alleged in the Complaint are factually sufficient or that a reasonable inquiry was made into the the facts as required by Rule 11." Rule 11 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure provides for sanctions when a suit is filed that is not well grounded in fact or warranted by existing law.

Davis' letter to Williams, along with supporting documentation, was provided to The Times by SLLA President Don Truesdell [See page 32 for the full text of Davis' letter.]. Truesdell and Director Randy Zielsdorf, who serve as the ad hoc litigation committee in the matter, provided an update on the suit which appears on page 37. The Club is making no public statement about these recent developments in the suit, though SLCC General Manager Mike Spayd told The Times the Club's membership would be updated.

Contacted by *The Times* for comment, Shaw provided a written response, which may be

found on page 36. He says that, "When taken in context, I do not believe my statements to be contradictory."

Shaw alleges that the affidavit was prepared by Don Billings, who emerged from the bankruptcy proceedings as Seven Lakes' developer, and signed by Shaw in haste just before he departed for a trip to The Masters golf tournament.

He further argues that the affidavit does not undermine the Plaintiffs' claim that Southside Developer Peter V. Tufts and Associates had the sole right to waive covenants on property in Seven Lakes South — a right which did not pass to that company's successors.

Shaw's affidavit

The nearly 21-year-old affidavit by Shaw that Davis uncovered was filed on April 8, 1987, in connection with the bankruptcy of several Seven Lakes development companies. The question at hand was what should be done with a forty-acre parcel that lay to the east of the SLCC Clubhouse — and, more particularly, with an eleven-acre chunk of that land — a proper-

ty that, coincidentally, is now being used for the Club's new driving range.

As a former President of Longleaf, Inc., the company that originally developed Seven Lakes, and a partner in Southside developer Peter V. Tufts Partnership, Shaw was in a position to know about developer intentions.

In the affidavit, after noting that he has no interest in the proceedings, Shaw says he has "first-hand knowledge" and says the affidavit "is intended as a statement of facts as I recollect them."

The forty acres, Shaw testifies, "was never intended for use as part of the golf course, except to the extent specified herein regarding the driving range."

The 11-acre portion, he goes on to say, "was undeveloped land set aside for future development, and except to the extent that it was once considered to be used as a driving range, it was anticipated that it would be primarily used for residential purposes. At the time that the land was being considered for use as a driving range, it was anticipated that what is now the existing driving range would no longer

be used as a driving range but would become available for future development for residential purposes."

Shaw's affidavit was entered as evidence during the bankruptcy hearing before Judge Rufus Reyonlds on April 9, 1987.





Shaw responds to apparent contradiction

[When contacted by The Times for comment on the apparent contradiction between a 21-year-old affidavit and his more recent deposition regarding the prospect for residential development of the old Seven Lakes Country Club driving range, Alan Shaw provided the following statement.]

Mr. Truesdell and Mr. Weber today released to The Times information they say is contained in an affidavit that I supplied to the Bankruptcy Court in 1987. I have seen a summary provided by them and one page without my signature of a document that they say is the affidavit. The information they have provided me says in part, that I said it was anticipated that the old range would become available for future development for residential purposes if Peter V. Tufts and Associates had developed the property adjacent to the Clubhouse on the eastern side into a driving range. Truesdell and Weber are saying that my affidavit in 1987 is in conflict with my position stated in a recent deposition regarding the current lawsuit attempting to block the development of the old range. When taken in context, I do not believe my statements to be contradictory.

I only vaguely remember the affidavit that was made 21 years ago. The issue facing the bankruptcy court was should the area to the left of the Country Club Clubhouse be part of the sale to the membership or should it be deeded to the new developer. I believe that I was asked to sign an affidavit that the new developer prepared as I was leaving

town on a trip to the Masters.

There were restrictive covenants in place that remain in place today that prevented the subdivision of the old driving range unless Peter V. Tufts and Associates waived the restrictive covenants. It is my opinion that only the original developer, Peter V. Tufts and Associates has ever had the authority to

to develop the old driving range as lots. Nor did it say that we did not make representations that the old driving range would be open space. We never made plans to develop the old driving range and we made promises that it would remain open space. We have recently learned that the representations we

made that it would be open space would have prevented the old driving range's subdivision even if we had wanted to sub-

divide it, which we did not. As is obvious now, a range east of the clubhouse would not work and that was our decision prior to 1980.

I do not believe that the property east of the Country Club Clubhouse was discussed in the recent deposition other than that the CC was building a new range on the property. That property was also subject to restric-

tive covenants of record that only Peter V. Tufts and Associates could waive. The covenants on this as well as the original driving range property provided that before the property was sold it could be divided so long as no lot originally shown on any recorded plat be reduced by more than twenty per cent from its original size. The facts are that the property was sold by Peter V Tufts and Associates in 1983 and was never subdivided during the time period that it could legally be done by Peter V. Tufts and Associates. The only company with that legal authority, Peter V. Tufts and Associates, did not waive the covenants.


If concluded that I have been contradictory 23 years apart, it was not intentional. The development plans and maps for the South Side took months to prepare and showed a plan to leave the old driving range area open just as was done on the North Side to the right and left of the entry gate. There was never serious discussion that involved development of the old driving range property.

The design engineer for Seven Lakes has confirmed, in an affidavit that Truesdell has in his possession, that the old driving range was intended as open area.

The issue is simple. Can the existing driving range be legally developed into high-density housing development? I believe that the answer is that it cannot be. The Country Club and the Seven Lakes Landowners Association obviously would rather not find out the answer to that question in court. They seem to be attempting to try the case in the newspaper.

I believe the development of the old range will hurt all of our property values. I believe that strongly enough to spend money fighting the issue to a legal conclusion without any way to recover the funds spent other than through retention of property value. All you need to do is ride by the new driving range and you will see how misleading a pretty conceptual drawing can be.

The statement that the Country Club and Seven Lakes Landowners have released regarding my affidavit is a political hack job and should ultimately have little impact on the legal question that needs to be decided. Mr. Truesdell and Mr. Weber should be ashamed that they too do not want to hear a judge declare what is legal.

Though Davis does not reference Graham's testimony in her letter to Williams, the surveyor does express much the same opinion found in Shaw's affadavit.

Asked about the 11-acre parcel that lies inside the curve of Devonshire Avenue, Graham testified that it was considered for use as a driving range and even cleared at one point in preparation for that use.

Asked what the plan at the time was for the existing five-acre driving range, Graham testified: "They were planning to basically do away with it, probably make it residential lots. That's what they were working with at the time.'

Williams' Testimony

Attorney Clawson Williams was present to testify during the

1987 bankruptcy proceedings. His testimony does not touch directly on any intentions that the developers may have had regarding the old driving range, but SLLA/SLCC Attorney Davis believes it undermines another of the Plaintiffs' contentions.

According to Davis, Shaw argued in his February deposition that the recorded plats reserve space labeled as "Property of Peter V. Tufts and Associates" as open space which could never be subdivided once the plats were recorded and the first lot was sold.

But Williams, testifying in 1987, suggested that original developer Fred Lawrence acted with considerable freedom with regard to subdivision of property within the development.

Referring to Lawrence, Judge Rufus Reynolds asked Attorney Williams: "He did darned well as he pleased, is that right? He could divide up whatever he wanted?"

"That's a pretty good statement of it, Your Honor," Williams replied.

Next steps

The parties to the suit were scheduled to attend a courtordered mediation session on Monday, March 3.

According to SLLA Directors Truesdell and Zielsdorf, Shaw was the only plaintiff who attended what was evidently a very brief session.

There is no indication in Shaw's statement that the Plaintiffs intend to withdraw from the case in response to the revelations or the threat of sanctions contained in Davis' letter.

The case is scheduled for a hearing in April.

UNDERSTANDING ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE (APR)

Several years ago the U.S. Congress decided consumers needed protection from lenders and it wrote into law the Truth in Lending Act. Through it, the annual percentage rate (APR) became a benchmark enabling you to compare one lender's offering to another.

At the heart of the legislation is a requirement that lenders state all costs involved in making the loan and amortize them over the term of the loan. In addition to the interest you pay on the loan, the APR includes an origination fee, dis-

count points and any other loan-related fees that might exist. Remember, however, that the APR does not include settlement-related costs such as attorney fees, title insurance, recording taxes, property survey, and so on. The APR is the effective interest rate you would be paying if you spread the loan-related costs over the life of your loan.

Despite Congress' good intentions, the APR for a mortgage loan typically is calculated and disclosed to you after you have picked your

lender and made a loan application.

For the borrower this timing is not exactly optimum! Consequently, if you want to compare costs from one lender to another beforehand, you should ask prospective lenders to give you a Good Faith Estimate of Settlement costs (GFE).
