Building vote splits board

In a contentious 3-2 vote, Moore County's Board of Commissioners decided Monday night that a new county administration building will be located on the 21-acre "Grimm Property" in downtown Carthage, a site that will also be used for a new jail and public safety build-

ina

The vote came late in the lengthy July 20 regular meeting of the Board, on a motion by Commissioner Jimmy Melton, seconded by Commissioner Larry Caddell and supported by Chairman Nick Picerno.

Commissioner Tim Lea reacted strongly to Melton's motion: "You can sit here and put your

head in the sand and act like that somewhere down the road, if we increase the need to have a detention center that can house up to 500 or 550 prisoners, that we're not going to need to have a court system that can process that kind of flow. Or we can look at it through realistic commonsense eyes and take the politics

Reward offered in Auman boat theft

The Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] is offering a reward of \$1,400 or more for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those who stole Paul Parks pontoon boat late Tuesday Night, July 14, and rammed it into Joseph Mike's bulkhead [See related story on page 3.]

The Board of Directors approved the reward in a special emergency meeting held on Monday morning, July 20. President Ron Shepard opened the discussion with two suggested responses to the incident: offering a reward to help identify the

perpetrators and reinstituting a program of hiring off-duty Sheriff's officers to patrol the community on a part-time basis.

On a motion from Director Ed Silberhorn, the Board committed \$1,000 in Association resources to a reward fund; later in the meeting, four landowners each committed another \$100 to swell the pot. Additional contributions are welcome and may be made by contacting the Westside landowners office.

The Board on Monday also approved using a portion of the Security budget allocated for a Compliance/Security officer to hire off-duty Sheriff's officers to (See "Reward," p. 24)

Dam repair cost exceeds \$500,000

An additional ten thousand square feet of slurry required to complete repairs at Lake Auman Dam increased the total cost of the project by \$68,175, Director Mick Herdrich reported during the Tuesday, July 14 Work Session of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] Board of Directors. That total included a negotiated reduction of \$6,600 in equipment costs.

"The slurry wall was a lot longer and deeper than antici-

pated," Herdich said.

The Board of Directors unanimously approved the additional expense using monies drawn from the Association's Contingency Fund.

The slurry wall is a 1,300 foot barrier that will prevent water from passing through the upper portion of the dam. Stretching across the middle of the earthen structure, the average wall depth is twenty-two feet, but it drops down as low as forty feet in one section.

Anticipated repairs to the dam (See "Westside," p. 22)

SFC Clint Mack of the 82nd Airborne, the son-in-law of Kiwanis members Sammy and Becky Gilmore, and now stationedat Ft. Bragg, spoke to the Club about Afghanistan and his experiences while on duty there.

After showing a short video of actual military operations in Afghanistan, Sgt. Mack proceeded to give a short history of the country, its people and its politics. Its history has been fraught with warfare for many centuries, both from within (tribal warfare) and from many external sources.

These conflicts have substantially reduced the ability of the country to govern and sustain itself. Although water is plentiful, there is very little running water, and most water comes from wells. 80% of its GPA is from opium while the country meets only 30-40% of its food needs.

Sgt. Mack outlined the political turmoil since the Soviets took charge in 1978, their defeat in 1987, and the series of events that led to the rise of the Taliban and its couterinsugency efforts. The Taliban, its religious fanaticism, and desire to rid the Country of all infidels is what the US are fighting there now. Unfortunately, the struggle has fallen into the same pattern as we have been facing in Iraq, namely hit and run warfare using IED's and suicide attacks on both the native population as well as the opposing military. Finding the enemy is the toughest job. Once found, rooting them out is easier and almost 100% successful.

Today's fight is two-fold, both portions important. We must continue to destroy the attempts by the Taliban to rule the Country while successfully winning the minds and hearts of the general population. Sgt. Mack feels that progress is being made in both areas, albeit painfully slow.

Americans need to be supportive of the efforts going on there and trust that the counter insurgency will be conquered, and that the people will overcome their historical tribal differences and develop a strong national government that will develop the country for its natives, and reject the outside influences of forces like Al Queda.

Detective expects arrests in boat theft

The Moore County Sheriff's Office is investigating the theft of a pontoon boat on Lake Auman that resulted in significant property damage, an incident that prompted the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] to offer a reward of \$1,400 or more for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the perpetrators. [See related story on page 1.]

Moore County Sheriff's investigator Detective Kip Dennis told *The Times* on Tuesday that the incident involved serious crimes, including felony larceny. He also said he is optimistic about being able to make arrests in the case.

According to an incident report filed by Sheriff's Officer Jonathan Cole, he and Detective Joshua Craven were called to the Paul Parks residence at 151 Baker Circle early on the morning of Wednesday, July 15, on a complaint of a stolen pontoon boat. Parks told the officers that his boat had been moored to his

pier the previous night, but was missing on Wednesday morning.

While interviewing Mr. Parks, the officers learned that Parks' boat had been found by Joseph Mike, at 143 Baker Circle, at 6:00 am that morning. With its motor still running and in gear, the boat was pressed against Mike's pier.

Mike said the operators had apparently jumped from the boat after heading it toward his bulkhead. Mike told The Times that the impact damaged both pontoons, which will require an estimated \$10,000 or more in repairs. The boat rammed Mike's bulkhead, breaking an irrigation line, causing water to undermine the structure. The action from the propeller, with the boat stuck up against the dock, also eroded sand from under the bulkhead, further undermining it. In all the landowner estimated the incident had done \$2,500 or more in damage to his bulkhead and pier.

While officers consulted with Mike, Robert Streahle of 104

Lewis Point approached in his boat. He informed the officers that he had seen something floating in the lake that morning and had gone out to retrieve it. He found "five kayaks, three paddles, eight life vests, and several tubes and floats," according to Officer Cole's report.

After being photographed, the items were taken to the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] office so they could be claimed by their owners

SLWLA personnel were able to identify the kayaks based on their registration stickers and contact the owners. Officer Cole's report indicates that one of the kayaks was claimed by Bill Reaves of 110 Douglas Drive.

President Shepard told *The Times* that this incident went well beyond petty vandalism. "My feeling was that this has escalated to some pretty serious stuff," Shepard said. "Who knows what could have happened if that boat had hit another boat or a kayaker?"

"This is really malicious stuff," Shepard added, noting that it involved substantial property damage and "could have created a life-threatening situation." The Board met in emergency session on Monday, July 20 to discuss an appropriate response.


Detective Dennis encouraged anyone with any information about the incident — no matter how seemingly insignificant — to contact him at the Moore County Sheriff's Office at 910-947-2931

"People hear things and sometimes think it wouldn't be helpful," Dennis told *The Times*. "But it can be important when you put that piece together with other things we know."

"The big thing we want to put across," he added, "is that, occasionally, [in Seven Lakes West] we run into the tendency to believe... to not want to say anything, because they don't want to give a bad impression of the area. But this kind of thing happens everywhere, and we want people to come forward regardless."



Pricetag doubles for dam monitoring system

A system designed to monitor the health of Northside dams by measuring water levels inside the structure will have a higher than expected price tag. Fulcher reported that seventeen new piezometers will cost \$29,000 -- nearly double the \$15,000 estimate, reported Community Manager Dalton Fulcher during the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Work Session on Monday, July 13.

But even with that unanticipated expense, total Lakes & Dams expenditures would still be expected to come in under budget.

When Director Gary Caulk asked why the bid for the work had come in so much higher that expected, Fulcher said the original estimate had simply been a "guesstimate" derived from information provided by the engineering firm S&ME.

The work involves drilling oneor-two-inch diameter tubes like a well — into the core of the dam at various spots, using casing where appropriate and capping off the tubes to keep them clean. This allows an electrical device to be lowered into each tube that will signal when it contacts water.

Gypsy Pooches Cause Headaches

You've probably seen them -at least most Northsiders have: two large and very friendly dogs who've adopted Seven Lakes North and particularly Sequoia

Point as their own. Unfortunately, they aren't invited guests and make a mess whenever they come.

"Over half of the loose dog complaints we receive are these same two dogs," Fulcher reported. "They come in from outside Seven Lakes. We pick them up and call Animal Control. That's all we can do."

Fulcher noted that local law enforcement had not been of much help.

"I've been threatened by the Sheriff to be put in jail for holding them. He said that we don't have the right [just] because they're inside Seven Lakes," Fulcher said. "My guess is the owner isn't paying fines. They've been to Carthage who knows how many times."

In a telephone interview with *The Times*, Al Carter of Moore County Animal Control said the officer who patrolled this section of the county was familiar with the dogs. Carter noted that the policy for impoundment of a

stray animal had been revised in December 2008 to a graduated penalty system with an additional \$25 fine per incident.

"Previously the fee was \$25, and it was just cheaper to pay it than fix the problem," Carter said. "We have reached the third incident, which is now at \$75

Phase 1 water restriction still in effect in Village

While the Village of Foxfire remains under Phase 1 water restrictions, a new well scheduled for mid-July connection to the Foxfire Water Department will raise yields from 155 gallons to 197 gallons per minute.

"Phase 1 is rather lenient but we will stay with it because our wells are up one to two feet over last year," Councilman Ed Lauer reported during the Village Council Meeting on Tuesday, July 14.

Under Phase 1 Mandatory Water Conservation Restrictions, spray irrigation is permitted between midnight and 10:00 am at properties with odd numbered addresses on Mondays and Thursdays, and properties with even numbered addresses on Tuesdays and Fridays. Watering by hand is permitted between 6:00 and 10:00 am and pm for odd addresses on Tuesdays and Saturdays, and even addresses on Wednesdays and Sundays.

Watering by low volume drip irrigation is permitted at any time. Residents are prohibited from washing vehicles or exterior building surfaces and decks except on Saturdays and Sundays.

Long Range Planning

Councilwoman Leslie Frusco requested the Long Range Planning Committee be revitalized to begin work on a new five to ten-year plan. She recommended

membership include residents from the East and West Side, and at least one member from the Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction and Stonehill Pines.

"The Committee can bring things to the Council in regards



to long term planning for facilities, streets, personnel, and management. If we don't start planning we'll find ourselves growing without any appropriate guidance," said Frusco. "Now is the time to begin looking at the process."

Mayor George Erickson agreed. Serving as the most recent chair of the LRP, he said the last project was a survey of the community in 2003 which brought about the original PARTF grant to create the Village Green

Finance

As of June 30, the General Fund was \$455,729, Frusco reported. The cash balance includes \$28,872 in Powell Bill funds for road maintenance and \$22,203 in a reserve account for Stonehill Pines. With a balance of \$268,404, the Water Fund includes \$135,180 held in escrow for a new well. Uncollected property taxes were \$31,359.

Streets

Brook Vickery of Foxfire Resort & Golf Club was thanked for his work establishing a connection from the course's irrigation system to the East Side entrance plantings. Irrigation is scheduled for two hours every third day beginning at 12:30 am.

Councilman Vic Koos also reported that trees and brush will be cleared from the 60' rightof-way along Village roads.

Parks

The Village Green Park shelter pavilion ceiling, support posts, flooring, and tables were cleaned and treated with a six-year stain preservative, reported Koos.

The North Carolina Parks and Recreation Trust Fund grant meeting is scheduled for Friday, July 24. However, Mayor George Erickson said the fund will be substantially lower because of the reduced number of statewide real estate transactions.

Wireless Service Agreement

The Council renewed a fourvear service agreement with Broadlink Wireless Inc. to host the Village's web domain, supply email accounts, and maintain the office computer network and equipment. The service also provides high speed wireless

service to the community and is installing internet access at the park and pool recreation areas.

Other Items

Zoning Administrator Mimi Ainsworth reported plans for a single family residence on Oak Hill Drive were received. The Appearance Committee would also be considering requests for an accessory building, and a dog run in the Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction [ETJ].

Erickson reported the Woodland Circle Extension project is on schedule.

The Council unanimously resolved to join the Triangle J Council of Governments. Representing a seven county region of North Carolina, the Council addresses regional issues of concern to local governments and municipalities



Commissioners get first look at jail design

The Moore County Commissioners got their first look Monday night at the layout and appearance of the new jail and public safety facility, presented by Pete Cayado of Ware Bonsall Architects, who presented the design during the Board's July 20 meeting. The 192-bed detention center is a two-story, V-shaped structure, with a guard command center located at the bottom of the V on each floor. Cells for the housing of inmates are arranged along both legs of the V, with each story containing two levels of cells, one atop the other. The upper, mezzanine level, in each story has a catwalk running in front of the cells. The structure includes individual cells, two-person cells, and two thirty-person dormitories. It will be connected to both the jail and the new public safety build-

Between the detention center and the public safety building the architects have located a medical and food service core of sufficient size to serve up to 550 inmates, in order to accommodate future expansion of the jail by building an additional two-or-three-story housing facility.

The basement of the threestory public safety building includes the 9-1-1 communications center, administrative offices, and emergency operations center, areas for evidence processing and storage, break rooms, locker rooms, and physical training rooms for the sheriff's department and other emergency personnel.

The first floor includes the Sheriff's office duty desk, video visitation facilities, intake, booking, inmate processing, detention administration, and a magistrate's office and hearing room. This floor includes the secure corridor that connects the public safety building to the new jail.

The top floor includes all the adminstrative offices and work space for detectives, narcotics, civil process, and other Sheriff's office functions.

The building is designed with a corridor for use by the public on one side that significantly restricts access to the interior offices and a separate staff corridor on the other side. Once Cayado had finished his presentation, Commissioner Lea asked why the design had been presented to the Commissioners before being shown to the Major Capital Projects Task Force, which was charged with devel-

oping the parameters for the facility.

Lea said minutes from earlier Board meetings would show that the Commissioners had envisioned a facility that could ultimately be built out to 700 or 800 beds, but the design presented was now limited to 550 beds. "It's interesting how the data continues to be very fluid," he said, and asked that the design be forwarded to the Major Capital Projects Task Force for

review

Commissioner Caddell noted that Moore County is 200 years old and has thus far been able to get by with a 109-bed jail. "We'll all be long gone before we

Purser declines pay hike

At the request of Superintendent Dr. Susan Purser, the Moore County Board of Education amended her employment contract to eliminate the automatic \$2,500 salary increase she was due for the 2009-2010 school year.

"We really appreciate her sensitivity to this issue and I am very sorry," Member Sue Black said while making the motion. "This has been a difficult year and she absolutely deserves the money."

Bond Project Update

Construction and school improvement projects are moving forward using funding from the \$54 million school bond referendum approved in 2007, reported Deputy Superintendent Dr. Larry Upchurch.

Site work, a foundation, and block walls are in progress and on schedule at West Pine Elementary, which sits adjacent to West Pine Middle School. Also under construction, Crane's Creek Middle School near Carthage is ahead of schedule and under budget, reported Upchurch.

A water project at Highfalls Elementary and a water and sewer project at Westmoore Elementary are both awaiting final approval from the State.

Classroom additions and renovations at Highfalls Elementary, Robbins Elementary, Sandhills Farm Life Elementary, and Westmoore Elementary are also underway. Stadium field replacement is nearing completion at North Moore and Union Pines High Schools with additional spectator seating in place at all middle and high schools.

School Calendars

New full-color academic calendars will be distributed to all Moore County students thanks to a joint project with FirstHealth and funding from the Moore Health Childhood Obesity Prevention Demonstration project

grant through the NC Department of Public Health. Each calendar features required school information as well as healthy eating and living tips.

Integrated Math

Dr. Beverlee Beale presented a new, integrated approach to the standard high school mathematics curriculum of Algebra I, II, and Geometry. Rather than studying each topic as an isolated course, entering freshman enrolling in Integrated Math I-IV will work on skills found in each of the four strands of high school math each year. AP Statistics or Pre Calc/AP Calculus options will be available for students who have completed Integrated Math III.

Planning Board approves TH Blue zoning

After first correcting the Moore County Zoning Ordinance to include mulch and mulching businesses under commercial applications, the Planning Board unanimously approved a rezoning request by T.H. Blue Inc. on 32.12 acres of the 967.97 acre tract at the intersection of Flowers Road and NC 211, west of Seven Lakes.

T.H. Blue has operated a mulching business on the property for over thirty years. In 1999, a 19.5 acre portion of the property was zoned Light Industrial [L-1], however, the area did not encompass the entire business

operation

As approved during the Planning Board's Thursday, July 9 meeting, approximately 3.96 percent of total property acreage is now zoned L-1 with the remaining land maintaining the current designation as Rural Agricultural [RA].

Package Store Declined

A request by Vaughn Rouse to commercially rezone a 2.62 parcel on Rt. 705 south of Robbins for the purpose of operating a drive-in alcoholic beverage package store was declined. The existing physical structure did not meet zoning setback requirements that a business must be located at least 50' from the road.

The applicant's brother, Gerald Rouse, said they will appeal.

Hazard Mitigation Plan

Planning Director Joey Raczkowski said work is progressing between the county and eleven municipalities to update the Hazard Mitigation Plan – a required document for Federal assistance in the event of a disaster. A draft will be submitted to the State by May 2010 and to FEMA in November 2010.

Master Water & Sewer Planning

In June, the Commissioners approved \$50,000 to long range planning, specifically Master Water & Sewer Planning. However, Dave Kinney expressed

concern that the lack of funding to update a master plan was also delaying the Moore County Board of Commissioners decisions on the McGill Water Study.

"It is clear to me that the Commissioners are going to approve a total county-wide package...the subject has been beat to death and I'm getting darned impatient," Kinney said.


Raczkowski agreed that limited financial resources would not allow an update to the Land Use Plan, "but we are moving in the right direction to achieving long range planning."

Other Items

Next month the Board will hear an overview of the proposed telecommunication wireless ordinances. A Public Hearing will be scheduled in September.





(Continued from front page) out of it and try to make a decision that's in the long term best interest of those that, as Com-

missioner Caddell indicated, will be here long after we're dead and gone."

Morgan questioned the safety of locating the jail and county administration building on the same site. "I believe that this vote, that you guys are about to make, has the potential of putting our employees and myself in harm's way, and I hope you have thought long and hard about that."

Both Morgan and Lea have argued that the Commissioners need to decide where to put a new courthouse — which would ideally be physically connected to the new jail - before deciding to place the county administration building on the downtown site. Connecting the courthouse and jail, by means of a secure tunnel if nothing else, substantially increases the security and decreases the cost of transporting inmates between the two facilities.

Courts Facility Committee Weighs In

Earlier in the meeting, the Board heard the recommendations of a recently-formed Courthouse Facility Advisory Committee chaired by Superior Court Judge James Webb, including a recommendation that the courts facility be "located adjacent to or near the new detention facility." Webb's committee included both Lea and Picerno, as well as the current and previous clerks of court and District Attorney Maureen Krueger.

On a motion by Lea, the Board of Commissioners unanimously supported that recommendation. They also unanimously supported a second recommendation of the committee, that "the County Commissioners employ or retain a professional consultant to conduct a study of the courts' short term and long term facility needs."

However, the committee's third recommendation - that the Board "delay a decision on the placement of a new county government building" until the consultant's work was complete, was rejected in a 3-2 split vote with only Lea and Morgan in favor.

That foreshadowed the later vote to site the County Administration building on the Grimm property. Lea has strongly supported studying the possibility of placing the Administration building on the county-owned Carriage Oaks Shopping Center on the east end of Carthage, a site that already includes a number of county departments. County Manager Cary McSwain presented, for the Board's approval, a \$34,000 contract negotiated with architects LS3P Associates for a study of the Carriage Oaks site. Morgan's motion to proceed with the study was defeated 3-2, setting up Melton's motion to locate the administration building on the downtown Grimm property.

Caddell Cites Infrastructure Costs at Carriage Oaks

Commissioner Caddell, a former mayor of Carthage, said informal estimates provided by the town's public works department convinced him that necessary water and sewer upgrades to the Carriage Oaks site would add \$1.2 million or more to the cost of placing the administration building at that location, while water and sewer connections at the Grimm site would cost little more than \$25,000.

Lea rejected Caddell's informal estimates as a basis for decisionmaking. "We have had the architects that are in the process of designing the detention center, they have told us that that piece of property could handle no more than two new building footprints," Lea said, an assessment that he noted was echoed by Howard Warren, a retired architect that serves on each of the county's building com-

"These are experts," Lea continued. "These are not guesstimates. These are not things that Commissioners have gone out and tried to conjure up or bring back to this table for consideration without them being studied in detail.

"Now, if in fact the three of you have already gotten together and you have already made this decision, which is what it appears to be, once again, then why don't we just eliminate any committee process and the three of you just go ahead and make

all of these decisions without the rest of the Board being involved — and we can circumvent this whole time frame process and allow you guys to be able to run this county without the involvement of the other two commissioners."

"You are putting words in peoples' mouths," Chairman Picerno told Lea. "You're making assumptions that three people have gotten together — which has not happened with me. And so you're telling the public, you're telling the paper, things that you know not to be fact ... I know that I have not met with these two gentlemen and decided to run the county."

Melton's motion to locate the administration building on the Grimm property reactivates an existing contract with LS3P Associates for design of the facility a contract that had been put on hold while the Board considered the possibility of using the Carriage Oaks site instead.

What About the Courthouse?

What did not emerge from Monday night's Board of Commissioners debate on where to

for each of these dogs; and I think we've got their attention. I believe they have put in an electric fence."

Revised Facility Fee Policy

SLLA members may reserve and use the common area shelters free of charge except for a returnable clean-up deposit. Fulcher reported that the office has received numerous complaints about the number of guests attending these private functions

"We can enforce a guest card policy at the stables and pool because we have staffing; but we are also starting to enforce wherever we can, including the playgrounds and basketball court, and Sequoia Point," Fulcher said.

He recommended a new fee policy of \$25 for shelter rentals with up to twenty-five guests; functions with twenty-five to fifty guests would be charged a \$50 rental fee. A similar fee and form was also recommended for reser-

vations at the North Clubhouse and Community Activity Center.

System of Governance

Treasurer Denny Galford distributed discussion points related to his study of System of Governance to the Board and asked for comments and response.

"The recent [Seven Lakes Times, July 10] editorial seemed to indicate we had a major problem with our system of governance, but what I anticipate is

putting together some bullets of recommended ways the Board should interact with management," Galford said. "Our biggest focus is on what Kent is leading us to [Community Manager search]."

But Droppers countered, "This is a logical time to step back and look at our system. I think it should almost be an ongoing thing that we should look at on some level."

Galford agreed but said he wanted to clarify that the Board

was discussing ways to interact with management and was not "going all out and rewriting the Bylaws and rules and regulations."

SLLA Community Plan

President Randy Zieldsorf distributed two chapters of the SLLA Community Plan to the Board for comment and review. He reported additional chapters would be provided in August, with a goal to approve the plan during the September Open Meeting.

put the County Administration building is how to solve the problem of an already overcrowded courts facility.

Judge Webb and the Courts Advisory Committee made very clear that the current courthouse is inadequate in terms of courtrooms, storage for the clerk of court, and offices for the district attorney. Commissioners Picerno, Caddell, and Melton all voted in favor of hiring a consultant to study the problem and in favor of locating the courts facility adjacent to or near the

new jail. The debate during Monday night's Board of Commissioners meeting did not reveal how that might be accomplished, if the county administration building is placed on the Grimm Property.

The Times posed that question to Picerno in a brief interview on Tuesday. He said moving the Sheriff's Office from the basement of the existing courthouse to the new public safety Building will free up approximately 8,000 square feet of space. Moving the clerk's offices and storage areas into that space will both

give the clerk more room and open space on the first floor of the courthouse that can be used to address some of the other space needs.

Longer term, Picerno told *The Times*, it may be possible to either expand the existing courthouse or build a new courts facility on the site of the existing jail. "The existing jail is getting old

and will need to be torn down," Picerno told *The Times*. "That space will make a potentially great courthouse facility."

But that is an option more likely to be explored by the Board of Commissioners five or ten years in the future, he noted, adding. "You can't build everything. There is only a finite amount of money."



Redoubled effort needed on Westside security

Dear Editor:

The residents of Seven Lakes West are facing a dilemma of various unsolved acts of vandalism, and now most recently, an act of crime. This is a very serious situation which impacts our property values, our security, and our peace-of-mind.

An "Emergency" meeting for the Board of Director was called by the President last Monday morning, and various remedies were discussed. Because we don't know the identity of the perpetrators, a reward was issued for the arrest and conviction of those responsible. This reward has since grown as a result of multiple resident contributions.

But the development needs to do much more; we need more

eyes-and-ears, and the Director of Security is asking for additional volunteers, and we need greater cooperation from the residents in obeying the established rules. Most important, we need to act with a sense-of-urgency in identifying the perpetrators who have caused this most recent crime and subsequent property damage. Until then, we are all vulnerable to additional acts of vandalism and crime, and our property values can be negatively impacted.

After Monday's meeting, I sent the following letter to President Shepard and to each of the Board of Directors, communicating my opinion and necessary actions which need to be taken. I am now asking you, the newspaper editor, to print this letter in The Times for the purpose of achieving greater awareness of this crime dilemma, to make residents aware that their contributions to the reward fund are welcomed by the Association, and to ask those who can identify the perpetrators to confidentially come for-

ward to the Moore County Sheriff's Department.

The letter in it's entirety follows.

President Shepard,

I appreciated the opportunity of being present and participating in the "Emergency" meeting which you called for the Board of Directors and residents this morning.

The meeting was informative. created some reasonable discussion, and concluded with as least one tactic which I believe is paramount to curtailing the development's now-defined "crime" problem.

I believe this development is experiencing rule-breaking on an increasing basis; I believe this to be a systemic problem of flagrantly violating the established rules and regulations. . . and getting away with it.

This has been going on for years; it first started as inconveniences due to some minor infractions, then grew to seri-

> ous vandalism, and now we have a

well-defined "crime" involving theft, trespassing, and significant property damage. I can visualize

this current "crime" as a result of the development's passive attention to past rule-breaking.

From the vantage point of my residence and simply driving to the mail house, I regularly see boats in driveways for extended periods of time, disregard for stop signs, speeding, vehicles without either the windshield sticker or a bar code, high-speed boat traffic after sundown, frequent high-speed boat traffic outside the buoy markers, mysteriously-missing buoys, complete disregard for the "no wake" rule, and physically restrained dogs barking for eight to ten hours while their owners are away, just to name a few observations. Discussion with past

community management people never brought a single positive result.

These resident rule-breakers have been allowed to continue their infractions; might they be tempted to go further since no control or corrective requirements have been evident? Did this current "crime" develop as a result of inattention to past infractions?

The thousands-of-dollars which the development has unwittingly spent on various "security measures" has apparently done no good at all! I ask now that the Board be objective in clarifying what we want to achieve...that the perpetrators must be identified and they must realize their appropriate justice.

The one-thousand dollar reward (now bolstered by my and other one-hundred dollar additions) is a move in the correct direction. I view, however, the discussed motion detectors and a manned back gate as not directly contributing to solving the problem: rather I see them as a "threat response" to the perpetrators. In addition, this morning's discussion of "incorporation" is certainly inappropriate and definitely not applicable to the situation-at-hand.

Financial facts for North-South residents

Dear Editor.

Much has been written and said about our financial situation,and here are some facts that may be of interest to residents.

1. About 5 years ago we residents voted overwhelmingly to disband our Company Police, at a savings of over \$80,000 per year. The Board at that time, voted three times, a 5-2 vote, to keep the police. A recent comment by a current Board member suggests that we landowners should just go along with all Board decisions. This is unwise for the residents!

2.We discovered, well after the fact, that the Board had signed an agreement with our retiring manager. The agreement calls for a one year consulting fee of about \$75,000. This is about \$62.50 per landowner which is more than our dues increase of \$50 this year.

- 3. The budget plan for 2008-09 showed a net profit of about \$138,000 and the actual profit for the year was \$10,000. Why. The Board spent about \$100,000 that was not in the budget and the most costly was the purchase of three pickup trucks for about \$45,000. Was this an emergency requirement? It probably was not!
- 4. The budget plan for this year may trouble we residents. Here are some facts about this budget:
- a. Our maintenance cost for the year is about \$430,000. This includes \$98,000 for repairs and capital. What are the specifics of this \$98,000.
- b. Our administrative cost for

the year is about \$253,000, to include the office staff and two managers. One can not determine if any of the consulting fee is included in this cost.



 c. Our security cost for the year is about \$261,000 and it probably includes the gates and our roving patrol.

5. The total cost of these items is \$940,000 or 73 per cent of our expenses. These expenses under current operating procedures are certain to increase each year.

6. For over five years residents have made two suggestions to each Board. These sug-

gestions might lead to the saving of resident's money.

- a. Develop a Long Range Plan starting with a Five Year Financial Plan. The Times had a recent editorial suggesting that all residents have input to the plan. An excellent idea,
- b. Study the merits of contracting out our maintenance. This is done by many communities including Seven Lakes West

7. To date neither have these suggestions have been accomplished by the Board.

8. It may be of interest to know we have always paid more in dues than the West side and that they have two to three times as much money in reserves than we do. For example, when our dues were \$800, theirs were \$630. This year their dues went up to \$715 and ours to \$850, and you know ours will be \$900 next year.

9. My primary career was in the military, 30 years active duty,

and we stress taking care of our people. The Landowners' Manual, the Green Book, suggests a primary responsibility or our Board is *To Look Out After The Interests Of The Landowners*. Certainly a major interest of all landowners is our dues and costs. Are Board decisions made following this principle.

10. Perhaps all residents should

become more aware of our financial condition and insist all Boards be more careful in spending our money. After All, the Money They Spend Comes From Us Landowners.

Lakes West is perceived by some to be slowly gaining the attention of outside entities as a "loose community" where standards of excellence, discipline, and pride of occupancy has eroded.

Every time an act of vandalism occurs, I sense another lowering of my property value as well as further development unrest.

The Board needs to take immediate and visible control. The Board needs to ensure a complete understanding of responsibilities. 

were budgeted at approximately \$421,000; the dam reserve stood at \$419,000 at the beginning of the budget year, Treasurer Kathy Kirst told The Times. Total expenditures for dam repairs - including the extra slurry and a weighted dam filter installed while equipment was on-site will total just over \$500,000.

During Tuesday's Work Session Kirst said the Dam Reserves had been depleted, "as it should be -- that's what they are there for." However, with the Contingency Fund also depleted by at least 70% to cover the additional expenses, Kirst said the number one budget priority in the new year would be replenish-

She said the next anticipated major dam-related expense would be replacing valves -about twenty-five years from now -- and that the budget included money set aside in reserve to cover that cost.

A related agenda item on weighted dam filters was tabled for discussion in Executive Session.

Mandatory Septic Management Program

Legal Affairs Director Ed Silberhorn presented the first reading of a proposed rule in Section 5.3 that will require all septic systems that drain into the Lake Auman watershed to have periodic inspections and pumping, if needed, by a Board-approved vendor. Written verification with the work will have to be filed with the Association.

This rule essentially makes mandatory what has been a voluntary program designed to protect the lake.

The owners of newly-constructed homes would be required to inspect septic systems three years after occupation, while existing homes must provide verification of an inspection within three years of September 2009. Those not filing in a timely manner would be subject to fines and prosecution by the Judicial Panel.

Property owners of lots not identified as being in the Lake Auman watershed are also encouraged to participate in the program.

Silberhorn thanked the working committee chaired by Bob Fewkes, with George Jenner, Jay Mikula, and Bud Sales as members, for a job well done.

Party at Pine Island

A group of seventy-five or so young adults gathered for an impromptu party at Pine Island recently, and left behind a substantial mess of beer bottles, cans, and trash.

"It wasn't pretty," stated Herdrich, as he passed around photographs taken the following morning by a nearby lakefront resident who cleaned up the litter. "It is an issue -- this is unacceptable and we need to address

After discussion of various enforcement options using Lake Patrol, signage, additional rules, or permits, the Board agreed to forward the issue to the Lake Auman Sportsman's Club for their recommendation.

Safety and Security

Director John Hoffman reported that nineteen of the forty volunteers necessary for the Neighborhood Watch program had been recruited.

In related discussion, he reported that vandalism is on the rise in the community and that a methodology to track reports of suspicious activity would be maintained by Community Manager Joan Frost. "The individual homeowner of the property violated has the responsibility and choice to report to administration or the [Moore County] Sheriff," Hoffman said.

He also reported that the gate guards were no longer honoring thirty-day hang tag permits issued by the Seven Lakes Landowners Association to vendors and contractors.

"We have tightened down significantly on vendors and the kind of hang tags they receive," Hoffman explained. "We've categorized the vendors and as you go down the pecking order the hang tag gets shorter -down to a one-day visit verified with the homeowner."

Gate security was commended for assisting the Sheriff in a recent complaint by a property

owner who discovered several prescription pills were missing after employing a "cleaning woman." Using gate records, officers were able to identify other residents that she had worked for.

Hoffman said the Safety and Security Committee was studying emergency exits from the community and the role and responsibility of CERT [Community Emergency Response Team]. He will present a proposed plan to include procedures for opening emergency gates, signage, and organization of people to assist in the direction of automobile traffic at the next Work Session.

Hoffman also clarified that wildlife "creating more than a nuisance" should be reported to the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and that loose domestic animals should be reported to Moore County Animal Control.

Deed of Trust

Prior to 1994 Seven Lakes Development received loans from residents using Deeds of Trust to fund paving of interior roads, Treasurer Kirst reported. In reviewing Association records, she identified thirteen lots where the loan repayment was satisfied but the deeds were never can-

Director John Goodman was unable to attend the meeting. Immediately following the Work Session the Board went into Executive Session.



patrol. Director John Hoffman said there is \$10,000-\$12,000 unspent in that budget line item; Shepard noted the fee for off-duty officers is approximately \$30 per hour.

Hoffmann was also asked by the Board to reinstitute a latenight/early-morning volunteer lake patrol that would monitor the lake on "high-impact" holidays and weekends, in order to attempt to prevent future incidents.

Are volunteers enough?

Talk of additional volunteer efforts led Director Karen Milligan to point the Board in another direction.

"At what point does this community decide that the volunteer network . . . that the scope of what we want to accomplish is beyond that?" Milligan asked.

Pointing out that Hoffmann's efforts to round up forty volunteers to staff a neighborhood watch program has thus far yielded only nineteen, Milligan asked, "At what point do we need to look beyond that and ask the landowners 'How much is security worth to you budget wise?' Relying on nineteen volunteers, though it is a lovely thought, to patrol our community . . . I'm not mitigating what they do, but there is a point where we have grown beyond relying on volunteer power."

Later in the meeting, Milligan added, "This community is too big a community to run with three ladies in the office and an entire volunteer system. If you want these things done, you have to pay for it. Volunteers can't run this community, even though we have a lovely network of them."

"It is a question that the board has absolutely to address," Hoffman said in response. He noted that he has several initiatives in the works to tighten security, among them determining how much the West Side can rely on the Sheriff's office for onduty patrols.

"Today I have a meeting with Neil Godfrey, the Deputy Chief," Hoffmann said. "The focus of that meeting today will be what will the Sheriff's department sanction, support, and recommend for this community to do to improve security — on-duty patrols, off-duty patrols, and working in concert with neigh-

borhood watch, and perhaps a late night lake patrol. I call that a system, a program."

Another element of that program, Hoffmann said, is to encourage residents to be attentive to — and, when appropriate, to question — the presence of unusual vehicles, people, and incidents in their neighborhood. Another element is improving security at the entrances to the community.

Hoffmann said that his recommendation for responding to the boat theft incident would be to "Stay on the course you are on; try to accelerate it if possible." He said he would be able to bring the Board recommendations based on his meeting with Deputy Chief Godfrey within the week.

Lightning damages back gate

Community Manager Joan Frost used the occasion of the discussion of security to inform the Board that a lightning strike on Thursday, July 9 had disabled the electronics at the back gate. Traffic cones were put out to temporarily close the entrance, but someone stole the cones and drove through the gate, damaging it further, Frost said.

The security equipment vendor was able to repair the barcode reader and gate mechanism, returning the gate to service by Friday afternoon. But the digital video recorder and internet link to the front gate were not expected to be operational until Friday, July 24. So the gate was functional but no information about the vehicles entering and exiting was being collected.

Director Hoffmann, a strong advocate of a manned back gate, suggested using the opportunity to temporarily man the gate and collect information bout who enters — or tries to gain unlawful entry into — the community, but the Board did not agree to fund that option.

Other Comments

After having established the reward, approved hiring off duty officers, and reinstituted the latenight lake patrol, Board members and residents who attended the meeting brainstormed other options for improving security, among them:

Leaving dock lights on at night
 — or outfitting them with
 motion detectors so that they
 come on when approached
 by a trespasser — or, potentially, a Canada goose. Opinion among those in attendance was divided on these
 options, with some objecting
 to lighting Lake Auman up
 "like the Bronx" and others
 suggesting the effect of properly screened lighting at lakeside would be attractive and an
 effective deterrent to lakeside

vandalism and theft. Director Silberhorn noted that current Association rules in fact prohibit leaving dock lights on all night and asked whether the Board might consider suspending that rule temporarily. The question was deferred to a July 24 special meeting called to review proposed changes to the rules and regulations.

- Roving patrols Board members discussed options ranging from roving security patrols to a fully-staffed police force, and had differing perceptions of the experience the Seven Lakes Landowners Association had with both efforts.
- Personal security One res-

- ident suggested encouraging landowners to lock their vehicles and not leave keys in cars and boats.
- Beefing up the back gate hardware to make it less penetrable.
- Dale Erickson suggested that the Association use the newsletter and *The Times* to report minor incidents of vandalism and petty crime, in order to keep the community on its toes. Director Hoffmann noted that such incidents often go unreported to the Association.
- Projecting a no-nonsense "get tough on crime" attitude in the community.




