Picerno served as the coun-

ty board's Chairman in 2008, sworn in at the opening of the the first year of his term; Lea has served as Chairman for the past twelve months.

On a motion by Larry Caddell, seconded by Kennedy, and unanimously approved, Jimmy Melton will serve as the Board's Vice Chairman. Caddell and Melton were both re-elected to the Board in November. They, along with Kennedy, who successfully challenged Cindy Morgan in the Republican primary, were

Zielsdorf resurrects Lake & Dam Committee

In an unexpected announcement during the Monday, December 6 Work Session of the Seven Lakes Landowners Association Board, President Randy Zielsdorf announced his intention to resurrect the Lakes & Dams Committee, a group he disbanded in April 2009.

In previous meetings, Zielsdorf explained that decision was based on his desire to shift responsibility for the monitoring, care and main-

Special Meeting Wednesday on Closure of Auman Dam Road

Members of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] will gather on Wednesday, December 15, for a Special Meeting on the closing of the roadway over Lake Auman Dam.

But exactly what will take place during the meeting the second member-called Special Meeting in the Association's history — remains very much an open ques-

No agenda for the meeting has been published, no ballots have been issued, and the meeting's parliamentarian is not sure what, if any, question might be put to a

vote of the membership during the proceedings.

What is clear is that members who hope to vote, speak, or otherwise participate in Association business conducted during the meeting better arrive early in order to find their place in the registration line.

Community Manager Joan Frost told The Times that CAS, Inc.will pull in extra staff to handle registration for the meeting, which is scheduled to begin at 7:00 pm.

"We will begin registering landowners at 6:00 pm," Frost said, "and we will stop the registration at 7:00 pm."

Members will need to know their lot number, in order to place themselves in the proper registration line, Frost said. They should also bring photo identification.

Each lot is entitled to one vote at the meeting, so husbands and wives or other co-owners of property will be able to register only once.

Members holding proxies that entitle them to vote on behalf of a landowner who cannot attend the meeting may register those proxies the evening of the meeting, or may drop by the SLWLA office during regular business hours to register their proxies in advance, Frost said.

Zielsdorf says agreement with Club is close

Final details on implementing the three and a halfyear-old driving range agreement between the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] and Seven Lakes Country Club [SLCC] may be resolved by the end of the year, with attorneys from both sides meeting during Thanksgiving week to work out a few remaining differences.

"We're very, very close to the covenants being finished and agreed upon," President Randy Zielsdorf reported at the SLLA Open Meeting on Wednesday, November 17.

As the only current Board member who participated in the contentious 4-3 split vote that approved the agreement in July 2007, Zielsdorf has indicated his interest in seeing the matter finally put to rest.

Prompted by the SLCC's desire to sell the old driving range for residential development, the agreement lays out five bullet points concerning the future use of the five acre tract and the Club's other landholdings. Specifically, the agreement:

• Gave the Club the right to draft its own covenants limiting the use of all its property to golf course and country club operations, with review

and approval by the SLLA other outstanding issues attorney:

- Granted the Association a ten-foot easement along Seven Lakes Drive to be written by the SLLA attorney;
- Required the Country Club to provide sufficient land for at least five additional parking spaces at the Southside Mail House;
- Subjected any future residential development of Country Club property to the Southside Covenants; and
- Allowed for construction of up to fourteen residential units on the old driving range property, with the SLLA pledging to work with any developer of the property "in an open, efficient and cooperative fashion."

In addition to final review and approval of the covenants, Zielsdorf said

under discussion between the SLCC and SLLA attorneys included a request by the Club that the additional land for mailhouse parking spaces revert to the Club if, at some point, the Association no longer needs the extra parking. The attorneys are also working to clarify the final sentence of the original agreement, which states the Association will work with a proposed future developer of the old driving range in an open, efficient, and cooperative fashion.

"What is open? What is cooperative?" asked Zielsdorf. "It's open to interpretation, so we've asked both attorneys to get together to draft a letter of understanding to be an addendum to the original agreement."

Scout Troop 98 dedicates West End Lodge

Earning the hiking and camping merit badges are basically a given for any boy who joins West End Boy Scout Troop 98. Make no mistake; this is a very outdoorsy group. Yet even the best campers need a good solid shelter now and then.

Organized sixty-five years ago, the troop met in basements and abandoned homes, the old Stanly Plant, fire stations, and more recently in the Fellowship Hall of their sponsor, West End United Methodist Church. But on Sunday, December 5, following an inspiring flag-raising ceremony to dedicate the West End Scout Lodge at Johnson's Park, Troop 98 finally settled into its first permanent home.

Built on seventeen acres of woodlands along Carthage Road, the 4,000 square foot lodge was approximately seventy-five percent complete before an August 2009 fire gutted the facility - it was a total loss.

Wiping away tears and soot, local builder and former scoutmaster, Dwane Parsons. soldiered on using insurance funds, donated materials and an army of volunteers. Last Sunday, under a sunny Winter sky and in the company of several hundred well-wishers, current and former scouts, building volunteers, firefighters and emergency personnel, military servicemen, donors and contributors, Parsons proudly saluted as the American flag was

raised outside the newly rebuilt lodge.

Upon this rock

It's true – it all began with a rock and a joke.

Heavier and a little bit bigger than a brick, the rock first made its appearance about six years ago.

"The kids would sneak water bottles and rocks into each others packs to make the loads heavier," explained

Parsons. "One time this large rock showed up in a pack and before we passed it to another, we'd carve in our initials."

He describes this group as the core leadership of the troop at the time, the ones who always went out on the hikes and camping trips. Around the campfire, they decided the time had come for a lodge; a place to call their

Years before, West End UMC member Billy Johnson had donated a large rural tract to the church with a dream to see it used as youth retreat and fellowship property. In 2004, with a few ideas and some funding in place for a lodge, the project was approved with Johnson's support.

This rock always showed up. It was never tossed aside and it became an honor to carry it. When we started building the lodge, we knew a keystone would be set in the

fireplace and we wanted to include our rock.'

Parsons and Billy Barber built the massive fireplace entirely of local stones collected with permission from creek beds, road shoulders and hiking trails. The famous carved rock was carefully placed in a subtle location, down low along the right side in a place where it could be discovered by boys for generations to come.

However, in the aftermath of the devastating fire, many (See "Scouts," p. 12)

Ritter: SLCC working to fine-tune agreement

Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] President Randy Zielsdorf has lately been the sole voice offering progress reports on the negotiations between the Association and the Seven Lakes Country Club [SLCC] over the implementation of the three-year-old "Driving Range Agreement."

Recent statements by SLCC President Steve Ritter in a Club membership meeting had some members of both the Club and Association asking whether Zielsdorf and Ritter were on the same page regarding the negotiations.

The Times interviewed Ritter by phone on Wednesday in order to offer our readers a better understanding of the Club's position.

The five point Driving Range Agreement was signed after controversy erupted when the community learned the Club was interested in selling the old driving range, which lies between Seven Lakes Drive and Devonshire Avenue, to a residential developer.

But the recent talks have been more cooperative than controversial, Ritter told The

"I believe what is good for the Club is good for the community, and what is good for the community is good for the Club," Ritter told The Times, adding that he and Zielsdorf have developed a cordial, productive working relationship.

Ritter admitted, however, that the process of implementing the three-year-old agreement has taken far longer than some might have liked.

Covenants

The first point in the agreement requires that the Club establish covenants on its property that ensure it can only be used for the operation of a golf course and country club.

Ritter confirmed what Zielsdorf has reported to his membership: the covenants are written and are currently under review by the Club and Association attorneys.

Noting that the key concern of the Association is that the Club's property remain a golf course and not be put to other uses — for example, subdivided for residential development — The Times asked Ritter whether the draft covenants would include this protection.

Noting that he had recently built a home on the 15th Hole of Seven Lakes Country Club, Ritter said that he and other members of the SLCC Board were committed to ensuring that the golf course remains a golf course, and the draft covenants reflect that.

[The draft document has not yet been released to the public, and neither party has pledged to release it for public review before it receives final approval by the respective Boards.]

Easement

The second plank of the agreement obligates the Club to provide a ten-foot easement on the old driving range along Seven Lakes Drive, the goal being to prevent any future owner of the property from opening a second entrance into the South Side. The Club has yet to provide that easement.

Zielsdorf said in the SLLA's November open meeting that he felt progress could be made toward finalizing this portion of the agreement.

Ritter told *The Times* that the Club — and the landowners who make up its Board have no interest in seeing a through the old driving range. In fact, he said, he would

ed a second entrance, and added that he did not believe other members of the SLCC Board would be inclined to accept such an offer.

However, he said the granting of the easement is contingent upon the Club and the Association fine-tuning the meaning of language in the fifth point of the agreement, which is integrally linked to the fourth point.

Architectural Review

The fourth point of the agreement stipulates that any residential development on the old range will be subject to the South Side covenants, giving the SLLA's Architectural Review Board [ARB] authority to oversee the project.

The fifth point of the agreement obligates the Association to work with any future developer of the driving range property "in an open, efficient and cooperative fashion."

Ritter told The Times and Zielsdorf told SLLA members in the November Open Meeting — that this language is open to interpretation and needs further definition to satisfy the Club.

Noting that "there has been a lot of consternation" in the past over the possible development of the range, Ritter told The Times the Club wants to make sure that any future buyer is comfortable with the role the ARB will play in approving the development.

'We want it to be nice firstclass development," Ritter explained. "We know ARB will want it to be a nice firstclass development. We just want to make sure ARB doesn't go overboard. That's what a developer's concern would be."

The language aimed at alleviating that potential concern is under negotiation and review by the attorneys representing both sides, Ritter said.

to provide ground for five additional parking spaces at the South Side mailhouse. Ritter said this item is no problem, adding that he had deposited a rough sketch of the Club's proposal in Zielsdorf's mailbox earlier in the day.

Why revise the agreement?

While both Zielsdorf and Ritter report that progress — albeit slow progress — is being made on implementing the three-year-old driving range agreement, the question remains: Why does an

agreement already approved by both the SLLA and SLCC Board's need to be renegotiated?

Ritter told *The Times* that he sees the existing agreement as "a living document, not as a document that was made to stay in concrete."

"Neither Board is a permanent Board," he noted, explaining that Zielsdorf is the only remaining member of the SLLA Board who actually voted on the agreement and that no current member of the SLCC Board was serving at the time the agreement was approved.

"It's a dated document," Ritter said.

"We've never disagreed with any of those bullet points. We're just hoping to keep that document open until we can cover every one of those elements . . .We're working towards it. We're checking off the parking spaces, the covenants . . . "

New representation

Ritter said the club, not finding a local developer interested in purchasing the old driving range, has listed it with NAI Carolantic Realty, Inc. in Raleigh, a regional firm specializing in marketing properties for residential development. The asking price for the five acre tract remains \$240,000.

The goal remains finding a developer who will place homes on the property.

"We're not interested in putting a Tank & Tummy out there," Ritter said.

of the hearth stones were so heavily damaged that Parsons had no choice but to dismantle the fireplace and start anew.

"We went looking for our rock and, because of the debris and its location, it was unscathed. It had been protected."

The keystone was carefully chiseled out and Parsons said he made sure to fit it in the exact same spot when the new stones were laid again for the fireplace.

"That rock has a lot of miles on it. The committee that started this building – their initials are on the rock and it is only fitting it is there," said Parsons.

"It's a small thing. Those initials will be forgotten – one day they'll wonder who those people are but they'll know that they worked on this fireplace. This building will be here and it's a special place for our community, for our youth."

The massive lodge building was designed not just for scouts and community youth, but also with the intention that, if necessary, it could be operated off-the-grid using generators. Equipped with showers and a full kitchen, the building can be used as a disaster relief assembly hall. Other features on the property include a nature trail, several campsites, and an amphitheater and fire ring for outdoor ceremonies.

A call to service

During the dedication ceremony, Parsons learned that he has been selected to receive the President's Call to Service Award, a commendation in recognition of over 4,000 hours of volunteer service

Humble and appreciative, he said he was surprised by the honor and had simply followed a family tradition of service and dedication to scouting.

A charter member of Troop 98 in 1946, Parsons' father chose a career in the military and while raising his four sons and a daughter all over the world, he made sure his children were always involved in scouting – both at home and abroad.

"He found a pack or troop in every place we went and I was able to advance in scouting and do a lot, and have a lot of experiences in places the public wasn't even allowed," said Parsons.

After retiring, the senior Mr. Parsons brought his family back home to West End and to Pack 98.

Dwane and his three brothers – Doyle, Dwight, and Darrell – all reached the rank of Eagle Scout, as did both of Dwane's sons, and the entire extended clan continues to be involved with the troop and the lodge.

"We're becoming the guys in the back row that you don't hear about. There are so many people involved in a program like this, so many that tirelessly work and you never hear their names. This lodge would not have been built without the guys in the back row," said Parsons.

But it's his time spent as the leader, in the scoutmaster role, where Parsons fondest memories reside.

"I've been at this a long time. It's emotional – you watch these kids grow up," he said. "Scouting teaches responsibility and life skills. We're trying to raise children into young adults and for them to be pillars, to be leaders in the community. I wouldn't trade the time I spent with my children in scouting for anything. It was the best quality time you could ever spend with your kids."

"You can't put a price tag on reaching children, of having an impact on them. Scout leaders can talk to kids a little more candidly, be a little more blunt. We can provide an interaction between adult and child – a connection between generations that is often lacking."

He continued, "In scouting there's competition and events, the opportunity for advancement and a positive channel for all that energy. It is a good environment. They learn to be a leader and to be prepared. That's our motto, to be prepared and I hope that's what we do: prepare them."

The lodge still has a short wish list that includes furnishings, folding tables and chairs, a refrigerator/freezer, an electric oven and microwave, plus serving pans and tongs for the kitchen.

the ten foot buffer easement.

"I have met with [Steve] Ritter [SLCC President] and he said he would not sign an easement until someone buys the land," Stephan reported.

Zielsdorf responded that a lot has changed and there has been movement to get the issue resolved.

"In meeting with Ritter, he understands the need for the easement," said Zielsdorf.

Director Bud Shaver, who is also a member of the SLCC, also weighed in.

"There is not a person on this Board who is not aware that the easement needs to be resolved. We are unanimous," said Shaver.

Directors wanted — no experience necessary

Four seats will be open for election on the SLLA Board this Spring; and, with few candidates showing interest thus far, SLLA Nominating Committee Chair Melinda Scott is concerned about voter interest and turnout.

"I want residents to understand how important this process is," Scott said. "Voting in landowner's elections is typically low, and that is unacceptable."

"We have a community that is changing rapidly, and your input and feedback is so import to what this Board does in the future," she continued. She said Seven Lakes is increasingly diverse, but many residents are looking for an enhanced feeling of community.

Scott reported that the Nominating Committee is developing a survey that touches on "big picture" questions, such as, "Where do you envision the community in five years?" and, "What are the top three priority issues you see facing the community, and what does the Board have to do to effectively address those concerns?"

In addition to feedback, Scott said she he hopes it will spur potential Board candidates to throw their hats in the ring.

"I want people to come forward who are really interested in the betterment of community," she said. "Some feel the need to identify specific qualifications to serve, but I feel that is an exclusive policy and could exclude people that are more than qualified."

nances allow vicious dogs who have engaged in one or two incidents to be kept under restricted conditions but, under a 'three strikes you're out policy,' the dogs are removed from the home following a third confirmed attack. SLLA regulations are more restrictive and community rules stipulate that keeping vicious or nuisance dogs is prohibited.

During an investigation of the original complaint, Animal Control Officer Bryant Voss determined that the two dogs involved in the attack were already on record for an incident dating to the previous year. In addition, neighbors have alleged the dogs have attacked on at least two additional occasions; however those incidents were not formally reported. Based on the two confirmed attack reports, Voss declared the dogs vicious and told The Times that he has been in frequent contact with the owners while the matter is under consideration by the Judicial Panel.

The SLLA Board urges residents to report any animal attacks, on persons or other animals, directly to the county. The Association can then obtain the proper documentation and an incident report. Moore County Animal Control can be reached at 910-947-2858.

Roving Security

Roving Security officer Steve McVey has been notably absent from his position following a late night altercation in early October with a driver involved in a single-vehicle crash on Echo Dam.

According to the police report, nineteen-year old Jonathan Buell, of Asheboro, ran off the road and struck a guardrail on Firetree Lane at Echo Dam. McVey told officers that Buell was verbally abusive when he arrived and attempted to leave the scene. McVey pursued him, and the incident escalated when Buell removed his belt and began swinging it as a weapon. McVey said he defended himself, striking

Buell once in the head with a heavy MagLite type flashlight, before handcuffing him.

As a result of Buell's injuries, charges were filed against McVev.

During public comment, Northsider Pearl Keene pushed the Board for answers.

"The security guard was discharged for doing his job -- why?" Keene asked.

However, both Cochran and Zielsdorf refused to answer, citing that the incident was a personnel issue with personal information involved that could not be disclosed.

Finance



She explained that many members likely already have a firm position one way or the other, and knowing that up front means CAS personnel will not have to have everyone in attendance queue up again for a vote count.

are undecided.

Members who may have stated one preference or another will be able to change that position, if they desire, once a formal question is on the table, she added.

What's the question?

Whether a formal question will be placed on the table remains a bit of a mystery. Though the Dam Road Group's petition included a specific question to be put

before the membership at the meeting, the announcement of the special meeting included no mention of that question — and no ballot.

The SLWLA Board's outside counsel, Stephen Later, told *The Times*: "The topic in the notice is not limited to the Dam Group Petition language in order to encourage a broad discussion and range of voices and opinions. The board would like to be sure that all of the members are able to voice their thoughts, pro or con, on this matter."

Asked whether the question posed by the Dam Road Group could be offered as a motion during the meeting, Later said it was not possible to judge in advance what motions might be ruled in order or out of order.

Later said he also could not pre-judge whether a motion to ratify the Board's decision to permanently close the Dam Road would be ruled in or out of order.

The Board has asked Later

to Chair the meeting and serve as its parliamentarian. He told *The Times* that it would be held in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order and "in compliance with the governing documents of SLWLA and state law and, of course, in a manner that is fair to the membership."

"As to action at the meeting," Later said, "there is no way to know what motions will be made at the meeting, so we wouldn't be in a position, at this time, to speculate about what motions might or might not be in order at the meeting."

Frost told *The Times* that she was attempting to pull together an agenda for the meeting, but was not sure whether an agenda would be published in advance

Competing Proxies

The notice of the special meeting issued by the SLWLA Board made no mention of the possibility that members unable to attend the meeting could make sure they had an opportunity to vote on any business that comes before the membership by giving a proxy to another landowner who did plan to attend the meeting.

However, shortly after the meeting notice was issued, Vice President John Hoffmann began circulating via email a proxy that landowners could use to give their proxy to SLWLA President Ron Shepard. Similar proxies were later made available at the SLWLA office and promoted on the Seven Lakes West website.

Westsider Mike Gorenflo provided members of the Dam Road Group a blank proxy, also via email, that they could use to designate any landowner as their proxy at the meeting.

Frost told *The Times* on Wednesday that the SLWLA office had no blank proxies for landowners to use, but added that the office staff would be happy to distribute blank proxies if they were provided by the Dam Road Group.

The Special Meeting will be held at the West Side Park Community Center.

the last two thousand years. When God speaks to us through the words of the Bible, and I certainly believe God does speak to us, we must weigh what we understand God to be saying with our reason, our experience and what we learn from our own faith traditions.

If I must believe that every word in every book in the Bible is scientifically and historically true, then I, as an educated, intelligent follower of Jesus in the 21st century, would be unable to hear God speak at all.

Spiritual and religious truth in every faith tradition is

most often conveyed through myths and metaphors which transcend the bare facts that the words seem to describe, and these truths speak to us across the ages of history and scientific discovery.

Some people have become experts in compartmentalizing what they believe to be true. On Sunday, they accept every word in the Bible as scientifically and historically true, and then, Monday through Friday, they live in an entirely different world with different criteria for what is truth. In order to be the integrated persons God created us to be, what we hold to be true on Sunday must be true throughout the week.

There is a poster on the wall of a church library that says: Jesus Came To Take Away Our Sins, Not Our Minds. I believe that God still speaks, and I pray that God will continue to speak to you as you read the Bible with new eyes and ears.

The July 2007 Agreement by and between the Seven Lakes Country Club and the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] continues to be unresolved. Randy Zieldsdorf, the current president of the Seven Lakes Landowners Association was quoted in the August 3, 2007 edition of The Seven Lakes Times: " Rather than let this go out and simmer for another 30 to 60 days, it was time to get signatures on paper."

The agreement Mr. Zielsdorf

refers calls for, among other things, the Country Club to write covenants "limiting the use of all Country Club property to the operations of the golf course and Country Club". Now, over three years after the fact there has been nothing completed from the original agreement.

It is clear that there are difficulties in getting the parties to agree to what the original agreement stipulated. If the original agreement is further modified without prior full open discussion with property owners, the Board will have failed to be transparent on an issue that is most important to the community. Since there is the possibility of conflict of interest with some Landowner's Association Board members

also being Country Club members, it is even more important that this matter be discussed openly before changes are made to the original agreement.

What is the problem? The original agreement is simple as to intent. Who is responsible for the delay? If there is disagreement as to what the agreement says, then there is a simple solution: Agree to binding arbitration to complete the agreement as written.

The very integrity of our gated private residential community is at stake. This is not an insignificant matter or one that should still be unresolved after three and one half years.

If you read the article in The Seven Lakes Times about Joe Sikes' resignation from the Seven Lakes West Board, you need to understand some of the background.

Apparently, part of Sikes' decision occurred because an article he prepared for the Seven Lakes West Newsletter was censored by fellow board members.



For example, Christ claims to be the source of life and only way to God (John 14:6) The Christian is forgiven of sins by the sacrifice of Christ on the cross, and not by the keeping of laws and traditions (Hebrews 9:22, Ephesians 2:8,9). And the scriptures were written so we may know that we have eternal life, if we believe (John 20:31).

In contrast, Islam believes that Christ was a prophet, but the Son of God Salva-

tion is obtained by keeping the five pillars of recitation, prayer, alms, fasting, and pilgrimage, but there is no certainty of heaven.

(Continued from front page) vinced that every expense was warranted.

Responding to criticism this Summer from former committee members, Zielsdorf agreed to a meeting in October between himself, Treasurer Denny Galford, Community Manager Alina Cochran, and several representatives from the former group. Discussions included a comprehensive five-year review of dam expenditures and joint approval of an eight item action list of regularly scheduled dam maintenance projects.

During Monday's Work Session, Cochran noted that new information would require an adjustment to one of those items.

"There is some concern that mowing the grass when it has grown too long smothers the grass underneath," Cochran explained.

Once moved on a regular basis for aesthetics, over the last few years the grass on the dam faces has only been cut twice or thrice each year to prevent soil erosion. Cochran recommended that instead of limiting cuttings to a predetermined number, that the action item should be amended so that grass is mowed when it reaches a specified maximum height.

Following her report, Zielsdorf announced his decision to reconstitute the Lakes & Dams Committee and said he is seeking four interested individuals to serve. Specifically, he noted the committee would be useful in providing guidance for special requests related to the lakes that do not fall under already established committee interests of security, recreation or infrastructure. He anticipated an initial meeting in January and at least one more meeting prior to the new Board members being seated following the Annual Meeting in March.

Echo Dam closed for repairs

Echo Dam was closed and work on a heavily eroded section of Firetree Lane commenced Monday, November 29. One of four high priority areas identified as needing substantial repairs prior to community-wide repaving, the \$31,124 project was awarded to Civil Group in September.

Community Manager Alina Cochran said there was concern about whether the underlying soil was fit for the necessary work. Once the surface soil was removed, a visual inspection of the base was completed with both the contractor and Mike Cummins agreeing that the soil was in fact adequate. Cummins is a Southside resident and retired civil engineer who is assisting with overseeing the project as a member of the SLLA Infrastructure Committee under Director Bud Shaver.

With good progress, the project was ahead of schedule and paving work was anticipated to begin early this week; however, cold temperatures and some minor vandalism last weekend may delay completion.

Zielsdorf reported that road barricades protecting the work site were removed from the dam on Friday night, December 3, resulting in at least one vehicle driving over the unfinished roadbed. In addition, the construction site's porta-potty was tipped over and a storm grate was also tampered with.

"It didn't look like any real damage, but I'm not an expert, "said Zielsdorf, who replaced the barricades early Saturday morning with assistance from Treasurer Denny Galford. "The worse case is they may have to reroll."

State enforcement on Lake Sequoia considered

There needs to be an educational discussion between the community and the NC Wildlife Resources Commission.

That is the primary message that emerged from a meeting with Sgt. Mark Dutton, reported Directors Bruce Keyser, Jr. and Melinda Scott.

"The agency poses a good opportunity for our community," said Keyser, noting that there are many misconceptions about what will happen if state enforcement is permitted in Seven Lakes.

In particular, the Board is

looking to resolve a ongoing problem of excessive alcohol use and impaired boat operators

"People look at Fish and Wildlife as enforcement, but he [Dutton] is not looking at that per se, but looking at this as an educational opportunity, of working with youth on water safety, of working with adults in the community. He was very reasonable," Scott said.

Scott said there is an incorrect perception that if NC Wildlife is enforcing on the lakes, that the Army Corps is automatically brought in as

"That is not accurate," she stated.

Scott that he will only come on the lakes when he invited unless there are overt occurrences of illegal activity.

"What we're seeing have been instances of problems on Sequoia and other lakes that we haven't seen in a while," said Scott.

"The Board has no legal authority to rectify the problems. If we see these problems increase, then steps must be taken. If next Summer residents are more compliant, then we will look at Fish and Wildlife as an educational resource and less for enforcement."

Galford questioned whether the presence of Wildlife officers would require the need for boat registration with North Carolina; however, after going around the table, it was clear that more information was needed from Dutton to correctly answer this concern.

Scott recommended that Zielsdorf, as chair of the newly reformed Lakes & Dams Committee, invite Dutton to make an informational presentation at an upcoming Open Meeting.

Swimming pool setbacks

Members of the Architectural Review Board [ARB] met with representatives from the Moore County Planning office regarding proposed ordinances on setback regulations for swimming pools in private communities. In discussions, it was determined that it would be more expedient to amend the county ordinances to allow each community to set its own guidelines rather than attempt to reach a consensus ruling.

Director Melinda Scott reported that ARB recommended a 25' minimum setback for swimming pools from both rear and side property lines. A Board vote on the proposed change will be scheduled.

Proposed revisions to membership form

In a similar discussion, Galford reported that changes to the membership form as recommended by the Finance Committee would require a few minor changes to the rules and necessitate a Board vote of approval.

Specifically, Galford recommended a change to Rule 5.2.3 which states that dogs must be registered, in favor of amending the rule to allow registering dogs as an option.

"There have been some recent concerns with dogs, but registered dogs aren't the problem dogs. We're collecting \$3 and keeping a partial record [of resident animals] but for three bucks it isn't worth it," said Galford.

Changing the word from 'must' to 'may' register a dog in the rule would provide an option to register and receive the accompanying identification tag for any in the community who wanted the additional security in case their pet was lost or found roam-

Galford also recommended amending the rules to eliminate a requirement to register non-power boats, including canoes, rowboats, and paddle boats.

"There is no need for enforcement with these types of boats or water damage concerns," he explained.

In addition, the new membership form will also include a space for residents to register their golf carts, which is required by community rules but has not been enforced.

"The changes we anticipate we hope will allow for a more efficient registration. The form will be mailed with the election ballot. Billing for the yearly assessment with account balance and a statement of dues will go out with a return address of a lockbox. Payment of dues can be handled through the mail and, at a later time, the office will mail out stickers and membership cards," explained Galford.

A vote on the proposed changes will be called at the December 15 Open Meeting.

Other business

In other business on Monday, December 6, the SLLA Board:

- Considered three bids for annual termite inspection services. Cochran recommended accepting a bid submitted by Aberdeen Exterminating.
- Heard from Cochran that the uniform contract agreement, valid through September 2011, had been renegotiated and new terms offered the potential to save \$1,900 per year. In addition, the contract includes winter jackets, the option of long or short sleeve shirts year round,

county water system that serves the Village, using the proceeds from that sale to extend county water service to the rest of the county.

- Partnering with the Town of Robbins to make it a source of water for county customers, by preparing a concrete proposal and asking the Town to do the same, exchanging those proposals in a public meeting, and beginning serious negotiations.
- Giving taxpayers a oneyear break from paying the two-cent Advanced Life Support tax, which is dedicated to funding county emergency services. Picerno noted that the tax has produced a current surplus of \$5.1 million, creating the opportunity for a one-time tax break.
- Using a portion of the county's fund balance, cur-

rently just under \$19 million, to retire some of the county's debt that carries higher interest rates.

- Taking a second look at last year's reconfiguration of the county's longevity and performance bonus system for rewarding its employees. The rewrite of the system, which eliminated bonuses given solely on the basis of longevity, "May have gone too far," Picerno said, noting that it may be impossible for employees to reach the highest performance rating in the system.
- Continuing to reduce the number of county employees through attrition, using the savings realized to provide a pay raise for the remaining employees.
- Forming a citizen's task force that would review the ordinances proposed for the county's proposed Unified

Development Ordinance and make recommendations to help make Moore County more business-friendly.

Picerno's list, offered at the very end of the meeting, provoked no public reaction from his fellow Board members. He joked that he didn't want his fellow Commissioners "to have too much of a holiday."

Though they will not meet again in December, the Board of Commissioners have a regular meeting scheduled for January 4, a work session on January 6, a retreat on January 13 & 14, and another regular meeting on January 18.

Auditors Give County "Clean Report"

Crystal Waddell of the accounting firm Martin Starnes & Associates told the Board of Commissioners that her firm's audit of county finances for Fiscal Year 2009-2010 produced a "clean report" without qualifications. She noted that the year included a change in financial software and a change in the county's primary banking relationship, both of which made the audit process more challenging.

Waddells' report included an overview of FY2009-2010 finances; among the highlights were:

• County general fund revenues totaled \$83 million, down \$4 million from the year prior, with \$3 million of that resulting from a decline in income from sales taxes. Property taxes account for 65 percent of the money the county takes in.

- County expenditures were \$82 million for the year, with 36 percent of that going to the public schools and community college.
- The County's Public Utilities assets grew from \$29.6 million last year to \$33 million this year, the result of upgrades and expansions to the water and wastewater systems.

Waddell introduced the Board to a revision of feder-

al accounting principles that will require a more detailed classification of the county's fund balance. Ongoing negotiations between federal and state governments over the new rules mean their precise application to Moore County remains up in the air, she noted. The Board is expected to delve more deeply into the implications of the rule change during its January 6 work session.

no charges for adding new employees, and a consistent standard uniform for all maintenance staff.

• Heard from Cochran that lake water testing was conducted with no concerns reported. The next regular testing is scheduled for April. Following the Work Session, the Board went into a special Closed Meeting to discuss legal and personnel issues.

Chapel in Pinehurst for an upgrade to the county's water system needed to provide adequate fire flows to support a major expansion of the Chapel.

The church's plan to build an education building on the Village Green in Pinehurst has run into stiff opposition -- including from Middaugh but has thus far won approval by the Village Council. Before the Commissioners, Middaugh argued that Moore County Public Utilities has consistently required that developers bear the cost of water system upgrades and should apply the same standard to the Chapel's request.

Pinehurst's John Marcum, who has become a regular speaker at the county Board's meeting, encouraged the Commissioners to consider adding to their recently approved Code of Ethics three specific amendments that Marcum had suggested previously, including one that would prevent any Commissioner from serving on a Board whose budget and activities are overseen by the county and another that would require a public hearing and environmental review before the county pays more than the assessed tax value for any property.

Noting the \$3.2 billion budget shortfall facing the state, Marcum said big-ticket items like the new detention center and public safety building may need to be re-evaluated with an eye to cutting costs.

Other Business

In other business during their Monday, December 6 meeting, the Moore County Board of Commissioners:

- Approved a revision to the contract under which the county has access to Microsoft operating systems and software for its computers.
- At the request of Commissioner Lea, tabled a request from Public Works for a \$724,800 water line upgrade that would provide fire flows needed to support

an expansion of Carolina Eye Associates on Midland Road, while at the same time improving the county's water system in that area and allowing it to purchase more water from Southern Pines. Lea asked that the Board consider the request in closed session, as is typically done for projects related to economic development, and the Board unanimously supported his motion.

- Approved a contract with Riley Paving for the patching and resurfacing of parking lots at the Ag Center, Health Department, and Property Management Department.
- Approved an interlocal agreement with Town of Vass that allows the county to contract for design work on a project that will extend the existing Vass sewer system to town residents who currently do not have sewer serv-

ice. The Town received a \$15,000 NC Rural Economic Development Center grant to help fund the project; the county's share of the costs totals \$7,500.

- Granted an easement to Progress Energy to allow a power line to be extended to the new water tower on Monticello Road in Pinehurst.
- Approved a memorandum of understanding with the state Crime Control and Public Safety Division that will allow Moore County, along with ten other counties, to receive a \$200,000 Homeland Security grant to fund the first phase of a project that will install transfer switches and generators to be used in case of emergency. Moore County will manage the multi-county project, which is expected to win similar grants in subsequent
- Appointed Commissioner Lea the county's delegate to the Triangle J Council of Governments, and Commissioner Caddell his alternate.
- Deferred filling a vacancy for an engineer and veterinarian on the Board of Health because there were no applicants for the position. Chairman Picerno encouraged qualified citizens to "step up." "It's a great Board to serve on," he added.
- Approved the bonds necessary to cover public officials, including the finance

officer, tax administrator, and sheriff, in the exercise of their duties.
