dents voted to borrow up to \$16 million to pay to extend water lines and other infrastructure needed to bring county water to the area surrounding water.

But, in the end, not enough homes signed up for county water to make the project viable. That leaves the county with \$16 million of borrowing authority that is set to expire in May.

Brobst suggested extending the Northwest Moore Water District to include both Robbins, assuming the town council approves, and Seven Lakes, which has a large enough installed base of water customers to make the District viable. The enlarged District could then borrow the \$16 million already approved and use that to build a new water treatment plant in Robbins and pay for

Flood plains & culverts at Westside meeting

It has taken nearly a decade of work, but the Seven Lakes West Landndowners Association [SLWLA] finally has a signed assurance that Lake Auman lots are not in a high hazard flood zone, Legal Director Ed Silberhorn reported during the Tuesday, January 25 Work Session. The lower risk designation means lakefront lot owners should not have to purchase expensive federal flood insurance.

Gerhard Hergenhahn spearheaded the effort to obtain official notification from Moore County that Lake Auman lots are not located within a Special Flood Hazard Area; Silberhorn thanked Hergenhahn for his effort, prompting a round of applause from the assembled landowners.

New map initially put Auman lots in flood plain

When, in 2002, the Federal Emergency Management Administration [FEMA] published drafts of new flood maps, parts of all 500 Lake Auman lakefront lots were shown in the "high hazard" flood zone, designated "AE," of the lake.

But, at the same time, they had determined the rise of the lake level in the hundredyear flood to be a mere threequarters of a foot, easily contained by the two-foot high bulkheads. Gerhard Hergenhahn, in cooperation with the Moore County Planning Department, launched an official protest. By the time the maps were declared final in Octoer of 2006, FEMA had redrawn the flood zone line: it is now identical with the shoreline, thus showing all lots in the low risk zone "Shaded X," identifying a statistical flood risk of once every 100 to 500 years.

Because of the low-risk designation, banks need not require their mortgage holders to buy mandatory flood insurance or provide an elevation certificate by a surveyor that would prove the low risk of the home. Instead, the homes automatically,

without survey, qualify for the much less expensive Preferred Rate Flood Insurance.

It is up to homeowners to decide if they want to buy such protection, based on considerations that include the elevation of the home

above the lake and where the home is situated on the lake. Though flooding from rising water is highly unlikely, wave action spawned by a severe stationary hurricane might put

some homes at risk of water penetration into the lower

many lots "underwater."

But, by the covenants, the title reaches only to the water or bulkhead line, independ-

unusual legal situation made it desirable to have an explicit declaration by the County Floodplain Administrator, which declares the lots to be outside the flood zone and allows surveyors to confirm this, even if the map appears to contradict.

This letter has been received now and was available as a handout to the meeting participants. It will later be published on the Association's web site.

Culvert repairs accelerated

The Association will be replacing four more culverts under Longleaf Drive over the next month, Infrastructure Director John Goodman reported, explaining that the condition of the first culvert replaced was worse than expected.

The good news is that detours are available at the other four culvert locations, so traffic will not be cut off from reaching either the front gate or back gate. Goodman noted that the thirteen Longleaf Drive culverts that will be repaired over the next three years are not the end of the project, because that doesn't account for side roads where many more culvert repairs will be needed in the

Dormie Club falls short on job creation

The developer of the Dormie Club — and would-be developer of Pine Forest — has failed to meet the job-creation goals called for in a \$500,000 grant that helped bring Moore County water to the upscale golf course development under construction off NC Highway 73. But the state agency that provided the funds is more interested in seeing the promised jobs created than in recouping the cash.

The North Carolina Rural Center grant that paid more than one-quarter of the cost of bringing water down NC Highway 73 from Eastwood was predicated on a simple formula: \$10,000 per job. Dormie Club developer MHK Ventures, Inc. pledged to create 50 full-time jobs within a year after the project was complete. The deadline was December 31, and the job count stood at 15, not 50, according to Walter J. MacKey, Jr., a principal in MHK.

Responding to a Rural Center request for information

on the number of jobs created, MacKey, in a letter to engineering firm Hobbs-Upchurch and Associates, said the development of Dormie Club had "been slowed down by construction delays, the recession, and bad weather."

While the Dormie Club golf course is substantially complete, the club is operating out of a temporary clubhouse, and no residential properties have been developed. MacKey's letter indicated another seven employees would be added in March, bringing the job total to twenty-two.

The 13,000 square-foot permanent clubhouse is expected to be finished by mid-2013, and the club will be fully operational by year-end 2013, Mackey writes, at which time it will be able to meet its commitment to provide 50 full-time jobs. The developer notes that his Thistle Golf Club project in Sunset Beach was completed in 2010 and now employs more than 50.

Reports filed with the Rural

that the extension of the county's water system to serve the Dormie Club cost just over \$1.6 million, of which Mackey Development paid \$609,000; the county paid \$564,000, and the Rural Center grant covered \$428,000.

However, it appears that this total may include a booster station and water line and tank upgrades required to bring water from the East Moore Water District to the county systems, benefitting not only future Dormie Club water users, but existing water users in Pinehurst and Seven Lakes.

Public Works Director Dennis Brobst told The Times on Wednesday that no county money was used to pay

Center by the county indicate for the water line extension to teh Dormie Club.

Grant extensions common

A three-way agreement that links MHK, the County, and the Rural Center allows the economic development agency to recapture the grant monies if the Dormie Club fails to meet its jobs commitment, but there's little indication the Rural Center is in a rush to make that move.

Fred Hobbs, of Hobbs-Upchurch, which is charged with administering the the Dormie Club grant on Moore County's behalf, told The *Times* that it is not unusual, particularly in difficult economic times, for the Rural Center to extend the job creation deadline for two, three, or even four years.

"We've had these projects that have gone into the fourth and fifth years," Hobbs said. "The only thing that would give pause to the Rural Center, would be if there were no golf course, no jobs, no activity. They would look askance at that."

Julie Haigler Cubeta, Senior Director of the Center's Physical Infrastructure Office, confirmed Hobbs' point.

"Many companies are having a hard time meeting their employment pledges," she told The Times. "We have extended deadlines out for a number of them. It's the economy."

"We want to create the jobs," Cubeta said. "We don't really want the money back."

County staffers brief Kiwanis on jail, NC 211

Two representatives from the Moore County office spoke to the Seven Lakes Kiwanis on Tuesday, January 25.

Ken Larking, Assistant County Manager, and Joey Raczkowski, Director of Planning and Community Development, spoke about two items of current interest — the new jail project in Carthage and the forthcoming widening of NC Highway 211.

Larking described the plans, reasons for, and cost of the new jail. The current jail is overcrowded. It has a rated capacity of 110 inmates, but is currently handling approximately 130 people.

The new facility will have 192 cells and if the single cells were converted to doubles, the capacity could actually be 256. The Sheriff's offices and the 911 facilities will also be a part of the new detention center. The cost is

currently figured to be about \$27 million, and the facility is expected to be completed by the Summer of 2012.

Raczkowski described, briefly, the plans for the widening of Hwy. 211 from Hwy. 73 in West End to the Pinehurst traffic circle. Concerns by the community, and even the DOT, continue to prompt questions about how the widened road will be fed into the traffic circle in Pinehurst and the two lane road in West End.

Many community meetings are planned in the near future to give the residents more

detailed information, and request ideas from the people who will regularly use the road.

Bids for the project are planned to be requested in October 2011. The expected cost of the project is estimated to be \$27million, and the anticipated completion is 2014.

Wildlife officers explain state's role on private lakes

"Education is crucial to keeping waterways safe," Sgt. Mark Dutton of NC Wildlife Resources Commission told residents during a special presentation at the North Clubhouse on Wednesday, January 26.

Dutton and fellow Wildlife Officer Gary Caulk attended this hour long 'meet and greet' at the invitation of Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Directors Bruce Keyser, Jr. and Chuck Mims, who are spearheading efforts to increase safe boating through education, improved rules and possible enforcement by the state agency.

"Our primary objective is to assist you and make your lakes a safe place for recreation," explained Dutton. "Does that come with a price? Yes. Let's not sugarcoat it, but you need to ask yourself some hard questions."

"Do you want to maintain the quality of life of the place you invested in? Do you want to maintain a safe recreation atmosphere? You need to ask yourself what you're tying to accomplish," he said.

Of particular concern in the last year has been an uptick in reports of impaired and reckless boating on Lake Sequoia, the community's largest lake and, arguably, most important asset.

"We have not taken these concerns lightly and we are looking at ways to curb past problems and prevent future ones," said Director Keyser. "We want whatever we do to be a positive for the community."

A first step towards that goal is a Boating Education Course for children and adults scheduled for Sunday, April 10, starting at 1:30 pm in the North Clubhouse. There is no fee to attend, but space is limited to thirty participants.

Misconceptions and common questions

Formed in 1947 to conserve and manage the state's fish and wildlife resources, the NC Wildlife Resources Commission [NCWRC] is also the primary agency tasked with enforcing boating safety. Currently, there are two hundred active officers and Dutton and Caulk, who both grew up and continue to reside in this immediate area, serve as the primary contacts for Moore County.

Jumping in feet first, Dutton addressed what is perhaps the number one misunderstanding about lakes who owns them?

Essentially, Lake Sequoia is a privately-controlled lake, but North Carolina laws apply.

"Your lakes are privatelycontrolled bodies of water. Your association surrounds and controls total access to the body of water — but every body of water in North Car-

information on other available olina is privately-owned. What is unique is that you control 360 degree access. You control who comes and goes," said Dutton.

> "The water in itself is not private: it is considered waters of the state. It is now, it has been, and always will be."

"Just because you haven't had law enforcement before [on Lake Sequoia] doesn't mean you haven't had to comply with state law. It just hasn't been enforced," said

The only exemptions to state-enforcement are granted for private ponds that are lined with a single tract of land: for example, an irrigation pond on a large tract of private land.

During questions, Northsider Joan DeBruin pointed out that Seven Lakes has many rules for boating but lacks a way to consistently enforce those regulations.

Dutton responded that a community may adopt stronger rules, but not more lenient ones, than state law.

Foxfire may get 156 acres, not \$1.4 million

Foxfire Village may well wind up with 156 acres of undeveloped land, rather than \$1.4 million it needs to pay for the recently completed Woodland Circle Extension project.

Quietly reading from a letter addressed to the Village Council during a Tuesday, February 1 public hearing on the project assesment, Mayor George Erickson reported that John McKeon's legal trust has offered to give

the Village its 156 acres rather than pay its \$1.4 milion share of the cost.

In January, McKeon notified the Council, through his attorney, that it was not economically appropriate for him to pay the assessment using the methodology the Council had selected for allocating the cost of the project among affected property owners.

The Council's plan called for assessing owners based on the total acreage they owned, rather than on a their proprtionate share of actual road

frontage.

McKeon asked the Council to reconsider the methodology; however, the Council expressed concern that

reversing course on the already approved preliminary assessment could completely negate the original

petition that allowed the project to move forward.

Foxfire Village attorney Michael Brough explained that McKeon's offer to donate the land would, in effect, provide a shorter and quicker process to reach where the Council would eventually end up if the landowner failed to pay his share: foreclosure.

Following a public hearing, the Council approved the assessment roll, including the fourteen affected property owners along the recently completed 1.5 mile roadway. With properties assessed using an equal prorata methodology of .20782 per square foot, McKeon's large tract garnered nearly

75% of the total project cost of \$1,996,667.

Councilman Ed Lauer was not in attendance; and, with a limited agenda in place for the public hearing, Brough recommended the Council take no immediate action on McKeon's offer.

"It would be preferable to wait until your next meeting to decide whether to accept this gift," cautioned Brough.

There were no other public comments; and, immediately following the hearing, the Council went into Closed Meeting to discuss McKeon's

The Times interviews Westside Candidates

Four candidates are in the running for three open seats on the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] Board of Directors in an election that will wrap up at the Annual Meeting in March.

Patti Cleary, Jim Ferguson, Jim McCarthy, and Jack Stevens each met with *The Times* for one-on-one interviews last week.

Our goal in these interviews was not to bombard candidates with a laundry list of questions, but rather to have a conversation about their priorities for Seven Lakes West and their interest in serving on the Board. In short, our goal was to have the same sort of conversation the candidates will likely have with individual landowners a dozen times between now and "election day."

The highlights of those conversations can be found on the next few pages of this edition.

Patti Cleary

Patti Cleary is no stranger to the SLWLA Board of Directors. Her husband, Ed Tuton, served as Board Secretary for three years, giving Cleary, as "secretary to the secretary," a unique window onto Association business. She told *The Times that, if elected*, she would like to take on the role of Board Secretary.

Cleary would bring to the post of Director thirty years of experience in banking, but said she feels current Treasurer Don Freiert is bettersuited to that office. Cleary held many managerial positions during her career and told *The Times* "I like to pride myself on the fact that I am not a micromanager and am a very good delegator."

As a bank manager, she said, she had to conduct a nearly endless series of regular audits. "And if a penny was missing, I was going to find it," she added.

Asked about Board priorities, Cleary mentioned several items the Board will need to

address in the next few years, including redesigning the front entrance, moving the mail house or building new mail house(s), repairing the thirteen culverts that need to be fixed under Longleaf Drive, and, eventually,

repaving the road.

One project that Cleary has helped with from the start and would like to see finished is the installation of fire hydrants throughout the community. Seven Lakes West "started off needing seventy-four hydrants in 2004, and we are down to thirty-one right now," she said. The county, which provides the labor for hydrant installation, is willing to install up to twelve fire hydrants a year.

Cleary said she hopes to see twelve installed each year installed until the project is complete — and noted she has the current Board's support for that goal. Getting the work done sooner rather than later is important, Cleary said, because the cost has increased by sixty four percent since 2004. "I would like to see this project done and turned over to the county," she said.

For four years, Cleary served as the Organizational Chairperson for the Area Representatives, during which she helped develop a telephone tree to help alert residents in case of emergency. If the cost is affordable, she would like to see a Reverse 911 system implemented in the community as a more effective means of accomplishing the same function.

Cleary told *The Times* that it is important to involve the community in decision making on major issues — but it is not possible to do it on every issue.

"The community elected people to represent them," Cleary said, referring to the Board. "We can not go to the community for everything that is done. That is why we elect directors and have so many committees."

Referring to a current survey of the membership that describes major projects and asks for feedback on their importance, Cleary said, "There is the community's opportunity to give their input."

However, on certain major issues, such as last year's (Continued on page 9)

closure of Longleaf Drive over Lake Auman Dam, Clearly said, landowners deserve additional opportunities for input. She told The Times she was surprised when the Board failed, initially, to designate the road closure as a matter of significant interest to the community.

"I know there are a couple of issues coming up in the next couple of years that will be more controversial," Cleary said. "I support going out to all 1800 landowners on those. You can't do that on every little thing. The dam was not a little thing. It was one of the biggest things that our community ever faced."

Turning to incorporation another major issue the Board dealt with this past year — Cleary feels that, "Seven Lakes West is perfectly fine the way we are and doesn't need another layer of government."

If elected to the Board, Cleary said she would be "representing the majority, not the minority."

Cleary is a master gardener, is politically involved, enjoys time with her family and volunteers throughout the community.

"That is why I am running" she said, "to keep the civility in the community."

Jim Ferguson

Jim Ferguson moved to Seven Lakes West almost two years ago and, he told The Times, immediately felt like he had known his neighbors for twenty years. After retiring from twenty-eight years working for the federal government, spending most of that time managing facilities for the General Accounting Office — a career that was preceded by stints in both purchasing and sales - Ferguson describes himself as a "jack of all trades."

Referring to the current atmosphere of Seven Lakes West, Ferguson called it a "nation divided" and said better communication is key to bringing the community back together. He feels it is important to get the community involved and "energized."

As an example, Ferguson

decision to apply a \$50,000 from a maturing CD to early payoff of the West Side Park mortgage. The decision was recommended by the Treasurer and approved by the Board as a routine matter with little discussion.

Ferguson suggested that offering the community more opportunity for input into the use of the \$50,000 might have led to a different decision, perhaps placing half on the mortgage and half on other projects. "How much money do we owe on the mortgage?" Ferguson asked. "Would the money have been better spent in a different manner?"

Asked what he hopes to accomplish if elected, Ferguson said, "One of the current board members said he was a little concerned that I

mentioned a recent Board didn't have an agenda — but I don't want to go in with an agenda. I want to make the community better, but that should be everyone's goal."

"Improving communications" is a priority for Ferguson, and he praised current efforts, like the redesigned SLWLA website. On the other hand, he asked "How many people don't have computers? Maybe we need to find out if putting more things on the web is the best way to get the information out." Ferguson said he wants to make sure that the method of disseminating information and collecting input doesn't exclude anyone.

When the Board is considering a problem or opportunity, he said, he would like to tell the community before something is done, not after. "After the fact is very difficult,"

Ferguson explained, "and, if you continue down that path, how do you stay on a cordial relationship?"

Ferguson told The Times he enjoys looking at all aspects of a project or issue. "I look at an issue from a 360 degree approach to figure out what something is made up of and how much something will cost."

Using the question of reopening to road over Lake Auman Dam as an example, Ferguson asked: "Did we look at all 360 degrees of that issue. Did we look at what it would cost to make the road usable? I don't know if anyone came up with a number."

"Is the dam going to fail eventually — even if no one uses the road?" Ferguson continued. "If we have a legal liability, then that cloud hangs over Seven Lakes West until the dam fails." He said he feared that legal liability was a problem for the Board as well. "There has to be a way the Board is prevented from being sued," he said, "so that litigation stops at Seven Lakes West [and doesn't extend to Board members.l"

communication, Ferguson suggested that the tone of the Board's straw poll on reopening the dam road was an example of how not to communicate. "There were people so angry over the letter that the dam road was secondary," he said.

Throughout the interview Ferguson reiterated that communication is key in the community, "Communicate and make it work." When asked what three words describe him Ferguson didn't hesitate to say, "Get 'er done. It doesn't matter what it is, you have to find a way to get it

Jim McCarthy

Jim McCarthy is a former New York City Detective who retired in Seven Lakes West three years ago. At the request of his friends, he decided to run for the Board. With over twenty years service as a police officer, McCarthy presents himself with a "can do anything" out-

Asked what he sees as key issues for the Association in the next couple of years, McCarthy mentioned getting the community more involved Returning to the topic of in decision making, exploring

back gate at Banbridge Drive and enhancing the overall safety of the community.

McCarthy's plan for greater community involvement in decision making would offer each Association member person a chance to vote on key issues by creating a system for online voting through the current Seven Lakes West website. Proposed projects to be voted on would be placed on the website with a full description and cost estimates. Voters would be able to see the total for and against, and see the numbers change as they cast their own vote for each project.

After an issue has been voted down once, McCarthy suggests that the Board could go back to the voters with an alternate proposal. "After an issue is voted down twice it can't be brought up again for another year," he said.

McCarthy said the system would not be used for projects that involve public safety, like the work to repair deteriorating culverts under Longleaf Drive. However, descriptions of even these non-discretionary projects

completion dates.

With this approach McCarthy feels, "people will have a say in what goes on." One of the key advantages of this approach, he explained, is that it will eliminate controversy in the community and the bad press that it engenders.

Referring to meetings on the Dam Road issues, he said, "If you were sitting through all those meetings, you had to have a bad picture of the whole thing You can't have property values go up in a war zone."

gleaf Drive over Auman Dam, McCarthy feels that an alternate exit should be made available for residents who live on the "right side" of the community — that is, those who turn right at the bottom of Lakeway Drive to travel to their homes. He noted that an accident on Longleaf near Carriage Park could leave folks on that side of the community effectively trapped until the roadway could be cleared.

"If Longleaf is blocked, we need to get people out another way," he told The Times, "Being a cop, I know an overturned truck can take up to four hours to be cleared out of the way."

McCarthy said adding a second back gate could also help improve EMS and Fire Department response times. As long as the front gate is accessible and Seven Lakes Fire or EMS can respond to a problem on the "right side" of the community, there is no major problem, he said.

"If everything is going to plan, it works out fine; but if you throw a wrench in it, not everything is fine," McCarthy said, stressing the need to plan for the worst case scenario. If Seven Lakes crews cannot respond, West End Fire and Rescue will be slowed by the need to open gates to cross the dam, he said.

If a second back gate cannot be added, McCarthy suggested installing signs that make clear where the cur-

rent emergency exits are front? The Board needs to located.

Other suggestions for improvement McCarthy mentioned include putting up a guardrail on Longleaf near Carriage Park and possibly beefing up the community's gates to something a bit more substantial than downspouts.

With a background in police work McCarthy feels he would be a great fit for the Safety and Security position on the Board. Asked what skills he could bring to the Board, McCarthy said, "I was a cop. My skill is police work. I guess you could say I have a master's degree in attitude adjustment.'

"You have to have it in your head that you are trying to represent all the people in the community," he told *The* Times, "not just the Board or yourself." During the dam road debate, "I heard words' like arrogant, stupid, selfish. I'm sitting in the back and shaking my head. I think that we need to move in a different direction."

"Do you think that you should go into a community meeting and see cops in the back and two lawyers up

Ultimately, McCarthy said, he would like for Seven Lakes West to be "a happy place for people to live."

Jack Stevens

Jack Stevens is a semiretired nurse anesthetist who is involved in several community organizations, including the Lake Auman Sports Club and the National Sporting Clay Association. He is also an avid fly fisher and an accomplished pilot of both planes and helicopters.

Having reduced his work schedule to twenty hours a week, Stevens told The Times, he now has the time needed to serve on the Board. He





lytical," two qualities that he believes will prove useful in pursuing whatever goals the Board sets going forward.

Stevens said he hoped to foster what he called "a coalition of community interests."

"In a community, there are always people who agree and disagree about particular issues," he explained. "We need to foster real opportunities to hear different opinions."

Stevens told The Times he is happy with the strides that have been made by the current Board to keep Westsiders informed — in particular, the newly redesigned SLWLA website. He credited Director Jane Sessler for coming up with "great things" for the website such as a featured Photo of the Week submitted by an Association member. He suggested that the community also establish a presence on Facebook.

"The advantage of having things on the internet is that it opens the whole process up to the public," Stevens said.

He also praised the expansion of offline offerings like the continuation of the Summer First Fridays Concert Series into the off season with the new Winter Music Series. Such opportunities "incorporate the community," Stevens said. "They invite participation."

Stevens told The Times he would be happy to serve in any position on the Board - except, perhaps, that of Secretary.

"I have horrible handwriting," he admitted. "And I would much rather pay attention to what's being said." He felt that there might be some advantages to having Board members switch jobs on the Board throughout their tenure.

Asked whether the Board could have handled recent controversial issues like incorporation or the closure of the dam road more effectively, Stevens said the community "should look forward" rather than backward and focus on the positive.

With over forty-two years as

a nurse anesthetist Stevens'

feels he is qualified to make tough choices. "I spent a lifetime making critical, quick decisions, both professionally and avocationally," he said.

Asked about issues the community will face in the next few years, Stevens mentioned the issue of providing additional access into the community — for example, by opening a second back gate on Bainbridge Drive. "Some people who live near the exit may disagree with it, while some may agree with it because it will make their travel time easier." Stevens said.

The construction of a new mail house or mail houses is another issue "where there will be considerable disagreement," Stevens said. He noted that "long range planning is an issue that need considerable thought."

As elected officials, SLWLA Directors have the responsibility to "analyze facts and issues before them and make decisions that may or may not be popular," Stevens said. "Being data-driven is an important part of how I have lived my life," he added.

But "leaders must be open to modifying the approach,"





Dormie Club & Pine Forest Linked

Dormie Club developer MHK Ventures is currently seeking PUD-Hamlet rezoning for a nearby 1,700-acre tract that it plans to develop into Pine Forest, a mixed residential and commercial development with three golf courses, 700-800 homes, a resort hotel and conference

center and two shopping areas.

Pine Forest will also feature a private wastewater treatment plants — a first for Moore County — which will reclaim treated wastewater for the irrigation of golf courses and common areas. The treatment plant will also handle effluent from Dormie Club, which has soils that are in many cases unsuit-

able for septic fields. Initially, waste will be transferred from the County's sewer system to the Pine Forest plant, so that it has enough waste to process and produces the irrigation water the developer will need to establish its golf courses.

If the rezoning is approved, MHK has pledged to pay \$3 million toward the cost of adding 500,000 gallons of additional capacity to the county water system to supply the needs of its residents and visitors.

Under the proposed water agreement between MHK and Moore County — which has not yet been approved by the Board of Commissioners — the county would pledge to work with MHK to seek federal and state grants to help pay for the cost of bringing county water to the development.

For example, NCWRC officers only police boats in motion and cannot enforce a speed limit or curfew hours on Lake Sequoia; however, they can address any criminal activity witnessed, such

as disorderly conduct or reckless and negligent boat operation

In addition, there are alternative options the community can undertake to broaden enforcement, Dutton said, including petitioning the state

for an enforceable 'no wake' zones around a troublesome area – such as along a lake perimeter or a boat launch.

Two state laws that are often overlooked, Dutton said, require boat operators under the age of twenty-six years to take a certified boating safety course, and require children under the age of thirteen years to wear a life jacket when a boat is in motion.

"Education is very beneficial. You can go overboard and be too regulatory. You have to let people go out and enjoy recreational boating, but within certain parameters," concluded Dutton.

postponed any further discussion to allow new management an opportunity to evaluate the department and make its own recommendation.

Speaking during Wednesday night's meeting, Darr said his 2009 analysis, using a methodology approved by the Finance Committee, determined that in-house mowing costs totaled \$57,400 annually, including wages, benefits, equipment depreciation, seed, fertilizer, and fuel. The lowest bid solicited in 2009 for the same work totaled \$98,000.

Darr questioned the contract now being proposed, which, at \$146,4000, is more than two and a half times his estimate for in-house costs.

"At a minimum, I ask you to table this until a timely and thorough analysis can be done — open and not behind closed doors," said Darr.

Earlier in the meeting, Northsider Conrad Meyer, who is also a candidate in the upcoming Board election, made a similar recommendation that the vote on outsourcing be postponed.

Meyer agreed that it was appropriate for the Board to evaluate whether tasks completed in-house were costcompetitive, but said he was disappointed in the rush to make a decision, when so little information had been made available to the membership.

Referring to the FY 2011-2012 Budget on the table for approval, he noted that there were in fact two versions: one with the in-house staffing that was reviewed in detail by the Finance Committee, and a second proposal, not reviewed by the Finance Committee, that includes the cost of outsourcing maintenance.

Arguing that it is the Finance Committee's responsibility to provide unbiased financial analysis, Meyers charged, "They have not been consulted on this matter. Why not? If this is such a good deal, show it to us!"

Defending the proposal,

SLLA President Randy Zielsdorf maintained that the topic of outsourcing should not be a surprise since it was discussed openly in 2009 and that the proposed contract has been reviewed, "backward, forward, upside and downside, and every which way."

However, the crowd was not swayed, as other speakers, including former SLLA Treasurer Steve Hudson, questioned costs and how the contract was reviewed. Other speakers during public comment took a more personal approach, asking the Board to reconsider the loss of longtime maintenance employees.

"Where are they going to find work?" asked Northsider Bev Sommers, noting that the North Carolina unemployment rate is higher than the national average. "The term outsourcing is offensive to me. Outsourcing has contributed to the recession."

Picking up on Zielsdorf's estimate that outsourcing would be revenue neutral, Donna Fentzlaff pressed for more information, "I want to know how much is being saved. We shouldn't put people out of work if nothing is to be gained."

Jerry Johnson, Bill Yarish, and former SLLA president Ed Chapman argued that inhouse maintenance had performed very well with supervision and should not be faulted for the naturally aging appearance of the community.

Following the contentious and lengthy public comment period, the motion to approve the landscape maintenance contract with a outside company was tabled in a split vote, when Director Bud Shaver requested the Board consider a third option that had not been previously discussed.





[Editor's note: None of the three options have been presented in an open meeting or made available to the membership. Option one is apparently to continue with in-house maintenance; option two, to outsource maintenance; and option three remains a mystery.]

Board approves FY 2011-2012 Budget

In other business during Wednesday's Open Meeting, the SLLA Board approved the \$1.37 million FY 2011-2012 Budget that — for now — retains the current inhouse maintenance staff.

The \$1.37 million in anticipated income includes dues, interest, and and various fees — but no dues increase. SLLA dues will remain at \$900 for homeowners, \$570 for lots, \$397 for multiple lot owners, \$410 for renters, and \$230 for owners of the rental property. Homeowner's dues include \$100 that can be used only for building reserve funds for roads and state-mandated dam repairs.

Anticipated administration expenses totaling \$737,647 include \$313,976 for salaries and \$53,376 in taxes, both showing only slight increases over last year's budget. More significant increases were noted under group insurance, which at \$25,000 is \$8,000 over FY 2010-2011, and for the \$223,588 security contract, which represents a \$37,400 increase. However, these figures were offset by sizable decreases in utilities, which at \$30,500 is down \$10,200; and professional fees, which at \$10,000 had dropped significantly from last year's \$69,692 budget.

Maintenance expenses for repairs and grounds are budgeted to increase from \$4,000 to \$10,000; while equipment costs are expected to drop from \$13,000 to \$5,000. During the Finance Committee report, Treasurer Denny Galford said the FY 2011-2012 budget also includes funding for a maintenance supervisor and minor wage increases.

For recreation, anticipat-

ed repairs and maintenance costs for the pool dropped from \$11,000 to \$5,000; special events budgeting increased \$1,000; and horse feed and contract services also showed moderate increases.

Other anticipated increases includes property management expenses up nearly \$20,000, along with \$4,000 additional toward printing, postage and supplies, \$3,500 in legal fees, and \$10,000 toward bad debt.

Driving Range Agreement

Pleased to finally report progress on the three-year-old agreement with Seven Lakes Country Club [SLCC] over future use and development on the old driving range property, President Zielsdorf arrived at the Wednesday, January 26 Open Meeting with several documents in

hand.

Zielsdorf indicated he had final drafts of the proposed ten-foot buffer easement along Seven Lakes Drive, the Club's covenants, and a draft of the amended agreement. He requested a special Closed Meeting immediately following the Open Meeting to allow the Board time to review and discuss any proposed changes.

Zielsdorf thanked Director Melinda Scott, and SLCC representatives Steve Ritter and Ed Massimo for their assistance in finalizing details.

"We all sat down and had a very frank discussion," Zielsdorf said. "A lot of phone calls followed, and we now have an amended agreement that they [the Club] are indicating they want to get signed." He suggested that could happen as early as next week.

Security and Safety

Two minor amendments to boating safety regulations that require boaters to comply with North Carolina laws, as well as SLLA rules, and that no homemade float boats may be registered, were quickly approved.

Also approved — though on a split vote with Shaver opposed — was an amendment recommending specific penalties for first, second, and third/subsequent boating infractions. [Scott was also opposed but not present to vote.]

However, a controversial addition to boating rules developed to curb boating under the influence, particularly on Lake Sequoia, ran aground and was tabled for further discussion.

As presented, the rule simply states, "Motor boats will not be operated by persons using alcoholic beverages or drugs." The intent is equally simple: to beef up an existing rule that reiterates state law that forbids operating a boat



under the influence. The problem is such influence can only be determined by certified law enforcement sobriety tests. Mims explained that the recommended addition would allow SLLA security to report observed drunken boating to Judicial Panel.

What the proposed amendment lacked was a way to define appropriate alcohol consumption with safe boating.

"My concern is to make sure there is way to differentiate between drunken operation of a boat and a resident having a glass of wine and going out for an evening cruise," Treasurer Galford commented.

Recreation

In similar discussion, safe boating was the featured topic earlier on Wednesday, January 26, when Sgt. Mark Dutton of NC Wildlife Resources Commission met with residents to explain what services, safety courses, and enforcement options are available to the community.

Dutton was joined by Wildlife Officer Gary Caulk, the son of longtime Northside resident and retired NC Wildlife Officer Gary Caulk. 



- Just south of the Community Center/Otter Drive from January 13 to February 4
- Just south of Callis Circle from February 7 to February 11
- First culvert west of the Lake Auman dam from February 14 to February 18
- Second culvert just west of Lake Auman dam from February 21 to February 25 Goodman said the schedule could change, depending on the weather.

Repaying of the repaired areas will be delayed until the weather warms in Spring.

Snow & Ice Preparedness

Snow capped by a thick layer of ice made for treacherous roads in Seven Lakes West and have set Security Director John Hoffmann to looking for better options in dealing with winter weather events, he reported during Tuesday's work session.

Hofmann said Community Manager Joan Frost administers the current snow and ice response plan, which relies on two separate contractors to plow, spread sand, and-or spread ice melt in strategic locations. None of those efforts proved particularly successful in the most recent storm, Hoffmann said.

The Association does not currently use brine on the roads when a storm is forecast.

Hoffmann said he has spoken with a half-dozen other communities to see what may be learned frrm their storm preparation and response.

Resident Tom Wallace asked if something could be done sooner rather than later. He referred to the hills on the west side of the main entrance as being in "abhorrent condition" after the last snow/ice storm.

Hoffmann said all that could be done was done during during the last ice storm, noting that sand was put out — but without sunshine it did little good. He said that every possible way to deal with snow and ice that is both reasonable and affordable is being looked into.

Community Events

Events Director Jane Sessler reported that the first Winter Concert was held on January 14 and attracted sixty people. The next concert will be held on Saturday, February 5 at 7 pm at the WSPCC with a concert by Tony Barnes a solo singer and guitarist.

Other Business

In other business during the Tuesday, January 25 SLWLA Work Session:

- President Ron Shepard has sent the Moore County Board of Commissioners a letter asking them to schedule a second public meeting hosted by the Greater Seven Lakes Community Council to focus on two key issues: water in Seven Lakes and the proposed Pine Forest Development. Shepard is hoping for the meeting to take place sometime in February.
- Nominations for the Joe Fellingham Community Service Award for volunteerism are currently being accepted. President Shepard asked for written nominations to be submitted by Tuesday, March 1. The Board will vote on a candidate and the recipient will be announced at the Annual Meeting in March.
 - The landscaping around

the mail house has been removed and replaced with mulch, Community Manager Frost reported. Flower boxes will be added to the area as well. Shrubs that were obstructing the view from the exit have also been removed.

- Frost said she is working on a proposal to landscape the intersection of Longleaf and Otter Drive.
- An electrical short that could have potentially caused a fire at the gate house and mail house was repaired, Frost reported.
- An \$1800 insurance check was received for repairs to the Gate House after a truck hit the building. Frost recommended that the Board

place the money in a fund going toward the new Gate House instead of making the repairs to the current building. Director Hoffmann agreed that it would be unwise to spend the money on nonessential structural repairs but asked that the repairs, be made to restore the appearance of the structure.

- Legal Director Ed Silberhorn reported that the annexation of the Stonegate subdivision, near the back gate, is now complete.
- President Shepard introduced Luci Hadlock, a veteran CAS employee who has joined the SLWLA office staff, taking over the duties of Katie Patnode, who has been promoted within CAS.

a water line to carry water from Robbins to Seven Lakes, where it would join the county system.

The estimated cost of the water line is \$3.6 million, Brobst told the Commissioners; a 1.5 million gallon per day treatment plant would likely cost \$6-10 million. Brobst noted that the existing Robbins water plant had been out of service for long enough that any attempt to bring it back online would have to meet the same state standards as building a new plant. In either case, the water plant would be fed by the existing reservoir and water intake owned by the Town of Robbins.

Robbins currently purchases water from Montgomery County, and Brobst said the rate the town pays is "on the steep side." So the town's water customers could benefit from being rolled into the district. Seven Lakes residents would benefit by gaining a second source of water. Brobst noted that removing Seven Lakes ratepayers from the Moore County Public Utilities [MCPU] customer base could result in a rate increase for those customers who remain, principally in Pinehurst. Seven Lakes customers account for \$1.3 million of MCPU revenues, he said.

Brobst told the Board that the county's authority to borrow the \$16 million bond approved in 2004 could be extended for three years, through application to the North Carolina Local Government Commission, but the timeframe to do so is tight. The Commissioners voted unanimously to instruct the county staff to begin working on the extension.

If the approval is forth-coming, Brobst said, the time-frame will also be very tight to actually build or restore the water plant in Robbins and lay the pipe to Seven Lakes. Chairman Nick Picerno asked about the possibility of drawing water from the Deep River, rather than simply from the creeks that feed the Town of Robbins' reservoir. Brobst said it was unlikely that could

be accomplished within the three year period that the bonds can be extended, but could be a longer term goal for the District.

Though Seven Lakes would be included within the expanded North Moore Water District, voters in the Seven Lakes Precinct did not cast ballots in the 2004 bond referendum that authorized the District to borrow \$16 million. Brobst told *The Times* that the County's bond counsel has assured him that the

Commissioners have the authority to expand the district to include Seven Lakes.

Commissioners will meet with 7 Lakes Council

The Commissioners accepted an invitation from the Greater Seven Lake Community Council [GSLCC] to meet on Tuesday, March 8 at 5 pm to discuss water and zoning, zoning changes, County budget, and road standards.

In a letter sent to the Board,

the GSLCC's asked that the County resolve water supply issues in Seven Lakes before approving the rezoning necessary for the development of the proposed Pine Forest Planned Unit Development. Pine Forest would occupy a 1,700 acre stretch of land located along the north side of NC Highway 211 from West Pine Middle School to West End.

The Council also asked that the county address options for "an adequate supply of good drinking water" and the long and short term effects that Pine Forest would have on the Seven Lakes Area. The County budget and how it will affect Seven Lakes will also be up for discussion, as will current road standards for new subdivisions. The GSLCC is concerned about "inferior internal roads" and asked if the County would consider requiring that new communities' private roads meet state standards.



The president, vice-president and secretary of Save Our Sandhills [SOS] voiced their opposition to the environmental impact that the Pine Forest Development would have on Nick's Creek, which rises from headwaters within the 1,700 acre tract.

Although developer MHK Ventures has assured the Board that they would place twenty-five foot buffers between the creek bank and golf courses and other developed areas to prevent contamination due to runoff, SOS Vice President Bob Stolting said that buffer will be punched full of holes as trees are cleared for shot corridors and cart and foot path crossings. Nick's Creek is the primary water source for the Town of Carthage.

Geologist Bob Ganis reminded the Board that the developer by state law will have the right to withdraw water from Nick's Creek if it is needed. He asked for an impact study to be conducted to better analyze the consequences of a water being withdrawn from Nick's Creek or of a spill at the private wastewater treatment facility that will be built to serve the community.

Mollie Boggis of Whispering Pines expressed concern that her community — further down the creek than Carthage — could be harmed by water withdrawals from or pollution of Nick's Creek. Leonard Tufts was worried that county money would ultimately wind up paying for part of the Pine Forest water and sewer infrastructure, giving the developer a "free ride from the county on tax payer money." SOS President Joe McDonald told the Board it is possible for the county to expand its economy without cutting down more trees and developing more land.

Whispering Pines Mayor Bob Zschoche, who noted he was speaking as a private citizen, how many more golf courses would be allowed to utilize free of charge the surface and ground water of the county.

"Pine Forest" Public Hearing Reopened February 15

Planning Director Joey Raczkowski asked and the Board agreed to reopen the public hearing on the Pine Forest rezoning request on February 15 at 6:00 pm.

Raczkowski said, after reviewing testimony from the January 18 public hearing, there are a number of questions that the Planning Department needs to have answered before they can give staff recommendations to the Board. He noted that previous testimony from the January 18 hearing is already part of the public record and need not be repeated.

After Commissioner Larry Caddell recused himself from voting, the Board approved Raczkowski's request in a 4-0 vote.

Pine Forest Water and Sewer Contracts Tabled

Again without the participation of Commissioner Caddell, the Board of Commissioners voted 4-0 that consideration of water and wastewater contracts for the Pine Forest PUD be tabled until the question of rezoning the property is resolved.

The two pending contracts would require the developer to: construct a one million gallon per day water re-use wastewater treatment plant at the developer's sole expense, operate at the developer's expense a non-potable water distribution system for irrigation; and pay the County the sum of \$3 million toward the cost of providing additional water capacity in the county system.

The contracts would require the County to construct a water line extension to serve the development and guarantee a maximum of 500,000 gallons per day of potable water.

County Pledges \$250,000 toward Airport Grant

After considerable debate, the Commissioners approved Tuesday night a \$250,000 local match that will allow the Moore County Airport Authority to tap a State Aid to Airports Block Grant for \$2.5 million. The airport will use the money for an upgrade of their runway and ramp system, which the Authority hopes to complete prior to the 2014 US Men's and Women's Open, which will be held back-to-back in Pinehurst.

Introducing his motion to pledge the local match, Commissioner Craig Kennedy made strong case for the strength of the airport's management and the facility's contribution to the county's economy. He noted that the airport is, in fact, a county asset that belongs to all the people of Moore County.

McSwain had outlined several possible sources for the money, at the request of Commissioner Tim Lea, including the possibility that the County would lend the money to the Airport.

Responding to that idea, Ron Maness, Director of the Moore County Airport said, "If you burden us with a loan and repayment schedule" he could not predict what the revenues would be to repay the loan.

Commissioner Nick Picerno agreed with Kennedy that County should pledge the \$250,000 but suggested the money be taken from some source other than general fund tax dollars. That source, which went unnamed, appeared to be something the Commissioners had discussed among themselves outside the confines of Tuesday Night's open meeting

Ultimately, the Board unanimously approved Kennedy's motion to provide the matching funds, without designating any specific source for the money.

Other Business

In other business during the Tuesday, February 1 Board of Commissioners meeting:

- The Commissioners approved a resolution in support of the current system for the sale of alcoholic beverages in the state the local ABC boards.
- The Board approved the early payoff of nearly \$1.4 million in debt, most of it involving the purchase and remodeling of the Carriage Oaks Shopping Center in Carthage, which is now home to the county's Department of Social Services and Planning Department. Depending on interest rates, the early payoff should save the county approximately \$78,000 over the next five years.
- The Board approved the rezoning of 5.8 acres of a

45.06 tract of land located at the southeast corner of Lobelia Road and McPherson Road from rural agricultural to rural business. The rezoning will allow for traditional small business enterprises.

- The Board approved text amendments to the zoning ordinance that will allow "Feed Processing" as a permitted use in the Heavy Commercial (I-2) zoning district and add silos, grain elevators, and conveyors to the list of structures exempt from the height limit requirements.
- The Commissioners called for a public hearing on Tuesday, February 15 at 6 pm to consider text amendments to the Moore County Zoning Ordinance that would add "Human Services Center" as a per-

mitted use in the Neighborhood Business (B-1), Highway Commercial (B-2), and Office and Professional (O-P) zoning districts. The modification was prompted by a proposal to open a full service Human Services Center that would allow individuals to gain new skills, receive assistance, and re-join the workforce.

- The Board approved the Moore County Mitigation Advisory Committee [MAC] to serve as a subcommittee to the Local Emergency Planning Committee [LEPC] to maintain the goals and strategies of the 2010 Multi Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- The following roads have been approved by the Board and will be added to the North Carolina System of Secondary Roads:

Islay Drive, Rosslyn Chapel Lane, Kirkcaldy Lane, North Prince Henry Way and South Prince Henry Way. The roads are located in Phase 1 of the Sinclair Subdivision near Vass.
