## Construction up on West Side

A few years ago, before the Great Recession of 2009, a headline in this newspaper

trumpeted the news that fifty homes were under construction in Seven Lakes West.

Then the bottom fell out of the economy, buyers vanished, construction dried up, and homes languished on the market.

Five years later, there are signs of a resurgence on the West Side.

During the Tuesday, September 23 meeting of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] Board, Architectural Review Director Dan Blue reported that thirteen new homes are under construction and seven more permits are under review.

"There is an uptick in terms of residential construction," Blue said. "There is an increased interest in developing some of those lots which are currently undeveloped."

Blue noted that roadwork had begun that same day on the Stonegate subdivision (See "Westside," p. 14)

## Council reviews solar farm rules

The Foxfire Village Council's September 18 Work Session featured a primer on commercial solar farms, as the Council worked through a zoning ordinance amendment, crafted by the Planning & Zoning Committee, that would allow commercial solar installations in the Extraterritorial Jurisdiction [ETJ] that surrounds the village.

Louis Iannone, a site acquisition specialist with Strata Solar, provided the council with information on commercial solar. Strata is solar farm developer headquartered in Chapel Hill.

In January, ETJ resident

David Wilson requested a conditional use permit for a 35 acre commercial solar farm on a portion of his 350-plus-acre farm, which lies near the intersection of Hoffman Road and NC Highway 211. The village's Planning and Zoning Committee was asked to research solar farms and make a recommendation to the Council.

During an informal question and answer forum, Iannone was asked to break down the process of building a solar farm.

"Most often we work on sites that are already cleared," Iannone explained. "We don't change the existing ground."

"On a typical site, no clearing and grading is required; and, most often, we don't

## Racine: Pool plans need more scrutiny

Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] President Bob Racine took the unusual step of laying aside his gavel to address his fellow board members during the public comment segment of the association's Wednesday, September 26 Open Meeting.

The climbing cost of proposed repairs to the Northside pool prompted Racine's comments — as well as the fact that the SLLA Recreation Committee has yet to be consulted on that project.

During the board's Monday, September 8 work session, landowner Les Som-

mers objected that plans for renovations to the pool and pool deck had been shared with the community and sent out for bids without being vetted by the Recreation Committee.

At that time, Racine promised that the committee would be consulted before the project came to the board for approval. Yet, the Community Manager's report in the Open Meeting packet indicated that three bids for the work are in hand, have been reviewed by the Facility Committee, and are ready for the Finance Committee review before Board action. No mention was made of the Recreation Committee.

"I walked around the pool,"

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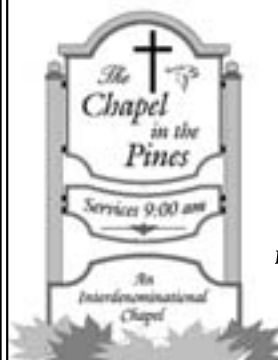
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## Fall horse festival

# Council ponders non-resident use of pool

Swimmers who aren't residents of Foxfire Village might be left high and dry next pool season if the Village Council acts on an idea floated during their Thursday, September 18 Work Session.

Responding to a resident's complaint about non-resident use of the pool this summer, Councilwoman Leslie Frusco suggested that the village could eliminate daily swim passes and multi-day punch cards, instead offering only annual pool memberships.

Memberships sold to non-residents could be priced at a substantial premium over resident passes, she noted, requiring non-residents to pay as much as \$500 for a pass that costs residents \$150.

Councilman Jon Sedlak worried that the higher rate might prevent non-residents from using the pool.

"I could care less," Frusco replied.

Village Attorney Michael Brough has advised the Council that they probably cannot legally adopt an outright ban on non-resident use of the pool.

This past summer, both residents and non-residents were charged \$5 per day to swim. Residents could, alternatively, purchase a ten-day punch card for \$25 or buy a \$150 annual membership that allowed up to four family members to use the pool for the season. Punch cards and memberships were not offered to non-residents.

Currently, Moore County has only three swimming pools open to the general public, including the Foxfire Village pool. Southern Pines

charges residents \$2 per day for adults and \$1 for children at its public pool. Non-residents are charged \$2 for children and \$4 for adults. The non-profit public pool at Cannon Park in Pinehurst has

had a similar fee structure for residents and non-residents.

**Resident's complaint sparks conversation**

A resident's complaint

spurred the Work Session discussion of pool use.

"In a review of the community pool use during the course of this season, we received an email from a res-

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# Seven Lakers Adam Faw and MacKenzie

Two Seven Lakers will join a large cast of both professional and amateur actors in the Judson Theatre Company's production of *To Kill a Mockingbird*, based on the novel by Harper Lee.

Seven Lakes residents Adam Faw and MacKenzie Kennedy will play the roles of father and daughter, Bob Ewell and Mayella Ewell.

Judson's Executive Producer, Morgan Sills, is a Moore County native who was one of the producers of the 2014 Broadway revival of *Of Mice and Men*, starring Oscar and Emmy nominee James Franco.

The company brings professional actors from the stages of New York and soundstages of Los Angeles, pairing them with local thespians to mount ambitious local productions of theatrical classics like *Driving Miss Daisy* and *Steel Magnolias*.

*Mockingbird* stars Johnny Whitaker, of *Family Affair* and *Tom Sawyer*.

Kennedy and Faw, who were cast in local auditions held on July 28, were anxious to begin rehearsal with such a stellar cast.

"Every night at rehearsal I am just so amazed with what I see," Faw said, noting that the younger performers in the show are from eight to thirteen years old.

"I am amazed with the little kids," Kennedy said. "I remember when I was that age. I wouldn't have been able to remember the lines. Sometimes you forget they're little kids, with how mature they are and the way they act."

With only two weeks to rehearse before the final production, the rehearsal timetable requires intense concentration.

"Everyone is here, ready to work, lines memorized, ready to go, and it has come together faster than [anything] I have ever seen," Faw said. "And that is due to Daniel, Morgan, and their organization."

Judson's Artistic Director,

Daniel Haley, directed the company's Moore County productions of *Love Letters* and *Driving Miss Daisy*.

"It's very organized; you have your breaks at the right time," Kennedy adds. "We have the talent in this town."

"And we have the audiences to support it," Faw continued.

Faw, who is in his twelfth year of teaching theatre at Pinecrest High School and serves as the Cultural Arts Department Chair, has not always pursued acting. There were few opportunities for acting in the small town in which he grew up, and he first realized his passion for the arts in college.

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*Mockingbird* is his first time acting in eight years, and Faw said the experience is renewing his passion for the art.

"I'm really enjoying it," he said. "I'm remembering why I dove into it in the first place."

Kennedy, 17, is a student of Faw's at Pinecrest and has been performing since the seventh grade.

Her love for acting began as a child, inspired by movies and plays. Seeing *Titanic* in the first grade, she was inspired by Leonardo DiCaprio's passion.

"I absolutely could not believe it; it was the best thing I ever saw in my entire life," Kennedy said. "Ever since then I knew. I would tell my mom and dad 'I want

to be on TV.' I always wanted to be like Leonardo DeCaprio — or at least have an ounce of his talent."

So far in Kennedy's acting career, her current role of Mayella Ewell is her favorite — and is also the most mature role she has handled.

"I like that aspect of it," Kennedy explains. "As I'm getting older, the parts become more mature."

As a teacher, Faw's favorite part of acting is "seeing what it can do for students."

"I think the thing that I love about it is, with the play, the further we get to the production, the less it becomes the director's play and [the more] it becomes the students'," he said. "On production night I sit in the audience, and it's really scary — because, if anything goes wrong, I can't do anything. But at the same time, it is incredibly gratifying."

The camaraderie and teamwork of the cast are what both Faw and Kennedy enjoy most about acting.

Faw said he is inspired by "the camaraderie with the

cast, from the little kids to the New York professionals, watching and learning from everyone, and getting to be a part of this absolutely incredible group. It's humbling."

"It's just always been my favorite just to get ready with everyone to put on the show," Kennedy explained. "You go backstage, and you can see everyone is getting really excited. Then the curtain opens, and everyone falls into character."

"I think working with people who are professionals and who are better than you . . . helps you to learn more and it helps you to realize there's so much more for you to learn," she said.

Working with the professionals in the *Mockingbird* cast is "a really good challenge for me," Faw said. "It's helped me as an actor and as a teacher just to put myself back into the shoes of an actor. Even with a small professional theatre, like this, [there's] so much talent. [It's amazing] the shows, movies, and TV shows that some of these actors have been in. Even some of the kids have

been on TV. It's just very humbling to stand back and realize 'Wow! This is so much bigger than we realize sometimes.' It's a good thing to

put it into perspective and to be able to be a part of that."

Kennedy dreams big when she sets goals for her acting

career.

"My dream, and I've dreamed it many times, is accepting an Oscar and having it." (See "Mockingbird," p. 18)

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# West End United Methodists celebrate the

West End had a gym before it had a church.

So it's more than a little fitting that more than one hundred members and friends of West End United Methodist Church [WEUMC] gathered in the Old West End High School gym on Sunday, September 28, to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of their church.

The West End School was an educational mecca for rural children in the early 1900s. Its gymnasium provided a Sunday afternoon meeting spot for both Methodists and Presbyterians, who attended joint services led by whichever preacher

happened to pass through.

One of those circuit-riding preachers, the Reverend W.H. Brown, founded West End's Methodist church in 1914 with fifteen charter members.

Luckily, VonCannon Mill-work Company was across the way. J.B. VonCannon provided the wood and materials to build the church. VonCannon and Farley H.

Lewis did much of the finishing woodwork themselves.

The adult Sunday School met upstairs on a sloping balcony with no rails.

West End native William Johnson told the story: "Dock Smith lost his balance and fell over the side. Another member reached out and grabbed his ankle just in time, before his head hit the

floor."

Hindsight is 20/20, and, in no time, a balcony railing

was constructed.

Webb, a Candor native, has played since she was six years old. Raised a Baptist, she took her first job playing, for a nearby Methodist Church, when she was ten.

"I was Baptist until I was ten," she said. "We lived five minutes from a Methodist Church, and they needed a piano player. My parents talked long about it, and we moved to the Methodist Church, and I started playing there."

Webb now lives in Troy, commuting for the two Sunday services.

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# Historic West End home makes its debut

Kathryn Anderson grew up in West End. Her family's homeplace is a century-old two-story brick house with large white columns tucked

back behind large magnolias. The smell of wood smoke carries on the breeze.

The house has been renovated twice since 2001 — once after recovering from a flood. With most of the

restoration complete, Anderson opened up the house for tours and refreshments on Sunday, September 28, to celebrate the West End United Methodist Church's Centennial.

Restoring the house and grounds is an ongoing project. Anderson and her kin have worked up to the last minute,

clearing and burning grapevines, limbs, and leaf litter.

"This is my family home," Anderson said. "I have been coming here since I was born. I love this area. I wanted to restore it so that my kids, nieces, and nephews would have a place to come."

A physician's assistant in St Louis, Anderson has overseen much of the work from afar, making frequent trips to check on the progress.

The interior of the old

house is freshly painted in period colors of yellow, green, and soft blue, trimmed in crisp white. In the dining room, a table is spread with homemade refreshments and chilled fruit punch in the cut glass bowl.

In an upstairs bedroom, the blue green painted bead-board is a clever study in geometry. The boards running on the diagonal and meeting in deep V's. The care

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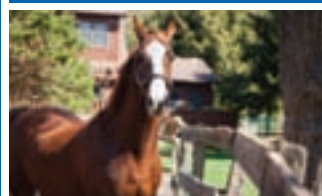
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## School Board Candidate Forum

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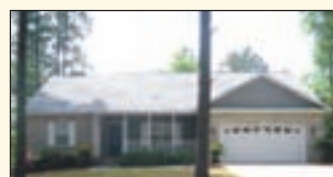

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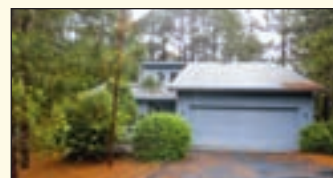

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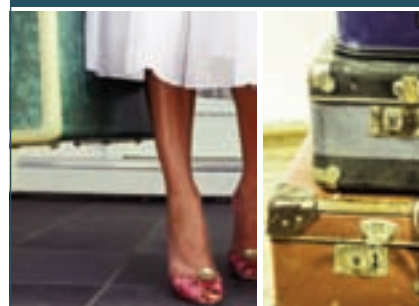
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# Shaw House Fair promises a day of fun

on the northside of Gateway Drive by the back gate.

Blue said the Architectural Review Committee [ARC] has been working to build a new publicly accessible page on the SLWLA website that will provide contractors with easy access to standards, covenants, rules and regulations, and other documents related to ARC permitting.

### Vinyl siding standard set

In other ARC-related action, the Board approved a new standard for vinyl siding, defining "premium vinyl" as having a minimum thickness of 0.044 inches.

The Westside's architectural standards discourage the use of vinyl siding, but, when it is used, specify that "premium vinyl" should be used. But "premium vinyl" has not been defined until now.

The ARC and Board initially considered using 0.05 inches as the standard, but switched that to 0.044 inches based

on input from contractors and representatives of the vinyl siding industry.

### Lot Recombinations

Acting on the recommendation of the ARC, the Board approved two lot recombina-tions. The first joins three lots that front on Longleaf near the back gate and the old airstrip. Blue noted that lots in that section are "fairly narrow."

The second recombination brought together four lots on the Beacon Ridge golf course. A custom home is planned for the tract.

Blue said both recombina-tions had been opposed by one member of the ARC based on the fact that lot recombina-tions reduce the number of dues-paying lots supporting the Association.

### Building reserves

At the recommendation of Treasurer Mercedes Herdrich, the Board approved the allocation of \$210,000 in excess funds from FY2014 to reserve accounts.

Of that total, \$130,000 was allocated to roads, \$30,000 to the mortgage on the West Side Park Community Center,

\$25,000 to the land bank, and \$25,000 to fencing.

Herdrich explained that the new CSI Committee has been "taking a look at the perimeter of the community to see whether there are any hot spots in terms of safety and security."

The number one area of concern, she said, is the border between The Pinnacle neighborhood and Seven Lakes Plaza shopping center. Areas near the back gate may also be targeted for fencing in the future.

Several years ago, the board allocated \$25,000 of the

reserve funds to future fencing projects, Herdrich said. The additional contribution approved during the board meeting will bring the total reserve for fencing to \$50,000.

Herdrich told *The Times* that the "land bank" is a reserve fund in which the Association can accumulate money to be used for possible future purchases of common property — for example, to provide a buffer on the border of the community — or to purchase easements for fencing projects.

### Mortgage payoff possible

In addition to allocating \$30,000 in funds left over from FY2014 to pay down the Community Center mortgage, the Association may cash in some underperforming CDs and pay off the mortgage entirely.

Herdrich said the SLWLA portfolio is invested entirely in CDs, "and the market has started to move against us, in terms of interest rates moving up."

"We have several CDs that are underwater," she added.

As a result the Finance Committee is exploring the possibility of selling two \$100,000 CDs that are paying a bit more than 2.5 percent interest, using the funds to retire the mortgage, which carries an interest rate of 5 percent.

Herdrich noted that a balloon payment on the mortgage is due in April, which would require that the mortgage be either paid off or rolled over.

Jeanette Mendence reported that, beginning October 1, Johnson Point will close at 9:00 pm rather than 10:00 pm.

ing Leonardo DeCaprio handing it to me," she said. "When I was little, the first person I told — and who really took me seriously when I said I wanted to be an actress — was my grandpa. So every time the the Oscars are on and someone wins, he texts me and says, 'Hey, that's going to be you in a few years!' So if I could just get one I could be like, 'You were right Pop!'"

Faw's goal is not so much to see how far he can go, as it is to see what acting can do for his students.

"I enjoy acting," Faw said, "but I think my real passion lies in the classroom. There is something about teaching and just being able to bring that passion to the classroom . . . So I guess, to sound really cheesy, my dream is to have a ticket to that Oscar ceremony and to be mentioned in the speech. I always tell my students: when Tom

Hanks won his first Oscar, he thanked his high school teacher."

"I still tell my students that I have no idea what I want to do when I grow up," Faw continued. "I think it's too much pressure for me to say 'This is what I want to do for the rest of my life.' Outside of my job I try to stay as far away from theatre and the arts as I can, sometimes."

Faw is as good with his students as he is on the stage.

"Faw is a great teacher," Kennedy said. "When you're acting, and he's directing, he doesn't baby you — which I think is a good thing. You learn to be independent, and you learn to come up with your own ideas . . . He sends you off to practice a scene for a few minutes, and when you come back you're good, but he tweaks one little thing and [then] it's really great!"

Both Faw and Kennedy have witnessed "kids coming

out of their shell" at Pinecrest due to acting. Faw refers to theatre as the "Island of Misfit Toys" due to the variety and diversity of the students in his class.

"It's helping them find a place to fit in and at the same time helping them find a way to be unique," he said. "It is very family-like."

Kennedy said, "At the end of the day we're all there for each other. We all love each other very much; I don't know what I'd do without them."

Faw's accomplishments have led him to be invited as the key speaker at the American Alliance for Theatre and Education conference in the spring.

Faw and Kennedy — as well as the rest of the *Mockingbird* cast and crew — are excited for the community to come and see them perform.

"Everyone should see *To*

*Kill A Mockingbird*," Kennedy said. "It's going to be amazing."

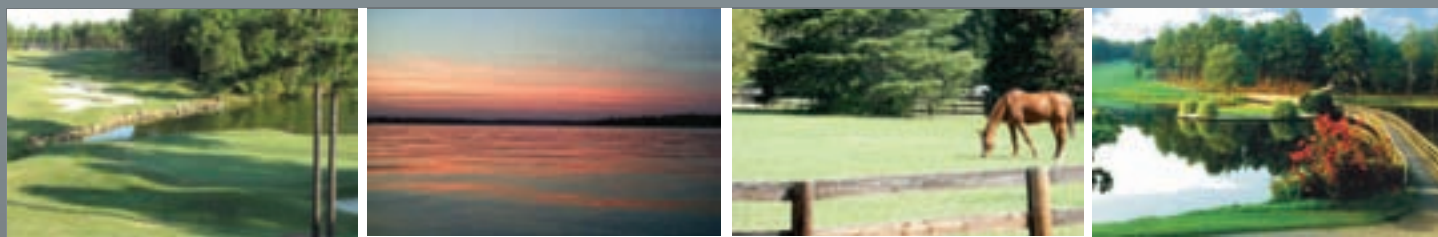

ident who uses the pool and raised some questions regarding non-resident use of the pool," Mayor Steve Durham said. "He suggested that it places a hardship on residents."

"I had a conversation with [Village Clerk] Lisa [Kivett]," Durham continued, "she said that this season, to the best of her knowledge, there was only one week that the pool was crowded — and that was during the US Open."

"There is no way to know everyone who is coming in and if they are residents or not," Durham said. "I guess I don't know where we want to go with this. Is this time to review or do we do that another time?"

Frusco said now was a good time to discuss the issue.

"At the last work session what we choose to do with this is make a decision on it," she said, "because what we do with this will impact

the budget session. I would like to get it settled."

### Current system can't track non-resident usage

"Currently, our system is that residents can come in and buy an annual pass," Frusco said. "We mark down who gets that pass."

"What becomes an issue is that residents also have the ability to buy a punch card. Family members come and use it."

"The timeshares association pay us a lump sum for people. They can just walk in; they are not an issue," she continued.

"If it's a question of making sure we know everyone who comes in, then we can go to a nonresident and resident membership. We can set the nonresident fee at anything we want to set it at. It was \$500 a couple of years back; we could set it at \$2,000 if we want."

"It depends on whatever

control you are asking for."

### Mostly praise for pool operations

"I am not asking for that," Mayor Durham said. "It was one issue raised by one of our residents. Overcrowding is not an issue, aside from several days during the US Open."

"I think certain things we could do. Just sell season passes — that's an alternative. What's in the best interest of Foxfire and people who want to use the pool, given that we have to make it available to nonresidents?"

"I followed up with the resident's complaint, and I've not heard any complaints about the pool," Durham

said. "In fact, it seems to go pretty well, from the sources that I have talked to."

Councilman Mick McCue agreed with Durham: "I have heard some people be very complimentary about the pool and have said that the lifeguards do a good job."

Frusco concurred, "I haven't heard of anything negative, other than from one or two residents. I have heard a lot of compliments about the pool and lifeguards."

Frusco reminded the Council of Attorney Brough's opinion that it would not be prudent to prohibit nonresidents from using the pool.

"Excluding nonresidents from a municipality could have us running into some

significant legal issues," she said.

### Sign ordinance enforcement

Before concluding the meeting Durham reported that some residents are failing to cooperate with the provisions of a recently adopted sign ordinance.

He said he observed over the weekend several instances where garage sale signs had been attached to street signs and a home-for-sale-by-owner sign was placed precariously.

Durham said the problem was an enforcement issue. McCue agreed that Village police should be on the lookout and remove offending signs.

have to clear trees," he said. "We come in and establish erosion control measures. We are very careful."

"The next step is, we have the contractor to come and drive the columns, followed by the installation of panels, and then our own crew comes in and does all the wiring. The inverter converts from DC to AC. It produces the same voltage that is running through the existing power lines running down the streets."

"The steel racking is attached to the column panels and comes in ninety truckloads," he explained. "The logistics of installing the panels is quick. It is finely coordinated and managed."

Iannone said both Duke Energy and Strata want to be sure that the installation is designed and constructed correctly.

"A third party electric engineering company comes and inspects the solar farm," he explained. "We have been through this process sixty times. It is an extremely thorough process."

### An education in solar energy

After Iannone's description of solar farm construction, Planning & Zoning Chair Mary Gilroy read a draft of the proposed ordinance point-by-point, with Iannone and the Council discussing each element of the ordinance.

Among the key points brought out in that interchange were:

- In is in the solar farm developer's financial interest to construct a five megawatt farm, on an ideal site of approximately thirty acres.

- The solar panels are photovoltaic and are similar in size to a door. The panels are fixed at an angle of twenty-five degrees, slanting toward the south to catch maximum sunlight. If viewed from the front, the panels are blue; if viewed from the back, the panels are aluminum-colored.

- The solar farm's support structure follows the existing topography with little grading.

- The private solar development company works directly with the property owner. The developer constructs the farm and sells

electricity directly to Duke Energy.

- The farm must be located within a certain distance to a Duke Energy substation.

- The utility company will install limited utility poles to connect the solar farm with an existing power line.

- There are no known adverse environmental impacts from commercial solar installations. Periodic rainfall keeps the panels clean.

- The noise produced by the inverters is less than forty decibels. The panels do not generate electricity at night.

- The panels produce minimal radiation. A cellphone produces a greater electromagnetic field.

- The company is required to meet state stormwater rules. The solar installation results in very little impervious surface, because vegetation remains or is planted underneath the panels.

- Most solar farms in North Carolina are located in agricultural areas and near small towns that have good infrastructure and affordable land.

### The proposed ordinance

Among key provisions of the ordinance proposed by

the Planning & Zoning Committee are:

- A conditional use permit would require that, if the solar farm becomes inoperable, the panels and framing would be removed and the ground would be returned to its original condition. Iannone noted that the metal and other components of the installation are valuable and recyclable.

- The proposed zoning amendment would limit solar farms to the RA-Rural Agricultural zoning district. There is no RA zoning inside the Village's corporate limits; RA (See "Solar," p. 27)

Racine said, discovering that, while some areas of the deck have significant damage from cracks, other areas are in good shape.

"If I have a splinter in my finger, do I cut off my hand and replace it with an artificial hand?" he asked. "No."

"Why are we going to spend \$150,000 to take care of a few items? We do have other expenses that are more important."

"But I don't care about that now," Racine said, turning to his other concern. "What I want is a procedure. I have been assured, and I want it

on the record, that this item will go before the Recreation Committee before it goes any further . . . . I gave you my word."

"I agree with you," Sommers said. "This has never been to the Recreation Committee, nor has the tennis courts, or any of the rest of them. This is all being rammed down our throats . . . and it's time some changes were being made."

Later in the meeting, Community Manager Ray Sohl reported that three bids have been received on the proposed pool repairs.

### Stables restroom upgrade in the works

Earlier in the meeting, Sommers had urged the board to move forward with the construction of an Americans with Disabilities Act [ADA] compliant restroom at the stables, something that has been requested by the Prancing Horse organization. Prancing Horse uses the stables to provide therapeutic riding experiences for those with disabilities, including some wounded veterans.

Noting the projected \$150,000 to \$160,000 cost

of repairing the pool, Sommers said: "We should take some of that money and build a bathroom . . . . We don't treat these people right . . . We shouldn't treat them like they don't exist, and that's what we are doing."

"We approve money for everything else. I don't see why a bathroom can't be built. And it shouldn't be put off for next month, next month, next month. It's like everything else: you put it off forever."

Racine explained that Prancing Horse had renewed their lease for this year without mentioning the need for an ADA compliant restroom, but then sent a letter earlier in September asking that one be provided.

"I'm in favor of it — not

only for them, but how about for the residents of Seven Lakes," Racine said. "But it is still September; I don't think we are dragging our feet."

Director Bill Hirsch has already prepared some plans for the facility, which Community Manager Ray Sohl said would be used to secure bids on the project. Racine assured Sommers that the matter would be reviewed by the Recreation Committee in October.

Until a permanent facility can be built, the board has approved the lease of a portable ADA-compliant toilet for the stables.

Farley said the stables will host a Halloween Party on October 31. Recreation is planning an arts and crafts sale on November 22.

Noting that unauthorized persons have been entering the stables area and the stables themselves after hours, Farley said that is not safe for either the trespasser or the horses. She suggested adding several no trespassing signs.

Earlier in the meeting, Les Sommers had noted that portions of the pasture fence had recently fallen. Manager Sohl said repairs are in the works, adding that a new

electric fence would soon be added to the pasture boundaries.

### Racine: SLLA members have a voice

President Racine used the "President's Remarks" section of the meeting to highlight "how fortunate we are to live in Seven Lakes."

"Les [Sommers] and others have voiced their opinion about what we do in here. I have people call me about what's going on."

"No one should ever feel that they don't have a voice in the running of Seven Lakes," he said. "We all do, and we all respect each other. We may disagree, but we respect the disagreement."

"I think that is the thing I like most about being President, is being able to talk to residents, listen to their concerns, and then go forward and find an answer."

### Other Business

In other business during the Wednesday, September 26 SLLA Open Meeting:

- Director Hirsch announced that the Architectural Review Board has approved plans for two new homes to be constructed, one on the South Side and one on the North Side.
- President Racine reported that, of 130 open rules violations reports, 90 have been sent letters. A significant number have been contacted by phone and the problem resolved.
- Racine reported that the Judicial Committee heard thirteen cases during its September 11 meeting.
- Charters for the Finance Committee and the Lakes & Dams Committee were unanimously approved.
- The board agreed to write-off \$6,410 in outstanding balances on two accounts

deemed uncollectible due to foreclosures.

- The directors voted to accept an insurance settlement of \$13,833, covering damage to the South-side gatehouse equipment caused by a lightning strike. Sohl said the amount of the settlement

should more than cover the cost of repairs.

- Sohl passed along thanks from the Sandhills Sandsharks for the use of Lake Echo during their recent swim meet.
- Directors Steve Ritter and Chuck Leach were absent from the meeting.

is found only in the ETJ.

- The proposed zoning would require a setback of 100 or 150 feet from adjacent property lines.

- To prevent unauthorized entry, the installation would be surrounded by six-foot chainlink fences topped with barbed wire.

- Existing vegetation could be used as screening buffer-

ing the solar farm from adjacent land and roadways. Otherwise, additional planting of vegetative screening would be required.

At the conclusion of the discussion, council members asked the Planning & Zoning Committee to finalize their recommendation, after which the village will hold a public hearing to allow for citizen input.
